

LOOKING AT THE PAST FOR A BETTER FUTURE

The article presented below is from "GMC Western States Tech Center # 26" originally published in September 15, 1999. Here we are almost 10 years later and this subject is still very much relevant for newcomers and old-timers alike.

More than ever before, our beloved GMCs need constant attention. They all are at least 36 years old and still running, a tribute to the GM design engineers of the late 60's. They did the best they could with what they had at the time, within the budget they had and within the time that was allocated to them to create an outstanding machine that is still very much alive today. Over the years all club members have felt these machines are worth taking care of and also many of us have felt

that they are worth improving upon to increase our enjoyment while using them. GMC Western States Club has in its archives, a wealth of technical articles written by a large number of dedicated members that describe how to maintain and improve our coach and solve problems when they occur or avoid them. The article below is only a small sample of what is available.

Chuck Garton was GMC Western States Technical Vice-President from 1997 to 1999. He is still active in the Club. Among other things he is known for having equipped his coach with an abundance of gauges and warning lights that make him constantly aware of the status of his coach while driving.

INNER CV JOINT BOLTS

I have read in various GMC publications about coaches losing all six inner CV joint bolts and being stranded along the roadside waiting for service.

I bought a 67 Toronado new and have lived with these bolts for over thirty years. The maintenance manual states that these bolts be replaced whenever removed and never be reused. After reading this, whenever I was at an Oldsmobile or Cadillac dealer, I would check at the parts counter and find out that these bolts were never stocked.

Now, I keep a new set on hand, and when I use them I order a new set from Cinnabar. I also keep a set of used ones in the motor home in case I lose some while traveling. However this is treating a symptom and not curing the real problem.

When I purchased my 1974 Sequoia 26' in November of 1977, I had no experience in maintaining a motor home. One day in 1979, I was under the coach doing something, when I noticed that all six bolts on the passenger side CV joint were loose about one turn. The book said the torque was 65 foot pounds, so I torqued them to specifications.

After a 500 mile trip, I was again under the coach and the same six bolts were loose about one turn. This time I installed new bolts and lock washers and torque them to specification. My next trip was also 500 miles and after that trip the six bolts were again loose.

Being real sharp and on top of things, it only took 2,000 to 3,000 miles (tightening the bolts every 500 miles) and a passenger side front wheel bearing failure to figure out the real problem!

After the bearing replacement, and going by the maintenance schedule of replacing the front wheel bearings every 25,000 miles, I have never had one inner CV joint bolt come loose.

Editor's Note: This is a reminder that the front bearings MUST be serviced every 25,000 miles.
