



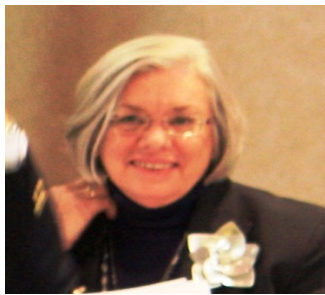

# MISSION GRANTS 2012-2014

LWML NID is \$15,000.00 behind on our Mission Goal for 2012-2014. Please encourage your Societies and Zones to contribute to the LWML NID Mission Mite Goal. Make your check out to LWML NID and mail mite donations to: **LWML NID, P.O. Box 175, Westmont, IL 60559.**

- 1. Veterans of the Cross LCMS National Mission** **\$2,000**  
 Veterans of the Cross Program, which is administered for The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod by Concordia Plan Services, provides financial assistance to eligible ordained or commissioned ministers (and their dependents) who find that their income is insufficient to meet their needs. Often, the eligible church workers have served under unfavorable economic conditions, have demonstrated financial need and have no family to assist them or such assistance is minimal.
- 2. Handicap Accessible Bathroom Repair Walcamp Outdoor Ministries** **\$19,000**    **paid \$5,500**  
 Walcamp, a LCMS camp in the Northern Illinois District, which shares the Gospel in a unique outdoor setting through Biblical teaching, small group devotions, and worship in God's creation. Where some young people learn about the love of Jesus for the first time and others are strengthened in their faith to face the challenges of this world. Walcamp needs quality showers, bathrooms and facilities to maintain the overnight nature of this ministry, including facilities that are fully handicap accessible for all participants with special needs. This grant would provide renovation of the 50 year old showers and plumbing in the original lodge building.
- 3. More Grace Grace Christian Academy** **\$22,000**    **paid \$5,593.10**  
 Grace is a Lutheran school which is supported entirely by gifts and tuition. It is a mission near your home in the Little Village neighborhood of Chicago. Grace would utilize grant money in these two areas: curriculum improvement and building improvements. Grace's current math and religion materials are several years old, and they would be upgraded by purchasing new curriculum. The addition of fine arts classes and supervised tutoring would improve the after school program. Building improvements include refinishing the hardwood floors in all classrooms and replacing the school's missing second floor flagpole.
- 4. Worship for Shut-Ins Lutheran Ministries Media, Inc.** **\$22,000**    **paid \$5,500**  
 This grant would support the payment of "air-time" fees to the television stations in Northern Illinois that carry the worship for Shut-Ins program. Donor/viewer support from the area is only supplying 60% of the amount needed. As an LCMS Recognized Service Organization, WFSI is designed and focused specifically for the homebound, a predominately senior-aged audience. Health-care officials believe that emotional good-health has a direct bearing on physical health. Scripture says, "Cast your cares on the Lord:" Psalm 55:22. Seniors are dying every day without knowing Jesus. Worship for Shut-Ins proclaims God's Word to the homebound, un-churched, incarcerated and infirmed.
- 5. Audio Bible Study Lutheran Blind Mission** **\$6,000**  
 Lutheran Blind Mission is a Recognized Service Organization (RSO) of the LCMS and seeks to develop and distribute an audio Bible study titled: "Helping Blind People See Jesus." The grant of \$6,000 will support the production, design and distribution of the audio Bible study to 1,000 Blind Outreach centers. For the first time in LCMS history, the blind and visually-impaired community (both churched and un-churched) will be able to study and understand God's Word in a meaningful way, specific to their circumstances, and be able to receive the light of salvation as seen through the cross and eyes of Jesus.





# MISSION GRANTS 2012-2014

- 6. Housing for New Missionaries Lutheran Bible Translators \$5,000**  
 Lutheran Bible Translators is an independent Lutheran mission organization with headquarters in Aurora IL, and with missionaries in 15 countries. These missionaries translate the Bible into new languages and train native pastors, teachers and deaconesses in teaching and witnessing. Funds are requested to set up a household for new missionaries going into the field in 2013. To provide suitable housing, a local home must be renovated through painting and repairs. A water filtration system ensures that the water is pure enough for drinking. Solar panels provide electricity and screens help prevent insect-borne illness. The requested amount will be matched by other sources developed by LBT.
- 7. Swahili Lutheran Catechisms for East Africa Lutheran Heritage Foundation \$10,000**  
 Swahili is a language spoken by more than 100 million people in East African countries such as Tanzania, Kenya, and Uganda. For a new Christian, the Bible's hundreds of pages can seem over whelming. Books that simply, but thoroughly, explain the Lutheran faith in the people's own language are a Godsend. For about \$5 per book, the Lutheran Heritage Foundation (in partnership with the Northern Illinois District LWML) will translate and publish Lutheran books, including Luther's Small Catechism, into Swahili. Churches and missionaries will use the books to share the Gospel with unbelievers and prepare new members for baptism and confirmation.
- 8. Repair & Furnish William Griffin Community Center, Zion Lutheran Church, Chicago \$20,000 paid \$3,344**  
 The Dr. William H. Griffin Community Center, a ministry of Zion Lutheran Church, was established in 2009 to serve the needs in the community and to be a springboard for gospel outreach. The center serves approximately 800 individuals monthly through its food pantry, clothing bank, summer youth programs, computer lab, and the like. Other events are scheduled throughout the year such as healthy lifestyle promotions, abstinence workshops, peace-building education and, most importantly, to witness about Jesus Christ to participants. This grant will partially fund needed structural repair of the center, purchase refrigeration and storage units, and supply food for the food pantry.
- 9. Outreach to International Students in the U.S. International Student Ministry (ISM), INC. \$10,000**  
 ISM, Inc. is an LCMS Recognized Service Organization that trains university workers for ministry among international students, assisting them in praying for their concerns and raising funds for their ministries. A grant given by the LWML NID would be used by ISM, Inc. to give grants to many international student ministries for purchasing Bibles and Christ-centered resources for the students in their native language or English. For \$10,000 nearly 400 students and families could receive bilingual Bibles. ISM offers visitors to US universities and colleges friendship, hospitality, and the Gospel message.
- 10. Lutheran School Improvement Project Trinity Lutheran School Tinley Park, IL \$780**  
 Trinity Lutheran School exists to teach children about Jesus! Most students are from families of believers, but some are from un-churched families. In either case, students learn the Gospel and the importance of spreading it, now and throughout their lives. The school was blessed with an unexpected increase in enrollment in 2011, such that many children were turned away due to limited space. The church and school are committed to adding equipment and supplies as well as classroom space to increase the number of children reached. This grant would help with purchasing educational materials and some of the building expenses.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT THE BUS TO PITTSBURGH

There are so many reasons to take the bus to Pittsburgh. It is cheaper than flying and more relaxing than driving! You can make new friends while you travel with your sisters from the Northern Illinois District and even a few from our non geographical districts who live in our area.

We are currently accepting up to 6 additional bus registrations. **Please call Kris Blackwell (630) 234-1491 as you must register for the bus before you register for convention.**

We will leave at 7AM on **Wednesday, June 26, 2013** from the Northern Illinois District office (2301 South Wolf Road, Hillside, Illinois 60162-2298) and arrive at our hotel around 7PM. **We will all stay in the same hotel at a special reduced rate** about 5 miles from the convention center. Hotel registration will be at the Double Tree Greentree Hotel in Pittsburgh at \$129 per night. You may be in a room with up to 3 other people. There are refrigerators in every room and access to a microwave in the dining area. Breakfast is available for purchase at 6:30 in the morning.

Our bus will serve as our shuttle bus every morning and evening. We anticipate that we will have two departures from the convention center each day - one around suppertime and one after the evening event. We will ensure that the bus arrives at the convention center Thursday morning in time for those taking the sight-seeing trip. Our actual schedule will be determined once we have the convention schedule that will be in the Winter Quarterly. On Sunday the 30<sup>th</sup>, we will stay for the closing worship. Please buy a Sunday box lunch to take on the bus for the way back home. It is anticipated that we will arrive home just before midnight.
