To be considered for entry to St Mary's:

**Nursery class** - your child needs to turn four between 1 September 2015 – 31 August 2016

**Reception class** - your child needs to turn five between 1 September 2015 – 31 August 2016

Returning application forms to St Mary's before your child is eligible for entry does not secure a place at the School.

## Isaiah 22:19-23; Psalm 137:1-3,6,7c; Romans 11:33-36; Matthew 16:13-20

In the passage we read from the prophet Isaiah today we glimpse the internal workings and tensions of the royal household. It contrasts two officials who functioned as "chancellor", that is, in command second only to the king. "Shebna" is condemned and rejected for unacceptable actions, whereas "Eliakim" is commended and endorsed as a faithful and effective official - and in him we see envisaged the coming of "the good steward" in the future of Jerusalem. The passage begins with words typical of Isaiah, "on that day", signalling an anticipated future. This reminds us of Jerusalem's long-term hope of a coming good king, a messiah, an echo of the royal, Davidic ideology. The ideal of Eliakim is in complete contrast to the reality of Shebna. The promise to the coming Eliakim is full investiture of power and authority in which he is given the emblems of office and the official "key" to the royal establishment. He will be "the peg", that is, the lynchpin of administrative power, so that everything flows to and depends upon him. It is likely that the reference to Eliakim and "the key of the house of David" (v. 22) is repeated in **Matthew** 16:19, where Peter is promised, "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." Enormously powerful authorization. Peter holds the office, not unlike Eliakim, second only to the reigning "David", Jesus. Peter, like Eliakim, is entrusted

with complete oversight of the household of the church. However, we see, after this high investiture of Peter, the very next paragraph in Matthew condemning him as a would-be Shebna: "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things" (Matt 16:23).

Throughout history this Petrine promise has been interpreted in different ways. In Matthew, Peter is the model disciple who must be constantly sustained by Christ, and in the early Church he is remembered primarily as an apostle and martyr. The traditional notion that Peter is the type of every Christian, the "rock" on whom the Church is built, is very early. The Eastern interpretation is that the "rock" is the faith of Peter, so that the Church is built on the faith of believing Christians. In the Middle Ages there was the strong Christological understanding of Christ as the "rock" (cf 1 Cor 3:11; 10:4). An interpretation dating from the fourth century is the Roman/pontifical interpretation: the "rock" is Peter, and promises to Peter extend to successors in Petrine ministry. Fundamental to all interpretations and to the Johannine version of the Petrine promise (John 21:15-19) are Jesus' words that the Church is "my Church" and the sheep are "my sheep". Ultimately, faith rests on Christ, who is the Good Shepherd of the flock.

Our psalm today, **Psalm 137**, is in praise of the LORD's faithful love for his people. Homage is paid by great and small alike, "all earth's kings" as well as "the lowly". All shall "sing of the LORD's ways" – and, as we know from our Isaiah reading - and, indeed, Matthew's Gospel, "our ways" are likely to be different from "the LORD's ways" and lessons have to be painfully learnt.

The utter confidence expressed in the LORD in Psalm 127: "How great is the glory of the LORD" whose "love" is "eternal" is echoed in our passage from Romans, where Paul, at the end of chapter 11, brings to a triumphant conclusion his anxieties for his fellow Jews, focussing on the inscrutable wisdom of God. Confidently, he leaves all to an unknown, eschatological future which will be in God's hands and in God's good time: "How rich are the depths of God – how deep his wisdom and knowledge – and how impossible to penetrate his motives or understand his ways." To underline his words, he quotes from our friend, the prophet Isaiah: "Who could ever know the mind of the LORD? Who could ever be his counsellor?" (Isaiah 40:13).
