Summer Packet


As your child prepares for first grade, here are some suggestion to make the transition a smooth one.

Reading/ Writing

- Visit your town's public library frequently during the summer. Reading aloud to your child will help build his/her comprehension and vocabulary skills. Simple easy beginning readers: books with only a few words on each page which they may be able to read alone or with help will "jump start" their entrance into first grade.
- Model the importance of reading by having a family reading time. This is a time when your child reads, even if this means just interpreting the pictures on each page of a storybook.
- Have your child read 20 minutes each day- either alone, with a sibling, or with an adult.
 - On the attached reading log, please record the titles of books read this summer.
- Encourage your child to speak in complete sentences when he/she converse to foster correct grammar usage.
- Have your child tell you about the day's events, what he/she likes about a trip you took, etc.
 - Keep a journal and encourage your child to write in it (*see attached sheet for writing prompts and idea for journal writing).
 - You can help your child write a sentence or two and you can read it together.



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Mathematics

Your child had a busy year learning new math skills in Kindergarten. Mastery of all these skills is extremely important in order to build a solid math foundation. This first grade math program will add into these kindergarten skills, so time spent reinforcing these concepts will be beneficial for your child.

- Here are some suggestions for summer practice before entering the first grade.
 - Read and write numbers up to 30.
 - Count orally to 100 by 1's, 5's, and 10's.
 - Use the phrases "more than," "less than," or "same as" when comparing two numbers from 1 to 30.
 - Add and subtract numbers from 1 to 10. Use mainpulatives or objects around the house to help.
 - Compare two or more objects by length or weight. Which is shorter, longer, taller, smaller, lighter or heavier?
 - Identify and sort objects. Sort items by color, size, shape, etc.
 - Continue a pattern of two or three different objects. Example: red, blue, yellow, red blue, yellow crayons or blocks: or toy car, toy car, toy truck, toy car, toy car, toy truck... For more pattern practice, use colorful cereal or different animal cracker shapes. You can start a pattern and have your child finish it.
 - Recognize coin values: dime = 10 cents, nickel = 5 cents, penny = 1 cent.
 - $\circ~$ Do number dot to dot worksheets to help with counting.


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More writing ideas:

Supply List

Each child should bring the following on the first day of school:
