PENTECOST SUNDAY

Two years ago, during Rome's quiet summer, Pope Francis took a day off to visit privately with some old friends, whose identity took Catholic Italy by surprise: Evangelical Protestants. They welcomed Francis to their Pentecostal Church of Reconciliation, where Francis asked pardon for Catholic persecutions and celebrated the Holy Spirit's "Pentecostal work." Unlike Satan, declared Francis, who creates division among God's children, the Holy Spirit creates a diversity rich and beautiful. And unity; not uniformity, Francis specified, but unity in diversity. Francis named the Spirit's gift "reconciled diversity." Pentecost's rich treasury of scriptural readings, for Saturday's vigil and Sunday's morning liturgy, traces the Holy Spirit's work from creation's beginning, through Jesus' resurrection, into the church's earliest days, now into our days. Kindled in our hearts, the Spirit's gentle fire is ours to share generously, even with those most strikingly different from us. All hearts are Spirit-warmed by reconciled diversity.



VIGIL READINGS ILLUSTRATE Pentecost's Birthing

As Easter opened with a scripturally rich Vigil, Pentecost crowns Easter's "Great Fifty Days" by opening with a Vigil, whose Old Testament readings envision the Spirit's Pentecost creativity. Genesis shows Babel's language-unity disintegrating into scattered confusion. Pentecost's Spirit reconciles varying languages, creating faith's unity in diversity. Exodus shows people trembling as wind and fire accompany God's commands. Pentecost's tongues of fire come with wind, but no fear, gently empowering Apostles to proclaim Jesus' law of love. Ezekiel envisions the Spirit reuniting scattered bones, breathing new life, restoring them to the Promised Land. Pentecost's Spirit breathes life into scattered souls, gathering them into Jesus' new united faith community. Joel promises Spirit-given dreams and visions to rescue God's chosen remnant. That Spirit, Paul declares, prays for us, in us; and Jesus invites us to drink deeply of that Spirit, whose living water, flowing through us, lovingly restores others to life.

COME, HOLY SPIRIT!

Reconciled diversity illumines Pentecost and fills this Jubilee Year of Mercy. Locked doors fly open as Pentecost's Spirit sends forth once-frightened disciples to share Jesus' gospel in countless languages, uniting crowds of divergent sometimes hostile — nationalities into one newborn community filled with peace. Paul exhorts the Corinthians, and us, to celebrate our differences, for gifts of the same Spirit build our diversity into Jesus' one body. Paul bids the Romans, and us, to embrace life bestowed by "the Spirit of adoption, through whom we cry, 'Abba, Father!'" In today's traditional Gospel, Jesus sends forth previously frightened disciples, and us, to love others as Jesus loves us. So Pope Francis sees Pentecost's Spirit, in this Jubilee Year of Mercy, summoning us afresh from past mediocrity and selfish isolation to share God's mercy enthusiastically and generously. The alternative Gospel declares keeping Jesus' commandments not a mindless obligation but a loving choice, closing Easter Time with Jesus' enduring promise of the Pentecost Spirit's abiding presence: that Spirit "will teach you everything and remind you of all I told you."

Our Vision

St. Norbert Parish aspires to become one in Christ as a community of fervent disciples, who listen attentively for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and who lovingly embrace Jesus, present in the poor, the alienated and the spiritually hungry.

Stewardship

Today is the Solemnity of Pentecost. One of the most ancient feasts of the Church, Pentecost is mentioned and explained in both the Acts of the Apostles (today's First Reading) and in St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. The name comes quite simply from the Greek word, *Pentekoste*, which meant "the 50th day" as Pentecost is 50 days after Easter Sunday (counting Easter).

Pentecost is often called the "birthday of the Church" as it was on this day — with the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and about 120 followers of Christ, including our Blessed Mother Mary and other men and women — that Christ's mission on earth is complet-

However, that mission continues with us. We, too, have received the power of the Holy Spirit through Baptism, Confirmation, the Eucharist, and other sacraments. It is this Holy Spirit that allows us to be the Lord's Disciples actively working in today's Church and today's society. Nevertheless, we must accept and recognize that fact.

CONTINUING SERIES ON OUR LADY

TILMA FORCE

Several years ago I had the opportunity to travel to Mexico City. I had just completed my graduate work in Latin American Studies and had gotten permission to travel to Mexico. My mind is still filled with wonderful memories of the city and the history that the city contains. One memory that stands out is my visit to the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

I remember seeing the tilma that Juan Diego wore when he was visited by Our Lady¹ on display behind a glass case over the main

altar. However what really stands out in my memory are the thousands of people who were praying and singing. Many of those where kneeling and walking on their knees as they were praying.

The devotion of the Mexican people to Our Lady is everywhere in Mexico and the image of Mary on the tilma of Juan Diego has been carried in processions and demonstrations and battles throughout the centuries. The people see Our Lady as their guardian and support. For hundreds of years Our Lady of Guadalupe has given

the people hope and a sense that they are not alone in their many struggles.

Pope Francis addressed the Bishops of Mexico during his visit there on Saturday, February 13, 2016. The Pope for some time had nourished a desire to see la Guada-

lupana just as Saint Juan Diego did and successive generations after him. In his address to the Bishops the Pope continued to reference "la Morenita." Pope Francis said that:

"Guadalupe teaches us that God is known, and is closer to us, by his countenance and that closeness and humility, that bowing down and drawing close, are more powerful than force...As the wonderful Guadalupana tradition teaches us, la Morenita gathers together those who contemplate her, and reflects the faces of those who find her...we must

guard against becoming impervious to such gazes, but rather gather them to our hearts and guard them." (from the Address of Pope Francis to the Mexican Bishops²)

I find it wonderful that centuries after her appearance at Tepeyec Our Lady still calls us to concern for those who are oppressed and in need.

Talking Forgiveness

Have you ever found it difficult to forgive? If so, turn to Mary, the Mother of Mercy. She is the Mother of God whose "mercy endures forever" (Ps 118:1), the Mother of Jesus who prayed, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do" (Lk. 23:34). She is our surest help when we struggle with feelings of resentment or the desire to "get even." For did not she, of all people, have reason to feel resentment, to desire revenge, to despise those who betrayed and abandoned her Son? Did not she have reason to wish for revenge against the hypocrisy of religious leaders who twisted the truth of his words and the goodness of his mighty deeds to justify his condemnation as a charlatan deserving death? And, did not she have reason to wish for vengeance against the cowardice of Pilate, the cruelty of his executioners, and the mockery of the bystanders who scornfully laughed at her beloved Son stripped naked, dying helplessly on the cross? Indeed, she had every reason to cry out to God asking for vengeance against the perpetrators of such barbarous cruelty!

But, no, she did not. She forgave. She witnessed Jesus asking His Father to forgive.

So let us pray the "Hail, Holy Queen" every day during this Holy Year of Mercy, asking Mary, the Mother of Mercy, to help us be merciful when we feel the desire for revenge or for "getting even." May Mary, the Mother of Mercy be "our life, our sweetness, and our hope" as we learn how "blessed are the merciful for they shall receive mercy."
