A Balancing Act

t has been a couple of months since we took a look at legislation and regulation of energy issues at the national level. Most industry insiders expected renewed efforts to make major changes following the November elections. Congressional action remains tough as politicians appear to be fairly solid in their positions and most votes fall along "party lines." As expected, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is moving forward with new regulations across a wide range of issues including new emission regulations for existing

ued development of renewable energy resources as the major reasons for the decline.

Polling of consumers conducted across the nation indicates that a majority of Americans, almost 65 percent, favor increasing regulations to reduce emissions from power plants, automobiles and other sources. However, less than 30 percent support paying a "carbon tax" to pay for improvements necessary to achieve greater emission reductions. In short, while a majority of Americans desire a cleaner environment, most are not ready to pay for the changes necessary to reach that goal. It is critical that new legislation and regulation work to balance the benefit of new regulations against the cost of those new regulations to consumers. As elected officials, I expect that Congress would be better than the EPA at achieving that balance.

Closer to home, I have always been amazed by the announced results of polling or survey data. Over the years, I have received a few calls from pollsters, generally political polls around election time and generally ending with a request for donations. While I am not a big fan of polls or surveys, I understand the information can be very useful in understanding what folks are really thinking. In early May our new wholesale power supplier, Western Farmers Electric Cooperative (WFEC), will be mailing a survey-form to a random sampling of residential consumers across the 22 electric distribution coops they serve, including Farmers' Electric. If you are one of the lucky recipients, I ask that you take some time to complete the survey and return it WFEC. WFEC conducts this survey periodically and utilizes the results in planning how to best meet the needs of the membership in the future. All of the responses will be confidential, neither WFEC nor Farmers' Electric will be able to identify those responding to the survey.

In closing, Farmers' Electric is celebrating our 75th birthday this year! While there have been a number of changes through the years and there are a number of new faces, the Cooperative's mission remains the same. We are here to provide the membership with quality electric service at a reasonable and affordable cost. I hope you will plan on attending the 75th Annual Meeting of the members in Santa Rosa on April 27.

Q. Willie, I am thinking about doing some spring tree planting around the house, any suggestions? I have heard that trees can help save on energy consumption in your home. Anything to that?



A. Great question! Well, you heard right! The trick: Plant leafy trees on the south and west sides of your house to keep the summer sun from pouring heat through those windows. After they drop their leaves in the fall, they will allow warm winter sunlight to enter the house and give your heating system a break.

Likewise, plant a few evergreens along the north, west, and east sides of the house to break the winter wind and keep the cold air from infiltrating your home.


Carefully positioned trees can cut up to 25 percent from your heating and cooling bills, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. Because we live in a particularly windy area, a windbreak can easy your fuel (electric, gas, or propane) by up to 40 percent!

Here's a bonus free of charge! Trees near the house can cut down on noise that tries to make it's way into your house.


