## Fireworks Ordinances - City of Belleville

The City of Belleville addresses the use of fireworks within city limits. I have posted them below: 30-1-15 FIREWORKS.

- (A) Fireworks Defined. The term "fireworks" shall mean and include any explosive composition, or any substance or combination of substances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing an audible effect by the explosion, deflagration or deterioration, or for the purpose of producing visual effects, and shall include blank cartridges, toy cannons, in which explosives are used, the type of balloons which require fire underneath to propel the same, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, bombs, or other fireworks of like construction and any fireworks containing any explosive compound, or any tablets or device containing any explosive substance, or compound, or containing any explosive substance, or compound, or containing combustible substances producing visual effects; provided, however, that the term "fireworks" shall not include toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns, or other devices in which paper caps containing twenty-five hundredths (0.25) grains or less of explosive compound are used, provided they are so constructed that the hand cannot come in contact with the cap when in place for the explosion and toy pistol paper caps which contain less than twenty hundredths (0.20) grains of explosive mixture, the sale and use of which shall be permitted at all times.
- (B) Fireworks Unlawful. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess, use, display, ignite, sell or offer for sale any fireworks, firecrackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, sky rockets, or other pyrotechnics within the City.
- (C) Exception. Public exhibitions or displays of fireworks or pyrotechnics shall be permitted when such display or exhibition is under expert supervision; provided, however, that no public exhibition or display of pyrotechnics shall be had without first obtaining the approval of the Fire Chief of the place of exhibition; and in no event, shall said place of exhibition be within two hundred (200) feet of any building, structure, street or alley; said approval must be obtained from the Fire Chief twenty (20) days before the exhibition. ### **Fireworks Safety**

If you are heading to an area where it is legal to use fireworks over the holiday, there are a few tips you can follow to make your experience safer. From the National Council on Fireworks Safety:

- 1. Obey all local laws regarding the use of fireworks.
- 2. Know your fireworks, read all labels prior to ignition.
- 3. An adult should supervise all fireworks activity. Never give fireworks to a child.
- 4. Alcohol and fireworks don't mix. Save your alcohol for after the show.
- 5. Wear safety glasses.
- 6. Light one firework at a time then quickly move away.
- 7. Use fireworks outdoors, in a clear area.
- 8. Never relight a "dud." Wait 20 min, then douse in a bucket of water.
- 9. Keep a bucket of water and a hose nearby.
- 10. Never carry fireworks in your pocket or shoot them into metal or glass containers.
- 11. Do not experiment with homemade fireworks.
- 12. Dispose of spent fireworks by wetting them down and placing them in a metal trashcan away from other combustibles.
- 13. Report illegal fireworks, like M-80's and quarter sticks to the police or fire department.



# Beat the Heat - Stay Cool!



With local heat indexes creeping towards 105 degrees, the St. Clair County Health Department is offering suggestions on how to beat the heat and avoid heat-related illnesses.

During extremely hot weather, the body can heat too rapidly to cool itself properly. Health officials recommend you become familiar with the symptoms of heat related illness which include: heavy sweating, weakness, clammy skin, nausea or vomiting and fainting.

There are also precautions you can take to help beat heat-related illness, according to Ready.gov (http://www.ready.gov/heat):

Never leave children or pets in closed vehicles.

Stay indoors as much as possible and limit exposure to sun and wear sun screen. Postpone outdoor games and activities.

Eat well-balanced, light meals.

Drink plenty of water, even if you do not feel thirsty. Avoid drinks with caffeine. Limit alcoholic beverages.

Dress in loose-fitting, light-weight, light-colored clothing that covers as much skin as possible. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays.

Protect your face and head by wearing a wide-brimmed hat. Avoid strenuous work during the hottest part of the day.

Check your animals frequently to make sure they are not suffering from the heat and have fresh drinking water.
