#### 5. Summarise any feedback received from section 94(4) bodies<sup>1</sup>

Section 94(4) Bodies show a marked reluctance to respond to CCAF consulations etc. We have though received useful feedback from the Forestry Commission (on the shortcomings of NE's maps attached to access restriction notices) and on requested modification of access restrictions (to reduce inconvenience to the public).We received limnited resp;onse from NE in respect of their consultaion on NRR management. We are currently waiting a response from Cornwall Council on an LTP consultation.

#### 6. Please provide any comments from your Appointing Authority

The Cornwall Countryside Access Forum has struggled to make an impact over the last year in the context of continuing cuts to local authority budgets. Nevertheless the Council welcomes the support, advice, inspiration and enthusiasm that members of the Forum bring to meetings. The problem for the Forum and for the Council is how to turn all of that enthusiasm into improvements to countryside access in Cornwall. By waving the flag for countryside access, maintaining their strategic approach and by working with other groups engaged in the same dilemma of how to deliver improved outcomes with shrinking budgets, the Forum can continue to have a significant impact on how countryside access changes in Cornwall in the future.

### 7. Comments from LAF Chair

As long as the current financial restictions apply, it is difficult to see how the Forum or the appointing authority, it's main Section 94(4) "correspondent, can do other than make the best of a bad job. Countryside access generally, and the rights of way network in particular, are vital to the wellbeing of both the local populous and to the tourist industry in Cornwall. In spite of the gloomy outlook, we are determined to positively support the Council and to look for ways in which matters might be impoved.
