#### HOW TO USE A GAVEL

Do you notice the new picture I'm using for my article this month? It was taken February 12 in the Brown Chapel at Lyon College in Batesville—and yes, that's the chapel funded by Josephine Brown, a member of our congregation in the 1950s and 1960s. The picture shows me holding the gavel presented me when I was installed as Moderator of Arkansas Presbytery for the coming year. I was also presented the silver Presbyterian

cross worn by each moderator, in which is etched the shape of the state of Arkansas. I'll be glad to show it to you anytime!

Thank you for allowing me the privilege, and the time it takes, to serve our presbytery in this role. Not only do I help plan and moderate three meetings of the presbytery in 2016, and attend various committee meetings over the next two years, but I also moderate services of ordination and installation in churches that are calling new pastors. For example, I will moderate the commission to install the new pastor at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Hot Springs on the afternoon of April 10. I encourage you to be in attendance to see our presbytery in action, and to show our support for our neighboring church and their new pastor, Chip Hatcher, who is an outstanding person.

But what about that gavel? Those of you who have served on the session realize that I'm not one for a gavel. Though my meetings can get rather long, I'm not one to bang a gavel to control the conversation or exert my influence over others. In a previous church, a woodworker made me a huge gavel that weighs about five pounds, hoping I would use it freely to exert my control—especially over those with whom he disagreed. Though I appreciated his gift, I just leave it on the shelf for a good laugh. What good is a gavel?

The best advice I've received so far is from a former moderator who reminded me to be light on the gavel. "Keep the meeting moving so that commissioners forget to look at their watches; Use a sense of humor to throw fun at yourself; look for those who may be timid, and give them extra time to state their opinion; don't draw attention to yourself, but care for the whole body, whom you are there to serve; pray frequently." As another person said, "use the gavel only to begin and end the meetings, and keep them as close together as you can!"

I'm grateful that the gavel was handed to me during the season of Lent. My daily devotions and Sunday Bible passages this month give me numerous examples of our Lord Jesus who found his greatest strength in turning his face to Jerusalem. Jesus' walk to Jerusalem reminds me that true strength comes not in exerting influence over God's people, but providing for their needs as a servant, showing them God's love through sacrifice. When Christ is our true motive, we give others the freedom and incentive to repent and align their lives with God's purposes above their own.

So as you continue to walk the season of Lent and make your way to the empty tomb on Easter Sunday, remember that Christ's resurrection comes after the crucifixion, dying to self and living for God's glory alone. Go light on the gavel and show others your genuine willingness to serve, and they will see God's glory shining in you.

And remember: if your children or other family members are visiting you for Easter, make time to introduce me to them so I may know better your extended family. God bless you this joyful Easter season!

#### **SESSION NOTES**

Bill Randall, Jr. reported on the February 12-13 meeting of Arkansas Presbytery at Lyon College in Batesville. Our Pastor, Lacy Sellars, was installed as Moderator of Arkansas Presbytery. Music was a highlight of the meeting, notable the Lyon College Drum and Bagpipe Band. Chip Hatcher, new Pastor at Westminster, was welcomed to the Presbytery.

Statistical report for submission to the General Assembly was approved. At the end of 2015, this church had 284 active members on the roll.

A congregational meeting was called for March 6 to elect a Deacon to fill an unexpired term. Char Paul has agreed to have her name placed in nomination.

#### Other items:

- New pictorial directories have arrived and been distributed.
- On Easter Sunday, March 27, we will have a pot luck brunch and children's Easter Egg Hunt prior to the morning worship service.
- A Child Protection Policy has been adopted which will require, among other things, background check for church staff and volunteers working with children.
- Lynn Blankenship, Director of CCMC, will be speaker at the March Family Night Supper.



He wants to stay at Vera Lloyd after he graduates next spring and go to UAM or UAPB. He's interested in graphic design and social work, but doesn't know which he'll pursue yet. He's still finding his way. At Vera Lloyd, he has a safe home, the opportunity to plan for his future and the support to make a reality.

WHAT IS CENTS-ABILITY? At family night suppers, have you noticed the juice glasses with a "2 cents a meal" cardboard sign attached? I've seen them for years and have put some spare change in the glass every now and then. Well now that I'm the PW treasurer and received a flyer from the Cents-ability program seeking donations, I decided to check it out.

The "Two Cents a Meal" began in 1976 as a project to involve individuals to the needs of world hunger. This is an international as well as national ministry to help end hunger. Organizations can submit a grant on how they are going to assist in this process and that is what our money goes toward. To me it appears very similar to the Heifer Project, except people are responsible for planning, growing, and cultivating their own food or for food banks.

Being the PW treasurer I figured out how little this program is asking from each person.

2 cents a meal times 3 a day= 6 cents 6 cents a day times 30 days= \$1.80 Round that to the nearest dollar and it's \$2.00 a month

Please think about this when looking at that glass on YOUR table. Won't you donate \$2.00 a month to help others start growing their own food and take a bite out of hunger?

PS- We can take checks for the year if you want.  $2.00 \times 12 = 24.00$
