President's Message



Hello fellow OSCG members,

Officially, it's still spring, but the Florida rainy season is upon us. This is a time when we must stay vigilant in watching the growth of our orchids. Plants are growing fast with the warmer and longer days, but so are the bugs, weeds. snails, and microscopic fungi and bacteria. Yikes, we have so much to watch for! But, by inspecting our plants on a frequent (at least daily) basis, we can stay ahead of any pest or pathogen or at least catch them in an early phase of infestation.

Because of the Auction, there will be no Beginner's Class, Show and Tell, and Silent Auction this month.

At this time of year, it's important to eradicate a problem as soon as you find it. Do not be afraid to use fungicides or insecticides if you spot a problem. Isolate an infested plant and treat it appropriately. But don't forget to go back to your bench and treat all the neighboring plants too. Creepy crawlies know no boundaries.

This month is our annual auction. You've heard it before, but I'm going to repeat it because it is such an important message. This is our most important fundraising event of the year. The monies collected from our auction cover the lion's share of expenses we incur each year, including our monthly meetings and wonderful Holiday Party.

Tropical Orchid Bees Newest South Florida Immigrants

Melana and I found, up to five, metallic, iridescent green bees buzzing around one of our Encyclias this week. We all know the Encyclias are very fragrant and attract pollinators, but this was a first. In this case, it was the irresistible fragrance of E. Cindy (E. tampense x E. alata) that attracted the bees. They hovered near and about the inflorescence before lighting on a flower. But rather than seek the nectar at the base of the column, these bees scraped the surface of the sepals and petals. We noticed that they spent a majority of time working on the back side of the flowers. Is this where the perfume is most concentrated?

Native to Central America, *Euglossa viridissima*, are known to collect fragrances from at least eleven genera of orchids. But sitings in Florida have been steadily increasing since 2005. The USDA believes the bees were introduced around Broward County around that time. Since then the insects have been spreading throughout central and south Florida. So don't "bee" surprised if you find one of these iridescent insects buzzing about your Encyclias.

The Orchid Bee, *Euglossa viridissima*, gets its common name from its preoccupation with fragrant flowers, especially orchids. In addition to feeding on sweet nectar, male orchid bees devote a considerable amount of time and energy collecting volatile compounds produced in fungus-infested wood, rotting vegetation, and specialized "perfume" flowers in Orchidaceae, Araceae, and a few other families. The fragrances are kept in hind legs pouches that are uniquely modified for their storage, and are, most likely, used for attracting a female bee.

These are pictures I took of the bees busy in our shadehouse. They were fairly easy to photograph, as they didn't seem very afraid of me. In fact, as I stood there, they would occasionally fly fairly close and stare at me for a time, before flying back to the flowers.

June in Your Orchid Collection - by Dr. Martin Motes

Tasks for June

- 1. Careful watering this month often means no watering at all. Arise early to enjoy the cool and water only when truly necessary.
- 2. Space plants amply. Good air circulation is essential across the coming months.
- 3. Re-pot Phals and re-set Vandas. Make sure that plants are firmly set in their new abodes.
- 4. Begin or continue a disease prevention program with the prophylactic application of Thiophanate Methyl (Cleary's 3336) and Alliette or Banrot.
- 5. Clean up growing area and plants. Remove dead leaves from plants and the ground. Pull weeds.
- 6. Prune trees and shrubs to increase light and air circulation.
- 7. Apply snail bait lightly early in the month and again lightly mid-month
- 8. Set air conditioning thermostat at 80 and enjoy living in the Tropics.

The rainy season has gotten off to a roaring start! Disease pressure on our plants has also been jump started by more than double the typical rainfall for May. The early onset and intense duration of the rain place the early advantage with the pathogens that will inevitably be problematic later in the season.

Extra care should be taken to allow our orchids to dry thoroughly before watering. The occasional hard drying which is advocated in July and August would be appropriate this year in June. If a dry patch presents itself in the next few weeks, allow your plants to dry somewhat beyond where you normally would. Such hard drying will staunch some of the progress of the fungi.

This is also a year in which the preventive spray program is more important than ever. Remember correct identification of pathogens is crucial to their control. If in doubt consult your County agent or review the pictures in Florida Vanda Growing.

With two named storms before the official beginning of hurricane season, this might be a year to consider pruning your trees early. In addition to storm-proofing, the extra light and air movement will also be a great boon to quelling the disease pressure of an extra rainy, rainy season.

With day after day of rain, snails can transverse vast distances. Remember snail bait dissolves in the same heavy rains which provide passage for your neighbor's snails to your orchid collection. They canreappear as soon as 7-10 days. Be diligent in your applications.


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
