Rhododendron and Azalea Flower Show at Jenkins Arboretum Sunday, May 10 (Mother's Day)

We're looking forward to our 7th year of the joint Greater Philadelphia and Valley Forge
Chapters combined flower/truss show competition and the 21st year of VF chapter's show. To make this the stunning and highly educational juried display that it has been in previous years, members of all area chapters are again encouraged to bring entries. We will

begin accepting entries at 7:30 am on the upper level of the education center at Jenkins. Entries must be in by 10:15 am, and judging will begin at 10:30. The show will be open to the public from 1-5pm that day.

Help will be available, especially to those who haven't entered before—so don't be hesitant. Classification lists will be available on the VFARS website www.valleyforgears.org.

ENTRY RULES

- 1. There is no registration fee.
- 2. All entries must be received at the show passing table between 7:30 and 10:15 a.m. on Sunday. Entries offered after 10:15 a.m. will be assigned to the conversation table and are not eligible for judging.
- 3. All entries must be from plants grown outdoors in the garden for no less than 6 months.
- 4. Only one entry of a variety may be made in each section by any member or family. However, any number of different varieties may be entered in a section.
- 5. Elepidote rhododendron entries shall be a single bud truss with preferably no more than 3 unopened flowers.
- 6. Azalea, azaleodendron and lepidote rhododendron entries shall be either a single stemmed spray or a single or multiple truss measuring not more than 14 inches in width and height above the container.
- 7. Classes 1 through 8 and 10 are for cut bloom entries only. Wedges may be used for staging entries. Display containers will be provided.
- 8. A specimen plant may be one that is grown in a container or one that is garden grown and is dug and placed in a container, to be supplied by exhibitor. Size limit: 30" in width and 48" in height above soil.
- 9. Exhibitors must complete an entry tag for each entry. Tags will be available at the show; the Show committee will assist as needed. Use a

- pencil or a waterproof pen to fill out your tag, both top and bottom parts. Enter your name (address labels appropriate) and other information ahead of time. For plants grown from ARS Seed Exchange seed, lot number, year listed and name of seed contributor must be stated.
- 10. Any hybrid that is named, though not necessarily registered, and has not been exhibited in a V.F. Chapter show (i.e., is not on the current classification lists) may be entered in Class 7 but should have an appropriate permanent classification number. If necessary, confer with classification committee.
- 11. All entries should be properly groomed and conditioned. Artificial shine cannot be used on foliage. Leaf margins cannot be trimmed. Refer to CUTTING TRUSSES FOR SHOW on back page.
- 12. Classification and placement will be by the Show Committee. A class or section may be subdivided when deemed appropriate.
- 13. Judging will start at 10:45 a.m. Only the show and clerk's chairmen and judges and clerks are allowed in the exhibit area during judging.
- 14. Judges, at their discretion, may award ribbons for first, second and third places in each section. Honorable Mention will be awarded when appropriate. Any award can be omitted. Two or more of second or lower awards may be awarded.
- 15. The show will be open to the public from 1 to 5 p.m. Exhibits, but not trophies and ribbons, may be claimed at the close of the show on Sunday. The Committee will dispose of exhibits not claimed.



Directions: From Valley Forge: From US 202, take N Valley Forge Rd. South 2.6 miles. Turn left onto Conestoga Rd. Go .9 miles to US 30. Turn left onto US 30 East. Go .4 miles to Conestoga Rd. Turn right onto Conestoga Rd. Go 1.3 miles to Church Rd. Turn right on Church Rd. Go .6 miles to Chanticleer.

From I 476 (Blue Route: Take exit 13 (US 30). Go West on US 30 .4 miles. Turn left on S Radnor Chester Rd. Go .6 miles to Conestoga Rd. Turn right on Conestoga Rd. Go 1.3 miles to Church Rd. Turn right on Church Rd. Go .6 miles to Chanticleer.

A 55-acre natural historic landscape in the historic Germantown section of Phila.



2. Barnes Foundation

A 12-acre arboretum with over 3,000 species of woody plants and trees in Merion, PA.



3. Bartram's Garden

The oldest botanic garden in America on the west bank of the Schuylkill, 46 acres. Phila.



4. Barton Arboretum

Over 200 acres near Medford, NJ, including a nature preserve and gardens.



5. Bowman's Hill

A 134-acre wildflower preserve in Bucks County near New Hope, PA.



6. Brandywine River Museum

Brandywine Conservancy's Wildflower and Native Plant Gardens at Chadds Ford, PA.



7. Cabrini College Campus

A 112-acre estate in Radnor landscaped by Frederick Law Olmsted in the early 1900's.



8. Camden Children's Garden

A garden-based theme park adjacent to the Camden Aquarium near the RiverLink.



9. Centennial Arboretum

27 acres in Fairmont Park near the Horticultural Center with gardens and ponds, Phila.



10. Chanticleer

This former 47-acre estate in Wayne is now one of the premier gardens in the US.

15. <u>Highlands Mansion/Garden</u> 44-acre country estate with a mansion and a 2-acre formal garden in Whitemarsh, PA.



16. Hortulus Farm Garden
100-acre 18th century nursery
and farmstead with 30 acres of
gardens in Bucks County.



17. <u>Jenkins Arboretum</u>
46 acres of native trees in
Devon, PA, featuring collections
of rhododendrons and azaleas.



18. <u>Longwood Gardens</u>
World famous du Pont 926-acre
gardens and conservatory near
Kennett Square, PA.



19. Morris Arboretum
University of Pennsylvania's 92-acre garden and arboretum in the Chestnut Hill section, Phila.



20. Mt. Cuba Center 500 acres devoted to native plants with 50 acres of display gardens near Wilmington, DE.

Dating to 1690, **Wyck** is one of Philadelphia's oldest houses, although the original log structure is gone.

Bartram's garden is America's oldest botanical garden going back to 1730.




21. Nemours Mansion/Gardens

3,000-acre du Pont estate and formal gardens with fountains in Wilmington, DE.



22. Philadelphia Zoo

America's first zoo, a 42-acre Victorian garden, is home to more than 1300 animals.



23. Scott Arboretum

300 acres on the Swarthmore College Campus with 4,000 kinds of ornamental plants.



24. Shofuso Japanese Garden

In West Fairmont Park with a 1.2 acre traditional hill-and-pond garden and teahouse.



25. Temple University Ambler

187-acre arboretum/campus of the former PA School of Horticulture for Women.



26. Tyler Arboretum

650 acres near Media, PA, with botanical collections created by Dr. Wister & many trails.



27. Tyler Formal Gardens

On an acre at the Bucks County Comm. College are 4-tier classical gardens.



28. Welkinweir

A 197-acres of native plants featuring a 55-acre arboretum in Northern Chester County, PA.



29. Winterthur

Near Wilmington, DE, its 60-acre naturalistic garden is among America's best.



30. Wyck Rose Garden

In Germantown, from the 1820's. It is the oldest original rose garden in America.

Chanticleer and Longwood are considered among America's best public botanical gardens.

From A Guide for the Hungry Gardener:

Fail Proof Quiche

10-inch piecrust

4 to 6 slices bacon, cooked crisp & crumbled

½ lb. grated Swiss cheese

3/4 Cup grated Parmesan or Romano cheese

1 Tablespoon chives, chopped

 $^{1}/_{8}$ + teaspoon nutmeg

½ teaspoon salt

4 eggs, lightly beaten

1 ³/₄ Cup evaporated mild

Bake crust 10 minutes at 350°.

Sprinkle crumbled bacon into shell.

Spread Swiss cheese over the bacon.

Mix remaining ingredients and pour over bacon and cheese.

Bake 350° for 40 to 60 minutes or until set. Serves 6 to 8.
