REFLECTION

Call To A Deeper Level

Last week's gospel stopped short with Jesus' interpretation of the prophetic passage read during the synagogue service. This week we see the shocking reaction of those who heard Jesus' words.

In our moments of fervor we might wholeheartedly answer yes to the word of God, but in reality that yes is seldom uncomplicated. Even those who heard Jesus were first amazed at his words but then later sought to throw him off a cliff. They turned quickly from their initial appreciation of him. Their acceptance was shallow. So many times we behave in ways we wish we would not, or what we want to do we fail to accomplish. In other situations we might stand in awe of others and yet turn against them.

Our motives and our reactions are generally quite complicated, even if our desires to be faithful are straightforward. Despite the struggles that accompany the proclamation of God's word, despite the misunderstanding it might cause, the word of God cannot be silenced. Neither Jeremiah nor Jesus recoiled from the implications of their call, regardless of the resistance they experienced. Instead, they entered even more deeply into the call to love. Lest he brood over his injuries, Jeremiah is reassured of God's protection. And, without aggressively demonstrating his strength when he was threatened with harm, Jesus exhibited patience and kindness. Both men bore and endured their bitter misfortunes. This is the image placed before us as an example for us to follow.

The proclamation of the Good News, through our imperfect lives, words, and deeds, is a testimony to God's grace working in our lives. Familiar prophets, whose pasts make us wonder about their right to preach, are in fact witnesses of God's healing grace, transforming those among us with checkered pasts into witnesses of the Gospel.
