Diagnosis in the DSM-5

Where we've been, where we are, and where we're going

The DSM-III/IV era has witnessed significant advances in research on psychopathology and clinical intervention. Although the purpose of psychiatric diagnosis is to provide a bridge between people's problems and effective treatments, this link has been underdeveloped for a variety of historical, theoretical, scientific, and practical reasons. In this three part workshop, Dr. Hopwood will review changes in the diagnosis of psychopathology from the DSM-IV to DSM-5 in the context of broader historical and theoretical issues of diagnosis. In addition to focusing on concrete differences in diagnostic criteria across editions of the DSM. Dr. Hopwood will also highlight empirical evidence for these changes. Furthermore, research suggesting the need for more dramatic changes to how psychopathology is organized and diagnosed in future editions of the manual will be reviewed, with an emphasis on the potential for the further enhancement of clinical utility. Throughout the workshop, connections will be made to day to day practice in the consulting room.

Learning objectives:

- Understand current focal debates about diagnosis in the context of broad historical, theoretical, and empirical issues in mental health.
- Recognize the strengths, weaknesses, and potential contributions of various theoretical models to contemporary diagnostic practice.
- Provide the basis for considering the proposed changes in the DSM-5 in the broader context of these historical themes and findings from basic psychopathology research.
- Understand the process of the DSM-5.
- Become familiar with changes to the organization and implementation of DSM-5.

- Describe specific changes to diagnostic criteria for DSM-5 disorders, review the empirical basis for these changes, and consider the implications of these changes for practice.
- Consider the limitations of the DSM-5 for clinical practice.
- Orient to the direction that empirical research suggests for future editions of the DSM.
- Develop the ability to use integrative models of personality and psychopathology to better understand patients, organize assessment data, and implement interventions.

Speaker

Christopher J. Hopwood, Ph.D. is an

assistant professor of clinical psychology at Michigan State University, licensed clinical psychologist in the state of Michigan, and Director of the Michigan State University Psychological Clinic. He received his PhD from Texas A&M University and completed his clinical internship at Massachusetts General Hospital/Harvard Medical School. Dr. Hopwood was the recipient of the Samuel J. Beck Early Career Award from the Society for Personality Assessment. He has published 2 books and over 100 journal articles and book chapters on personality, assessment, psychopathology, and interpersonal processes. He is currently an Associate Editor of the Journal of Personality Disorders and the Journal of Personality Assessment, a Consulting Editor for a number of other journals, and a board member of the Society for Interpersonal Theory and Research and the National Association for the Scientific Study of Personality Disorders.
