

Obituaries

Bruce Parker 1913 - 2006

Bruce was born in Basle Switzerland in 1913 before coming to this country in 1918 to live in Torquay. Bruce was involved with Torquay Baptist Church joining the BB in 1926 as a founder member of the 1st Torquay BB Company. It was here he met and married his wife Dora who was from Plymouth. He served his time as an apprentice Jeweller and down the years carried on mending watches and clocks on a private basis.

In 1938 the family moved to Gloucester where Bruce worked for Dowty Rotol and during the Second World War he was involved with the production of Spitfires. At this time he joined Trinity Baptist Church on Finlay Road and eventually became involved with the BB again with the 1st Gloucester Company.

Bruce's involvement with The Boys' Brigade in Gloucestershire started again in 1972 when he called in to see how 7th Gloucester were getting on and his involvement carried on with him being a Vice President of 1st Stonehouse Company, President of the 8th Gloucester and 1st Ebley Companies and a Warrant officer in the 5th Gloucester Company. Also Bruce was an Honorary Vice President of the Gloucestershire Battalion and throughout his time visited most companies in the Battalion helping by taking devotions etc.

As company captain of the 5th Gloucester I will always remember Bruce for one word "STICKABILITY" which I believe he used in all the companies he visited. His message was that it was important that you were able to stick at whatever you do in Life and this was something he did with his time at BB from his early days with 1st Torquay right up to the time he was unable to carry on with his visits to the companies of the Gloucestershire Battalion. When you mention Bruce's name to any of the boys he came into contact with they will all come out with the word.

Mrs Win Wrightson, 8th Jan1919 – 10th Jan 2007

Mrs Win Wrightson, a keen servant of The Boys' Brigade and widow of Jack, a former warden of Broadleas, passed away peacefully on Wed 10th Jan 07 aged 88. Originally involved in The Boys' Brigade as an Officer in 1st Trowbridge Company from the late '60s, she later moved with her husband Jack to become the wardens of the West of England Outdoor Centre at Broadleas, Haytor in the late '70s. Remaining at Haytor until the early '90s, she was actively involved in all activities run at the Centre whilst also playing a major part in local life. A keen "Letterboxer", she and Jack had a number of boxes positioned on the Moor, and also collected hundreds of stamps during their many miles of walking in their time at Haytor.

Widowed in 2002, she spent her final years in Bovey Tracey with steadily worsening health.



Report from 1st Malvern (the most northerly company)

The present session (2006/7) is proceeding very well with numbers steady overall at about 45 on the roll with 19 Officers and helpers active. We have now been joined by Kok Siong Lim from Malaysia, who started and ran a BB Company out there. We have retained the services of 6 Junior Officers promoted from the Company Section and they are currently employed on an occasional basis.

We are well supported in prayer and material needs. In particular there are 30 young men in the Company Section from private up to Staff Sergeant (i.e. the 11 to 17 age group). Currently the Junior Section has 15 Boys on the roll. We do not have an Anchor Boy Section as towards the end of the last session we were down to only 2 members with no reinforcements on the horizon. In order to economise on staff therefore the 2 survivors were elevated and staff absorbed into the Junior Section. We now take rising 7's into the Junior Section.

We continue to have 4 squads in Company Section, each with a Sergeant in charge. We have tried now for the last few years to better employ the NCO's to encourage the older Boy and to permit better supervision of all activities by Officer. Several NCO's courses have been held and this does seem to have improved their input.

Junior Section meets at the same time as the Company Section although they leave at 20.30 hours. There are 3 Squads and an active games and badge programme is run. NCO's from the Company Section assist as part of their awards requirements.

Canteen talks from the officers form part of the Friday Bible Class programme along with opening and closing payers. It is true to say that a number of the Boys in the Company come from a Christian home and several have made commitments within their own traditions. However the continuing outreach to the Company Section Boys is a continuing area for prayer. Battalion camp, which provides a real challenge to the Boy's faith, is to be held at Newquay this year from 21 to 28 July.

Notable Happenings

- 10 Boys and 3 Officers represented the Brigade at the Lord Mayors Show in November – 10 in the London Massed Bands and 3 in the London Stedfast Band – an exhilarating experience.
- Company Section Beat 11th Northampton at Football by 7 goals to 2 in October. Return match is away on the 27 January.
- Company Section won Battalion Master Team & Bible Quiz, Outdoor sports trophy and Chess.
- Company Band won the Potters Trophy for best novice band in the National Championships.
- Company Band participated in 1st Tewkesbury's 50th Anniversary Church Parade.

- Company Band led the RBL Remembrance Parade in Malvern and the Bugle Corps sounded Last Post and Reveille.
- Company section chess team has reached the quarter finals of the National Competition.
- 25 Company members attended Battalion summer camp at Exmouth from 22 to 29 July.
- This session saw 5 Presidents Badges and 5 Queens Badges awarded also 6 DEAS Bronze, 9 Silver Award and 6 Gold DEAS awards.
- Night Exercise on the Malvern Hills was enjoyed and we were joined by members of the 1st Charlton Kings.
- Three band members went on the NW of England tour with the London Massed Bands in October.
- Gold Expedition DEAS Boys cycled 183 Miles over 4 days with a total climb of 15,000 feet or 12 times the height of the Malvern's.
- 4 NCO's completed their KGVI Course and 3 have remained signed on as Warrant Officers.

Congratulations on the 7th Bristol's 25th Anniversary and on the imaginative events organised to mark the occasion. Having been a member of the original 7th Bristol Company between 1941 and 1962 it is great to know that the 7th is still going strong.

The company was formed in 1891 at Wesley Chapel, Baptist Mills – George 'Boss' Parsons was the Captain for 38 years. He was followed by W. C. 'Bill' Stenner until Bill was called up for war service in the RAF. Ernest W. Byrt was the war time Captain. Bill resumed the captaincy on his return until I became Captain from 1952 until 1962 when I moved to Exeter.

During my time in the 7th we always claimed to be the oldest company in the Bristol Battalion, the original 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th companies having dropped out at some stage. If my memory serves me correctly all the numbers were re-allocated and companies were functioning. Sadly, Wesley Chapel was a 'victim' of the continuation of the M32 into the city centre and closed sometime in the 1970's.

During my term of office as District President (1983-6) it was my privilege to be at Holy Trinity when the Lord Mayor of Bristol presented the Brigade President's Commendation certificate to Matthew Dart.

I'm not sure how much of a gap there was between the closure of the original and the formation of the present 7th, but we can claim up to 115 years of service to Boys in the Baptist Mills and Stapleton districts of Bristol. **Frank Flook**
