All market beef must be weighed and eartagged on this date, **NO EXCEPTIONS**.

- ♦ 4-H/FFA members must be enrolled in the market beef project by 3:00 p.m., on Friday, January 2nd to be eligible to eartag their animals.
- If you have a loan on your project animal from anyone other than a family member, you need to specify who your loan is with.
- Bring a copy of your title from the Brand Inspector. NOTE: Whoever is listed on the brand inspection title is the legal owner of the animal. It is the seller's obligation to contact the brand inspector and have the animal(s) inspected. If the animal is home raised, you will be issued a title that day.
- ♦ \$5.00 per animal tagging fee.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

The 4-H Quality Assurance (QA) Course teaches youth about the quality of meat and food products that come from livestock. Quality assurance for livestock producers means making a promise to the consumers from food production animals. Quality assurance is a pledge or promise to:

- provide a food animal product preferred by consumers, and
- 2. provide a safe, wholesome food animal product. Food animals are those whose products (meat, milk, and eggs) have the potential to become part of the food chain.

The promise made is that products from livestock will be the highest possible quality and 4-H/FFA youth producers will do everything possible to make these products safe to eat and that our sale is of the highest quality.

Requirements for Sale eligibility:

- ▶ All FFA (13 and younger), Junior and Intermediate 4-Her's will be required to take **one** QA clinic each year to sell an animal(s) in the Natrona County Jr. Livestock Sale at the Central Wyoming Fair.
- ► FFA & Senior members (ages 14- 19) will be required to take one year of QA education to sell an animal(s) in the Natrona County Livestock Sale at the Central Wyoming Fair. If the first year of a livestock project is taken as a Senior, the QA clinic must be taken that same year.

If you are unable to attend one of the three scheduled Natrona County QA clinics, it will be the responsibility of the individual to find and take a QA clinic in another county and bring proof of that Quality Assurance Clinic to the 4-H office. Check with the 4-H office if in doubt whether another county's program or private event will count toward this requirement.

NOTE: In lieu of the 3 clinic requirement for livestock exhibitors, we have streamlined the process so that 4-H/FFA youth can take one QA clinic which will complete the requirement each year.

Clover Corner

Hot Chocolate Mug Craft


This hot chocolate craft is incredibly easy to do (especially with our provided mug template) and the best part is that your child gets to paint with real chocolate syrup! It is almost impossible to do this cute winter craft without making a real mug of hot chocolate or at the very least a glass of chocolate milk!

What you'll need:

- Light weight cardboard (we used an empty cereal box) or cardstock
- Paint
- Paint brushes
- Chocolate syrup
- Small marshmallows or white pom-poms
- Stickers
- Mug template

How to make your Hot Chocolate Mug Craft

- Print our mug template and cut it out. Trace it onto a piece of cardboard and cut that out.
- Paint the mug any color you would like and set aside to dry.
- When dry, Draw a semi-circle at the top of the mug. This is where you will paint in the chocolate. Have your child decorate the rest of the mug using stickers or markers.
- Paint on a heavy layer of chocolate syrup at the top of the mug. We found that a dabbing motion made the smoothest effect.
- While the chocolate is still wet, add the marshmallows or pom-poms to it (no need for glue). Let dry and then display!








Character Counts Trustworthiness

What does it mean to be Trustworthy?

People will trust a person who has a reputation of being honest, reliable and responsible. Dishonesty can easily tarnish that reputation, such that others consider you untrustworthy. Being considered trustworthy provides benefits from the way people deal with you, as well as your own self-esteem.

Trust in another people has several meanings:

- Trust means that you feel that the person is honest and will not lie, cheat or steal from you.
- It also means that you can count on the person to do as he or she promised and that the person is reliable.

Finally, trust in a person means that you feel he or she can be counted on to do something important, will not shirk from duties, and will take personal pride in what he or she does.


You're trustworthy when:

Trustworthiness:

involves four major qualities:

- Integrity: the idea of a moral wholeness, or oneness, demonstrated by a consistency of thoughts, words, deeds, and duties.
- Honesty: means that a person doesn't do things that are morally wrong.
 If something you do is breaking the law or you have to hide it because you'll get in trouble, you are probably not being honest.
- Promise-keeping: A man is only as good as his word
- 4. Loyalty: standing with and behind someone in need. Loyal friends share both triumphs and trauma, and offer honest, constructive feedback delivered in a kind and tactful manner.
