As I write this article for the *Moving Church News*, I have been aware these last couple of weeks of a distinct chill in the air, in the early mornings and evenings. The evenings are drawing in and the days are getting shorter, and one is reminded that Autumn is well and truly here.

Autumn I have to say is my favourite season, (although by January I have had enough of the long dark days) and as I walk in the local countryside with Nelson, I love seeing the trees changing colours, the conkers that fall to the floor from Horse Chestnut Trees, the berries, and also the different varieties of fungi that flourish in the cool damp autumn air.

Not only is there a change in nature's season, but there is also a change in the Church's year, after the long period, which is known as 'Trinity.' Suddenly there is an expectation as we look to celebrate Harvest Festival, All Souls Day, All Saints Day, Remembrance Sunday, and then the beginning of Advent.

Many adults and children will be looking forward to celebrating Halloween. Through the ages, there have been many rituals associated with the return of the winter. For example in the past burning barrels were carried through towns and villages and hurled into rivers and lakes to imitate the failing of the sun. Halloween is also an autumn festival, in that apples feature a lot in games as well as toffee apples being a favourite Halloween treat. Pumpkins also come into season at this time of year, and are often turned into pumpkin lanterns.

Children love to dress up, and go out 'trick or treating.'

Many of the traditions of Halloween also go back to a time when there was a much stronger belief in the powers of good and evil, and were about warding off evil spirits. Christianity has a strong belief in the reality of evil, but also of a stronger good in the person of Christ. We believe that Christ is the Light of the World, and that his light and love are stronger than any evil.

Which is why over the weekend of Friday 31st October-2nd November St. Mark's is holding a 'Darkness to Light' Event.

This will begin with Messy Church on the Friday morning (10.30am). The theme of Messy Church will be about Christ's light shining in the darkness. In the evening the church will be open, with refreshments available. (Hot Dogs and hot drinks.)

The Church be will be lit by candlelight, and there will be stands with posters, and information of how Christ's light shines in our world today.

The 'Darkness to Light' theme will be reflected in events and Services throughout the weekend. On Saturday 1st November to celebrate All Saints Day, which is when the Church gives thanks for Saints who have inspired the Church through the ages, we will be having a Parish Dinner. For this occasion we have a Christian Magician to entertain us.

On Sunday 2nd of November, our monthly 'Explore Service' will be following the theme of 'Darkness to Light'. In the afternoon, we will be holding our Annual All Souls' service. This is the service in which we invite people to come and remember those who have died. People are invited to bring a flower and lay them in front of the altar, and then light a candle. A small act, but in so doing we remember that those who have died, but who are now in the presence of God's eternal light.

It is hoped that as many of our congregation will come and support this event, and that others who live in our parish will join us for this festival, as we reflect on the love of God and his initiative in saving the world from evil and how he transforms situations and individuals by the light and love of Christ.

Other special events and services, that will be taking place over the next couple of months include our Harvest Festival Service, which is followed by a Harvest Lunch. Harvest is a time when we give thanks for all that God provides for us. In the Old Testament in the book of the Prophet Joel, are written the words;

Rejoice in the Lord your God, for he has given you
The autumn rains in righteousness.
He sends you abundant showers,
both autumn and spring rains ,as before.
The threshing- floors will be filled with grain;

Joel. 2. 23-24

The vats will overflow with new wine and oil.

We will once again this Harvest be collecting shoeboxes, which will be sent to Romania in November, which will be distributed to families and children in schools, by teams from the Biggin Hill Romania Group.

Another important event that will be happening on October 12th at **4.00pm** is the Launch Service, of the 'Biggin Hill, Hayes and Keston Cluster.' The three Churches of the our villages have made a commitment to work together,in the future. A special celebratory service has been organized, which will involve members of all three Churches

We have also planned a joint Confirmation Course in the spring. There will be more details about the course in the next edition of Moving Church News.

As the nights draw in, it is good to reflect on the Light of Christ shining in the darkness, in the words from John's Gospel.

'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life'

A CHORISTER'S STORY

"Oh dear, we'll never get them all in!" said my mother.

We were in St. Mark's Church one Sunday morning in 1952,

Not our beautiful modern St. Mark's with its fascinating history, but the "tin tabernacle" on the opposite side of the Main (then



Westerham) Road. We had moved to Biggin Hill from Hayes in 1950; my parents were "down-sizing" and in search of a bigger garden.

My mother was worrying about my forthcoming wedding and the number of friends and relatives expected to attend. So my wedding took place in St. Mary's, Hayes, where we had regularly attended for many years.

However, some six years later we (husband, children, cat and me) had moved back to Biggin Hill to be nearer my parents. It was 1958 and I was delighted to become part of this bustling, thriving new Church family.

When my son Andrew was 8 he joined the Church choir and daughter Alison followed him a short while later, both enjoying singing and music generally. All went well until Andrew's voice "broke" and he launched into secondary school. Knowing that

Alison might not want to stay in the Choir without her big brother, I joined to keep her company For a long time, until Alison went to University we sang in the Choir together whenever possible.

My attendance in the Choir has not been continuous; another son arrived and other family commitments took me away from time to time, but over the years it has been my joy and privilege to take part in services. From the heydays when the Choir numbered in the twenties, (men, women and children) for Sunday morning Eucharist and Evensong, to the present time when we struggle to maintain half that number, singing has remained a valued part of my life.

DANCING IN THE BREEZE

The eruption of bulbs through the soil surface at any time of the year and the gentle way they move provocatively in the slightest of breeze always brings a smile. Winter in particular, especially if the winter is harsh, brings joy and relief, knowing that spring is not too far away.

Bulbs are a general term used that we generally group together, but botanically they differ. Bulbs such as Narcissus (daffodils) have a short stem with fleshy leaves or leaf basis that function as food storage organs during dormancy. Corms, rhizomes and tubers are underground organs. Crocus is a solid, swollen stem whose scales have been reduced to a dry leaf like covering. A rhizome is a specialised stem which grows horizontally at or just below the soil surface and a tuber is an enlarged portion of an underground stem like potato tubers which has nodes that produce buds.

Bulbs can provide colour throughout the year and are available from late August through to November. This time of year it is spring flowering bulbs available with a small amount of autumn flowering bulbs that need attention.

Flowering now are short perennials that have flowered earlier in the summer such as Alchemila and Geraniums, pink or white goblet shaped flowers of the colchicum or 'Naked Ladies'. Plant them just below the surface in late August and early September, or you can have them flowering in just a saucer of water and enjoy them indoors.

When growing bulbs, there are a few simple rules, plant the bulb twice its depth, especially Narcissus and Tulip, they will benefit being planted deeper. Also plant Tulips later than other bulbs, preferably in November, as they prefer colder conditions to perform, compared to other bulbs. There are some exceptions to planting depths, both Cyclaman and Nerines like to be planted just under the soil, in fact they liked to be baked by the summer sun. Some bulbs also prefer good drainage and moisture especially during summer when they are building up reserves ready to flower the following spring.

There are a few pests and diseases: everybody knows Lily Beetle and slugs that devour Lilies but also keep an eye out for Narcissus fly larvae that burrow into the neck of the bulbs and eelworms, microscopic worms that eventually stunt the growth of the plant. Tulip fire, a fungal disease, producing brown spots and twisted withered and distorted leaves, as if they have been scorched by fire. Discard them, but don't put in compost heap as the spores will be with you for some time

Bulb foliage can sometimes look untidy at the end of the flowering period but to allow them to die down naturally, do not tie them in knots or cut the

foliage. Bulbs need a minimum of six weeks once the plant has flowered to allow nutrients to return to the bulb for the following year. It would benefit by dressing the soil with a general fertiliser such as Bonemeal or Growmore, to give them an extra boost.

Bulbs are very adaptable, you can grow them in containers for static displays or place them around the garden in areas where it is looking a little drab or if you have no room to plant them in the ground during autumn, plant in containers and plant in the border later when the garden is just starting to wake up to give that instant effect.

After some years, bulbs tend not to flower so freely, they become congested and need splitting. Lift and split the clumps in early summer and replant them in your chosen areas at a similar depth to what they have been use to and they will flower their socks off once again.

There are miniature bulbs that have a delicate, jewel box charm that is hard to resist and tall bulbs that will rise majestically above other plants, so much to choose from, easy to grow, bulbs will accommodate everybody's taste.

Purchase some and be ready to be amazed how much they brighten up your day.

How?

Display of Posters

WINTER IS AN ETCHING, SPRING A WATERCOLOUR, SUMMER AN OIL PAINTING AND AUTUMN IS A MOSAIC OF THEM ALL

Misty, chilly mornings greet us in the sensory garden this time of year with heavy dew, the appearance of autumn colours, ruby gems of fruit and the visit of the cobweb fairy, lining everything with droplets of dew and a sprinkling of stardust, showing their intricate designs. The equinox has been and gone and the nights are sharply closing in. We can still get the odd warm, dry day to get out in the garden, however tidying up the border can be detrimental to some wildlife, as some plants can offer rich pickings as autumn approaches.

With the arrival of various hues as senescence starts to take hold of the plants, the picture changes once again in the sensory garden from shades of green to butter yellow, russets, purples and reds, a rich tapestry interspersed with fruits and late flowers, as if almost a second spring has arrived when every leaf is a flower.

The late flowers of the Aster, Sedum, Buddleia, Anemone, Verbena and many other flowers provide an important source of rich nectar for the bees and hoverflies this time of year. While the rich coloured berries adorn the many shrubs and trees in the garden they are almost ready for the autumn feast.

Having visited the garden recently, the trees and shrubs are full of fruit slowly ripening. The rich fruits of the elder which so many people use to make wine, will undoubtedly be loved by birds, while the crab apple, pear, hawthorn, dogwood, wild rose, honeysuckle and snowberry are dripping of fruit.

Whilst nearby, ivy is full in bud ready to burst into flower next month, almost the last flower to provide nectar when little else is available and is often full of bees, flies, hoverflies and late wasps before the chilly nights end their year. But it doesn't end there as the ivy provides a wonderful warm, safe and sheltered spot for many wildlife during winter.

The sensory garden shows its true colours this time of year, not only for the community, but the garden was designed to cater for wildlife, especially for this time of year. Important nectar, flower seed heads for the birds and fruit for the birds and other wildlife while providing shelter when the winter is harsh.

During October and November, Mine Shaw and Jugs Hill will host spectacular fungi as they erupt through the surface of the ground or on rotting wood, visit and see the delights or visit a fungi foray near you to understand the stories behind each one found. Also wood piles can be found in the undergrowth providing excellent safe havens for invertebrates, frogs and toads, while brambles with their last remains of fruit will also give shelter and food.

As we approach October and November and the autumnal equinox (officially the beginning of autumn when the twelve hours of daylight and twelve hours of night are equal) has passed in September, many people see winter as the end of the growing year. Yet many understand it is now the beginning of a new season. Nature aids the dispersal of their seed via animals, birds, wind, rain and humans. The weather will then break down their barriers and dormancy, ready for that seed to germinate the following spring. And the whole cycle starts again!

The Friends of Biggin Hill Parks are a vital and passionate group of people that care for their environment and their community, but we desperately need your help to maintain our environment around us in Biggin Hill. We meet every second Saturday of the month for a couple of hours to work at any of the three sites, sensory garden, Jugs Hill and Kings Road open space, but we need your help, even for an hour. Tasks we carry out are weeding, edging, litter picking, cutting down small tree saplings, pruning, sweeping, bulb planting and so on. Tools, rubbish bags etc are supplied.

Family Boxes and Christmas Shoeboxes

The Biggin Hill Romania Group usually collects about 2,000 Christmas shoeboxes each year to distribute in and around the area of Comanesti, Romania. If possible, we would love to collect even more, so that more youngsters

will benefit and receive these lovely gift-wrapped boxes that have been filled with presents. Family boxes are collected as well to distribute to poor and destitute families in the same area.

A list of items to go into the Shoeboxes and Family Boxes can be found in this magazine for you to tear out to attach to your box. For the Christmas shoeboxes, we usually have less boy boxes than girl boxes. To help with the distribution of the shoeboxes it is beneficial to have Unisex boxes that can be handed to either sex if we are short of boy or girl boxes. It would be really helpful if you are able to complete a Unisex box.

Please wrap the lid and base of the shoebox separately with Christmas wrapping paper, secure with two elastic bands and then tape the bottom part of the label to the top of the shoebox, not forgetting to indicate the age and sex the shoebox is intended for. The delivery went very smoothly last Christmas because the gift boxes were clearly labelled.

Three groups of volunteers will go to Romania in December, paying their own way, to distribute the boxes to the children and families, many of whom would not otherwise receive anything for Christmas. We are happy to show you photographs of the children and families receiving and opening their boxes on our return, or may be able to give a presentation to larger groups interested in seeing more.

These gifts bring tremendous joy to the children and families who receive them. They also bring them the assurance that they are loved and valued. Please help us to fill Comanesti once more with happy children and families by giving them not only the gift of a box but also the gift of hope and love.

You will probably read this after the Harvest Service in St Marks on Sunday 28th September when the boxes are being collected. If so, please just let us have them before 19th October.


