STUDENT PERSONNEL DECISION BY BOARD ON 2 APPEALS

<u>H1N1 UPDATE</u> – Ms. Shirley Chirch, Environmental Health and Safety Manager, provided information on the H1N1 virus, current absenteeism among students and staff, and future availability of vaccine.

<u>HUMAN RESOURCES HIRING PROCESS</u> – Ms. Juanita V. Smith, Director of Human Resources, provided data on the hiring process and procedures currently in use in Gloucester County Public Schools. (Copy of Flowchart — Hiring Process and Procedures attached to

minutes) She also reviewed profile data for each school in the division. **(Copy of profile data attached to minutes)** The Board discussed internal posting of job vacancy announcements, and members suggested that these notices be reworded to clarify who may apply for such positions.

<u>SUPPLEMENTAL PAY PLAN REVIEW</u> – Mr. Craig Smith, Employee Services & Communications, presented data compiled from a survey conducted regarding supplemental pay in Gloucester County Public Schools. He asked that the Board review the document for discussion at a subsequent meeting. (Copy of GCPS Compensation Survey – Supplements attached to minutes)

GOVERNOR'S PROPOSED BUDGET REDUCTIONS – Ms. Joanne Wright, Director of Budget and Finance, apprised the Board of the Governor's proposed budget reductions and the impact of those reductions on the upcoming budget.

Dr. Kiser discussed the feasibility of soliciting parental input on the school budget prior to the preparation of the FY'11 budget. Board members felt that this would be a good idea and suggested that this be pursued through the PTAs at each school. Individual Board members would be willing to attend PTA meetings with administrators to receive parent comments.

<u>DR. WRIGHT'S PRESENTATION ON ARRA MONIES</u> – Dr. Kiser reviewed highlights from a presentation made at the VASS conference by Dr. Patricia Wright, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Dr. Wright briefed the superintendents on State and Federal programs and potential 2010 legislative issues, and in particular, the effects of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)* on state and local funding.

<u>ELEMENTARY SCIENCE SCHEDULE</u> – Board members discussed with Dr. Kiser and staff their concerns regarding the elementary science schedule, the amount of time allotted for elementary science, and the issue of removing students from science classes for remediation in other areas. Dr. Kiser will discuss these concerns and review the science schedules with the elementary principals.

LETTER TO BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RE: PETSWORTH SEWER LIFT STATIONS — The Board received a recommended draft letter addressed to the Chair of the Board of Supervisors from the Chair of the School Board regarding the concerns over sewer lift stations at Petsworth Elementary School and funding for the repair of those stations. It was the consensus of the Board to submit the letter to Ms. Ressler, with a copy to be sent to Ms. Garton, other Board of Supervisors members, and Nikki Champion. (Copy of letter to Ms. Ressler from Ms. Burruss attached to minutes)

Board members were reminded of the Propane School Bus Dedication Ceremony to be held on Monday, October 26, at 10:00 at Page Middle School. The ceremony will be attended by Congressman Robert Wittman, Delegate Harvey Morgan and other dignitaries.

The boy's team accumulated enough points in each of the four categories that they won the over all tournament, for the second year in a row. On December 5&6 the boys' team will advance to the state tournament at JMU in Harrisonburg.
- The Page Goodwill Committee is sponsoring a Holiday Drive to assist the Henry Fork Service Center in Rocky Mount, VA.

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY NOTIFICATION

The Gloucester County school division recognizes the danger sex offenders pose to student safety. Therefore, to protect students while they travel to and from school, attend school or are at school-related activities, each school in the Gloucester County school division shall request electronic notification of the registration or reregistration of any sex offenders in the same or contiguous zip codes as the school. Such requests and notifications shall be made according to the procedure established by the Virginia Department of State Police (State Police).

Annual Notification

At the beginning of each school year, the Gloucester County school division shall notify parents and employees of this policy. The School Board will also annually notify the parent(s) of each student enrolled in the school division of the availability of information in the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry and the location of the Internet website.

Dissemination of Sex Offender Registry Information

Sex offender registry information should be provided to employees who are most likely to observe unauthorized persons on or near school property including, but not limited to, the following:

- · school bus drivers;
- · employees responsible for visitor registration;
- · employees responsible for bus duty;
- · security staff;
- · coaches:
- · playground supervisors; and,
- maintenance personnel.

The Gloucester County school division recognizes that it is the responsibility of local law enforcement to notify the community of potential public danger. Therefore, the division will not disseminate registry information to parents.

Use of Sex Offender Registry Information

Registry information shall only be used for the purposes of the administration of law enforcement, screening current or prospective school division employees or volunteers, and for the protection of school division students and employees. Registry information shall not be used to intimidate or harass others.

- Registered Sex Offender Sighted. If a notified employee sees a registered sex offender on or near school
 property, around any school division student, or attending any school division activity, the Superintendent or
 the designee shall be notified immediately. The Superintendent or his/her designee may, in his or her
 discretion, notify local law enforcement.
- 2. School Volunteers and Student Teachers. Each staff member shall submit to the principal the name and address of each volunteer the staff member proposes to use, as soon as the person is identified. The principal shall screen each student teacher and volunteer's name and address against the registry information. If a match is found, the principal shall notify the Superintendent, who shall confirm the match. If the match is confirmed, the Superintendent shall inform the individual, in writing, that he or she may not serve as a volunteer or student teacher. The notice shall provide the reason with reference to this policy, and, if applicable, Policy KNA. The Superintendent shall provide a copy of the notice to the Principal and staff member.
- 3. <u>Contractors' Employees</u>. In addition to ensuring that the certification requirements of Policy DJF Purchasing Procedures are met, the Superintendent shall include the following language in all Division contracts that may involve an employee of the contractor having any contact with a student:

The contractor shall not send any employee or agent who is a registered sex offender to any school building or school property. Monthly, the contractor shall check the registry to determine if any employee is registered.

4. <u>School Division Employees</u>. Each time sex offender registry information is received, the principal shall review it to determine if a school division employee is registered. If a match is found, the Superintendent shall confirm or disprove the match with local law enforcement. If the match is confirmed, the Superintendent shall notify the School Board. The School Board will take the appropriate action to comply with State law which may include termination of employment.

- 5. <u>Applicants for Employment</u>. Before hiring any person, the Superintendent shall determine whether the prospective employee is a registered sex offender. If the prospective employee is a registered sex offender, he or she shall not be hired by the division.
- 6. <u>Parents of Students</u>. When the school division learns that a parent of an enrolled student is a registered sex offender, the parent will be notified in writing that he or she is barred from being present at school or at school functions without the express written approval of the student's principal. Such approval must be obtained in advance of the proposed visit and will state the conditions under which the parent may be present. When a parent who is a registered sex offender is permitted at school or at school functions he or she will be monitored to ensure that he or she does not come into contact with any children other than his or her own children.

Adults who have been convicted of a sexually violent offense, as defined in Va. Code § 9.1-902, may be present at school during school hours or during school-related or school-sponsored activities only as provided in Policy KNA Violent Sex Offenders on School Property.

Other sex offender registrants who are the parents or guardians of a student, may be permitted to participate in appropriate parent or guardian activities, under appropriate supervision, unless prohibited by court order.

7. <u>Precautions to Protect Students</u>. When the Superintendent determines it is necessary, because of the presence of a registered sex offender, alternative arrangements may be made for bus and walking routes to and from school, recess and physical education periods, or any other activity in order to protect division students.

No adult who has been convicted of a sexually violent offense, as defined in Va. Code § 9.1-902, may enter or be present, during school hours, or during school-related or school-sponsored activities, at any school, unless

- he is a lawfully registered and qualified voter, and is coming upon such property solely for purposes of casting his vote;
- he is a student enrolled at the school; or
- he has obtained a court order allowing him to enter and be present upon such property, and is in compliance with terms and conditions of the order.

Persons who have been convicted of other sexual offenses may be permitted to be resent at school in certain circumstances in accordance with Policy KN Sex Offender a rejetry Notifical at .

<u>Lisa Willis, Math Teacher, Page Middle</u> - May 1-7, 2010 for a trip to Cairo, Egypt, for historical understanding of how the Egyptians: used their mathematical skills to achieve pyramids, taxation system, and method of measuring land; multiplied and divided by factors of 2; and how the "Eye of Horace" was used to denote fractions. Students will be able to use the aid of Egyptian mathematics to solve problems based on these examples: area/perimeter (land measuring), volume (pyramids), factors (multiplication and division), fractions ("Eye of Horace"), and patterns (taxation system). \$2500.00 estimated cost.

Purpose/Relevance of the trip:

To heighten the learning experience of our students through a historical understanding of how the Egyptians used their mathematical skills more than 5000 years ago to achieve the successes of their pyramids, their taxation system, and methods of measuring land. To learn how the Egyptians multiplied and divided by factors of 2, and to thoroughly learn how the use of the "Eye of Horace" was used to denote fractions.

To learn the Egyptian system of counting using hieroglyphics, and to be able to apply certain basic hieroglyphics towards a cultural, interactive learning experience that is based on our multiples of 10. These learning's will be culminated together to produce an international "out of the box" lesson intended to be taught over a selection of week(s).

Students will be able to use the aid of Egyptian mathematics to solve problems based on these examples: area/perimeter (land measuring), volume (pyramids), factors(multiplication and division), fractions (Eye of Horace), and patterns (taxation system).

Stephanie Sowers, Science Teacher, Peasley Middle – Visit a Costa Rican rain forest in Punta Mona with an ecological tour group designed specifically for educators in order to learn about the flora and fauna that will be used to teach SOL's. Travel will either be during Spring Break 2010 or June 2010, depending upon availability. Cost varies, depending upon length of trip and activities selected but asking for \$2500.00. If over that amount, teacher would pay the difference.

I would love to receive this grant in order to go to the rainforest and share the adventure with students, and possibly take students there one day. I went on a Chesapeake Bay Foundation trip for teachers to Port Isobel, in the Bay, and then took two groups of students out there to grow and learn from the experience. I will be able to learn about the flora and fauna of the rainforest and share the information as well as my love of learning with the students. As a Nationally Board Certified teacher I possess the skills necessary to successfully convey my experiences in the rainforest with my students through a variety of methods. As a life science teacher it will be easy to use this trip as a way to teach my SOLs. I would like to go with this tour group that specializes in student/teacher trips instead of striking out on my own because I would feel more secure. The rest of this proposal is quoted from their website. I believe I could pay for the whole trip with the \$2500 allotted. But if not I would pay the remaining balance myself. I have received grants from a variety of places over the years to build gardens behind my classrooms and a water feature to enhance student learning. These successful endeavors show that I will utilize Gloucester county's resources to benefit students. I plan to go on this trip either over spring break or in June depending on availability.

EcoClassroom creates experiences through which teachers and students can **personally connect with the natural wonders of the Earth,** as well as with some of the problems facing the rainforests. In addition, guests are introduced to solutions created to **preserve and sustainably develop tropical rainforest land.**

How much does all of this cost?

Our set itineraries range widely, depending on the length of your trip and the activities you choose, from rustic budget to high-end accomodations, from \$950 - \$1975, plus airfare (lately between \$600-800, though prices are coming down!). This includes all costs within Costa Rica: lodging, transportation, 3 meals per day plus snacks, a professional driver and bilingual guide(s) to accompany your group on the entire trip, local guides for certain activities, all entrance fees, equipment, and activities.

What will staying at Punta Mona be like?

We will hike through the Gandoca-Manzanillo Wildlife Refuge in order to arrive at our remote beachfront organic farm. At night, we will stay in one large bunkhouse as well as some smaller back houses equipped with mattresses for your comfort. Guests must bring there own bedding (see list of things to bring for more information). Remember, Punta Mona is a very rustic site most tourists to the country do not have the opportunity to visit. We will trade some modern amenities in exchange for the privilege to live so closely with nature. Remember that we will be sharing the forest surroundings with many creatures who sometimes like to poke around to check out who the guests are. This is a normal occurrence in any jungle lodge, and the folks in Punta Mona are looking for natural non-violent ways to keep these critters out. The site is equipped with running water, electricity generated from solar power, a full-service kitchen, and a sanitary composting toilet facility. Most of the food we eat will come from the organic gardens! In an effort to be self-sufficient and sensitive to our impact on the land, most of the meals at Punta Mona are completely vegetarian. Occasionally fish and eggs are served (when the fish are biting and the chickens are laying). In visiting Punta Mona, we will participate in a community of locals and foreign visitors working and living together towards a sustainable way of life.

During the days we will partake in a variety of activities depending on your group's interests. These may include exploring the mangroves of the Gandoca lagoon, searching the beaches for nesting Leatherback turtles (April, May, June), participating in a farm project such as composting or planting workshops, arts and crafts with found items from the jungle, gardening and building, making chocolate from fresh cacao, or working with a local craftsman.

Activities:

Interact with an Indigenous Community

Learn about the culture and customs of the Bribri People. Hike with a native guide and see the medicinal, cultural and culinary uses of many of the forest's plants.

Experiment with Sustainable Living

'Live off-the-land' at <u>Punta Mona</u>, a remote, beachfront organic farm. Harvest food for meals, kayak in a mangrove-lined lagoon, visit with dolphins and witness nesting leatherback turtles. True educational travel!

Service Learning Projects

Provide service to local host communities while exploring the balance between giving and receiving. Past projects have included the installation of eco-solutions, town beautification, and the presentation of a carnival for local children.
