I was still young enough then to think that running and riding a bike were so much cooler than boring old walking. Well, that was then.

Now that the weather is warmer and I'm walking more frequently again, I'm aware that the people I meet on the street or on the trails are smiling more often than people I meet just about anywhere else. Yes, a gym would probably give me a little better work out, but I'm not inclined to say goodbye to the intangibles walking provides. Remember those smiles and bird songs? If you are able to, all you need is a pair of shoes in good enough repair, and a little time on your hands. See you out there,

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

At the April meeting of the Board of Trustees, the following Motion was adopted for vote at the annual meeting, June 14. That Article V, Section 5, regarding the Committee on Church Ministry, and Article VII, Section 3C, relating to the nomination of a candidate for election to the Committee on Church Ministry be REPEALED.

Further, that the congregation require the Board to appoint an ad hoc committee to study models for a similar committee to the Committee on Church Ministry for churches of our size, and that this committee make recommendations and report to the Board and congregation at either the mid meeting or the annual meeting in 2010.

Commentary: The Committee on Church Ministry has not fit the needs of our growing congregation for several years. The Board and Ministers recommend the abolishment of the current structure of the Committee on Church Ministry to allow a committee to study for a year the models for similar committees at other churches of our size and make recommendations to the Board and congregation before going forward.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE We have received \$594,000 in pledges for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009. That's very close to the \$610,000 we hoped to raise. It is also more than \$100,000 higher than what had been received this time last year. You have made it possible to base the budget on actual numbers rather than projections. In this year of financial uncertainty, that is especially helpful. Thank you!

If you have not yet pledged, it's not too late. Please stop by the bookkeeper's office on Sunday morning or go to the website to print off a pledge form. If you pledged online and have not received an email thanking you for your pledge, please check with me or the bookkeeper. We have discovered a few pledges made online that

did not come through, and do not want to miss yours. Help us close this final gap and support our beloved community.

It was both heart wrenchingly hard and fulfilling work. Most recently, I've been working in the Children's Hospital, sometimes following a child from the Emergency Department and Intensive Care right through their healing on a regular floor and discharge. As many of you know, I love being around children, and I've found great satisfaction being with youngsters who are not at their physical best. Much of the ministry in Pediatrics is to parents, and as you can imagine, that leaves an imprint on one's heart. Some moments are unspeakably sad. My next and last assignment in my year-long training program is still to be determined; it will be in some combination of the burn unit, trauma or perhaps adult psychiatry. Time will tell. What I do know is that I love working in the hospital setting, and so now I begin the task of finding a permanent position.

One of my dear friends in Columbus is soon to be the mother of the groom, and so I'm heading your way to celebrate with the whole family. Revs. Mark Belletini and Eric Meter have graciously invited me to attend church while I'm in the neighborhood, and I look forward to seeing many of you in person on May 24. Go gently, Rev. Mike Bethel gets special kudos for organizing all the diverse tasks.

Second, I want to offer a spiritual approach to all of the orange barrels clogging up the traffic. (It took me an extra 20 minutes to get to the office on Wednesday because the bulldozer had to block traffic to continue its good work.) That approach is mindfulness. Mindfulness is a word often associated with certain forms of Buddhism. It means several things: it means to be "heedful." It means to "pay attention deliberately." It means to "be aware, awake and attentive, without judgment or critique." It means "to notice." What does that have to do with mundane traffic blockage?

I am aware that I may have to leave an extra 15 minutes for travel on certain days, especially after 315 is narrowed down to a lane or two. But many folks will have to travel extra time to get to this building because they will reverse traffic flow from east to west once they finish the south lane. This means everyone who lives in Arlington etc. will have to "go around" via Broadway or 161....at least an extra 15 minutes there.

All of my habits, and yours, will have to change. Habits are the lack of mindfulness. Habits are done without thinking much about it. But all of that is going to have to change if we are to continue our vital congregational life for the next two years without everyone, including me, straggling in ten minutes after the service, meeting, class or concert begins.

Mindfulness coming and going is the spiritual response to this change. People often associate the word "mindfulness" with serene Buddhist abbots and magical Zen stories; with smiling images of Thich Nhat Hahn and simple tofu suppers. Such associations, for me, romanticize the very practical Buddhist attitude I always find when I read stories of Siddatha Gotama himself. I say, mindfulness about orange barrels and blocked traffic on Henderson is just as sacred as still, still silence in the Zendo, and is a most meaningful spiritual practice. Mindfulness about leaving a few minutes early; mindfulness about traffic stalls... all of it: an unusual but strong opportunity to deepen our lives.

Jolinda preached a deep and thoughtful sermon this morning, and those of you who were not there to hear it might look online in a week or two to read it. Especially as we look at a new mission statement. I think it was very insightful for that proposed document.

Rev. Wendy Fish, our minister Emerita, will be here for Celebrations on May 24, the Memorial Day weekend. She is here to attend a friend's son's wedding, but will be here to greet us and let us greet her. She has written something in another section of this issue. See page 7.

A UU Morning at CRC -- Kathleen Boston

On a Sunday morning in May, my covenant group served breakfast at the Clintonville Community Resource Center (CRC). We arrived at 9:45 am and people were already seated and waiting for the church group food. We put our casseroles, scrambled eggs, juice, fruit, and apple crisp on the serving table and breakfast was on.

We mingled with the breakfasters and had many interesting conversations. I sat across from an older woman named Linda. Her first request to me was, "Tell me a Bible verse." I have read the Bible, but I was stumped. She quoted a few verses and then we talked about her four grandchildren and her buckeye necklace and other topics.

I went back to the serving table to ask Randy, a CRC volunteer and board member, some questions and Linda came to the table to gather some food for her grandchildren who were at her home and hungry. She asked Randy and me to pray so the three of us held hands while Linda said a lengthy prayer, asking God to provide food for these people at CRC.

Shortly after, there was a commotion at the entrance to CRC. In marched the first graders from First UU with Carol Ballog and other teachers. These were the children who had been selling their hand crafted greeting cards in Fellowship Hall to raise money. Carol told us they had raised \$280 and spent most of it on food which they brought in via grocery carts and cardboard boxes. It was a wonderful moment, the children helping to place the cans of food in the food pantry and the teachers explaining their project. And, it was a complete surprise to our covenant group to see them there!

I told Linda that the children were from First UU and had raised the money for the enormous amount of food they brought. Linda said, "I told you that if you pray to God for something, he provides!"
