# Letter from the Rector

As requested, a note about our trip to India. Truthfully, it's taken me awhile to process it all, and I'm not there completely yet, but it was an amazing experience.

The trip itself was grueling, as those of you who have traveled to the far side of the globe know. It's not just the amount of travel or the time change, there's an element of 'otherness' that adds to the weight of it all.

I am always struck by how much control I feel in my day to day life, and how beyond my control being in Mumbai feels. I don't speak enough Hindi or Marathi to communicate with those beyond my family. I can ask for rice, or a glass of water, or know when my grandmother was telling me I was pretty or sweet – you know, the stuff of a conversation with my Indian grandmother who didn't speak English.

When I was three we went to India and my mom and dad left me with my grandparents for a week or so. It was only when we returned when I was 6 that I realized they didn't speak English! It seems that the communication between grandchild and grandparents doesn't need a lot of complicated words — we got along just fine. And over the years I learned to pay attention to the conversation my cousins were having so I would know when they were up to something. But other than that, I have little to no useful Hindi. So there we were in Mumbai this February, navigating drivers and hotel and such, and the streets and traffic (which is truly crazy) on our own. I have the bravest family!


loe Michaud Bill Macleod So it was extraordinary, but the primary reason we were there was to be part of the family celebrations for my cousin's wedding. At one, I was included as one of the honored married women, and part of the ceremony – very cool.



At another we were present for Puja, the blessing of the upcoming marriage. The Hindu priest came to the bride's house and together with the bride's mother, he invites the gods to bless the marriage and then he invites the planets to do the same. They name the virtues they wish for the couple and they name the vices they wish away from them, the water that is poured for the blessings is kept, the water that is poured for the vices is tossed far from the home. All incredibly interesting – I was moved by how carefully and intentionally the family was providing for their daughter's well being. The following evening we got to participate in the Mendi party for the women of the wedding, where we had our hands decorated with henna while the bride's hands and feet were carefully adorned. The women sang songs for the bride, ate a lovely meal together, selected their bangles for the wedding and the cocktail party in the days to come, and generally had a girls' night in. Crowded, fun and loud, all that and more! Ken was a trooper and stayed around to take pictures, very brave of him.



The next night was the cocktail party in honor of the couple. This was the first time we met the groom and his family, and honestly this felt the most Western. It was most like the reception we think of after the wedding service. Close friends and relatives are present, toast the couple, songs are played, specific people have to dance together. In this case, because my cousin-brother, the bride's father had died, the men of his family stood in for him. My dad and my uncle were up there dancing as if they remember how to dance India style – too funny but very kind. And the next day was finally the wedding day! The wedding was late in the afternoon and involved a long ceremony on the Mandap or sacred platform, and several members of the two families in a complicated and beautiful ceremony that goes on for around two hours.



Afterwards the couple go and change, as does most of the wedding party. The reception follows a few hours later and everyone is invited, friend, colleagues ... there were 600 or so at the reception dinner which was held outside at the Mumbai Cricket Club. It was beautiful but a lot to take in. We spent our last days in India doing some exploring and some shopping, and the last day we spent with my cousin-sister, mother of the bride, and that was my favorite day. Sujata took us shopping and out to her favorite restaurant, she even took me to the big Christian Church in Bandera so I could see it and it's version of prayer stations outside across the street. IT was a remarkable trip, made more so by the knowledge that this family which is now truly spread across the globe, may never be together again in this way. I can't thank you enough for letting us go and be part of the gathering and the celebrating.

Desmond Tutu, Archbishop Emeritus South Africa and Bill McKibben, author and environmentalist will send video messages.




