When you're writing, it's easy to confuse *affect* and *effect*. They might sound similar, but they're not the same word!

Affect is a verb.

Examples:

I hope my honesty doesn't affect how you feel about me.

My new espresso maker will drastically *affect* my daily coffee consumption.

Effect is often used as a noun.

Examples:

The new lotion had a great effect on my skin.
