Milton's also features jewelry in 10-karat and 14-karat gold, diamonds and sterling silver.


If a big-time hunter, or even a part-time one, is on your list, Oasis Outback can help. But Oasis Outback is not only for the hunters in the family.

Fire marshal urges Christmastide caution

According to research posted by the U.S. Fire Administration, between Dec. 24 and 26, the average daily number of deaths and injuries, and the amount of money lost due to fire increases between 43 and 61 percent over non-holiday daily averages. During that period in 2000, the number of fires was estimated to total 11,600 fires with monetary losses coming in at over \$80 million. Using those same statistics, a total of about 250 injuries and 40 fatalities also occur during that period each year. Through the years, local firefighters have offered tips to reduce the risk of fire hazards presented during the Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year holidays.

Juan Hernandez, city fire marshal, said checking used strings of Christmas lights is one of the most

important seasonal tasks when it comes to decorating. Hernandez said the first inspection should seek out any

bulbs or issues with wires. He stressed that the strings should be checked prior to being placed on the tree or house.

When it comes to picking out the tree, it is not a good sign if you run your hand down a Christmas tree's branches and pine needles fall out and litter the ground like brittle, brown snowflakes.

Whether the tree is artificial or real, the fire marshal also has a number of tips to keep homes and families safe.

First, Hernandez advised against placing a tree anywhere near a doorway. He said some years back two fatalities resulted from a fire, and he attributed them to a Christmas-tree blocked exterior door.

"You don't want to block the door," he repeated.

He said it is also important to be sure any Christmas tree lights carry a Underwriters Laboratory, or UL, label.

"Most [artificial] trees come already pre-lit. Prewired," Hernandez said. "That UL tag is most important."

Another tip the fire marshal has for families who have either an artificial or living tree is to keep candles far away from trees and the gifts underneath.

"Don't use candles near trees," he stressed. "Whether it's artificial or real, but especially not real."

Changing the subject to refer only to artificial trees, Hernandez said it is important to make sure the right type of tree is being utilized. For example, he said people should be sure not to use a tree designed for inside use outside of the home.

He also advised that much care should be taken to shield even those trees listed as flame-retardant from flame and heat.

"Even if fire resistant they will burn," he said. "They will burn."

When opting for a living tree, the fire marshal said there are a variety of ways to test the freshness. First, he said, reach into the middle of the tree and grab a handful of the needles.

"Make sure you don't pull out a lot of the pines," he said. Another test is to bump the trunk against the floor or ground.

"Shake it some and see if [the needles] are falling," Hernandez said.

When it comes to decorations, Hernandez again referred to the importance of UL labels on strings of lights. He also said to use no more than two extension cords, and only those created specifically for holiday lights. He said those cords can be found at most stores alongside the lights they are designed to accompany.

Other tips offered from the fire department throughout the years include carefully monitoring water levels of all living trees; using stable and secure candle holders while avoiding drafts when candles are lit; and extinguishing all candles and unplugging lights and other hazards before going to bed or leaving the house.



City slates pickup of holiday trash Dec. 26-28

Even though the trash may pile up over the Christmas gift-giving season, there is no need to worry if you live in the city of Uvalde.

"We do pick up trash every day," said Juan Zamora, city wastewater superintendent.

Zamora said city crews never take a holiday from trash collection and Christmas is no exception.

With Christmas falling on a Tuesday this year

Christmas wrappings will be collected from Dec. 26-28, Zamora said.

"We do ask that everything be put in boxes or bags and not be mixed with any other household trash," he said.

Everything should be placed curbside by 7 a.m., and Zamora recommended that residents put trash bins out the evening before. The extra pickup will not include extra household garbage or bags of leaves.

Those whose trash is normally collected on the days when a holiday also falls are reminded to take their 90-gallon containers to the curb by 7 a.m. as usual for pickup on those days.

Zamora said the recy-

cling center will be closed today, tomorrow and Saturday for the Thanksgiving holiday and also Dec. 24 and Dec. 25. The landfill on Farm-to Market Road 481 will be closed the same davs.

During city-observed holidays, the sanitation department uses three trucks instead of two trucks to allow workers to finish sooner so they can spend time with their families.


Customers will have the opportunity to purchase items that will be on sale by forming lines in that certain area. There will be no ropes this year in the store.

Foster families will be able to return pets by Jan. 2. Families who decide to adopt foster pets will receive a discount and be given priority over other applicants.




less fortunate, but if other people show up then we will not turn them away. This is the community's money, so we are here to serve them," Barrios said.

For Space Availability Mail, the deadline for APO-FPO has also passed.

For most APO-FPO addresses the deadline for Parcel Airlift Mail is Dec. 3. For First Class Mail letters and card and for Prioritv Mail. the deadline is Dec. 10.

Items that cannot be shipped include securities, currency or precious metals in their raw, unmanufactured state, cigarettes and other

The deadline for Express Mail is Dec. 17 for most APO-FPO addresses.

The exception to the above deadlines is APO-FPO AE ZIP 093. There is no Express Mail service to 093. Parcel Post Service deadlines have passed and the deadline for Priority Mail and for First Class mail, letters and cards, is Dec. 3. For Parcel Airlift mail the deadline is Nov. 30.

When mailing packages to troops overseas, there are several rules and restrictions to keep in mind.

Mail must be addressed to a specific individual. Postal Service Form 2976-A is required for any mail weighing more than one pound and Customs documentation must be filled out on any mail addressed to an APO or FPO regardless of weight.

cards, films, videotapes, etc. are also prohibited as they are non-authorized political materials. Religious materials are prohibited in bulk, but such items for personal use are allowed.

Radio transceivers, cordless telephones, global positioning systems, scanners, base stations and handheld transmitters are prohibited.

Firearms and meats, including preserved meats. whether hermetically sealed or not, are prohibited. Meat products such as dried beef, salami and sausage may be mailed provided they remain in their original hermetically sealed packages and bear USDA certification.

For troops serving in Islamic countries, pork or pork-by-products are prohibited.

Fruits, animals and living plants are also prohibited.
