

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



The War of 1812 on the Rappahannock River had people living along the north and south banks of the river in constant fear of British attacks and foraging parties invading homes taking whatever they wanted.

Residents here not only feared the British, but also the quartermasters of area American militias who often used force to take what they needed from the citizenry.

Ellison Currie of Lancaster was a man of compassion and concern for the people of his county. He was quartermaster of the 92nd Regiment in Lancaster County and knew the pain caused his people by the seizure of their material possessions.

In April 1814, Currie wrote the Governor of Virginia describing the plight of citizens living on the river. "The pressure of the war in this State is particularly felt in the parts of the country bordering on the bay and navigable rivers. The people are frequently called away from their occupations by which they obtain the means of supporting themselves and their families.

"They (citizens) are subjected to the loss of their slaves (by the British) and in many cases stripped of all their property," continued Currie. "To all this may be added the personal insult and injury to which they are exposed from an enemy whose conduct is more that of barbarians than civilized men."

Currie complained to the Governor that the state was not providing enough funds to feed the local militia, and this was only a further burden on the citizens.

"When a detachment of (our) militia is called out, it becomes the painful duty of the quartermaster or his sergeant to take by force from the housekeepers contiguous to the camp the meat and bread on which their support depends, and leave them (local citizens) to starve or subsist on the charity of their neighbors," he wrote.

Currie complained that state funds for rations that consisted of barrels of whiskey or brandy, beef or pork and flour or meal were not enough to prevent the quartermaster from taking from the citizenry.

As the British pillaged the shores of Lancaster, Essex, Middlesex and Richmond counties during the War of 1812 the quartermasters' jobs became even more difficult as citizens complained that both sides were taking away their ability to feed themselves.

Often, a father was off fighting in the local militia while the quartermaster was taking the last ham from the family smokehouse, and the eggs and bacon from the table of his wife and children left alone at home.

It happened right here in Rivah Country during the War of 1812.

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






GeoCaChing: High fech scavenger hunf

If's not often that low-tech grandparents can get the upper hand in the high-tech world of their children and grandchildren. But mention "Geocaching" and watch your computer whiz-kids spin away from Facebook amazed that you know about the latest craze, maybe even before they do.

Scavenger hunting today is nothing like the days of yore when someone handed a list of peculiar items to a party of peculiar teens and then released them on the neighborhood to run around in a bunch, searching.

Imagine opening your front door on a hot summer night and finding a group of frenzied teens you don't know begging you to hand over a rubber ducky.

No rubber ducky?

How about sifting through your drawers for a size 48 men's boxer shorts, they ask as they scan the list.

If, for self-preservation, you complied, the boxers would be snatched from your hand and the teens would be on their way, scurrying off to the woods in search of a "white owl" (instead of looking in pop's humidor for the brand cigar).

Today's scavenger hunters aren't looking for that kind of excitement. They don't even use the same terminology. Scavenger hunting has gone high-tech—it's now called geocaching (pronounced gee-o-cash-ing). And it's no longer scavenger—it's treasure hunting—using longitude and latitude to search for "caches" hidden or placed in plain sight

in both remote and highly visible areas.

The phenomenon is sweeping the globe with caches located on every continent from Antarctica to Tangier Island in the Chesapeake Bay. In fact, the number of registered caches recently passed the million mark and within days was up another 68,000.



To begin, all you need is Internet access to find the coordinates in your area from the website: geocaching.com. This is where the kids' high-tech i-Phones come in handy. Or you can go-it the old fashioned way—printing hard copies of the coordinates off your computer before you leave home.

You'll also need a hand-held GPS (Global Positioning System) unit to punch in the coordinates and point you in the right direction. While a GPS unit can range in price from \$80 to \$500, state parks will rent a unit for \$8 if you plan to cache in the park.

There are hundreds of caches throughout the tri-river area—in towns, out in the woods, under water and up

8 steps to Geocaching

- 1. Go to www.geocaching.com and register for a free account.
- 2. Click "Hide and Seek a Cache."
- 3. Enter a postal code or address and click "Search."
- 4. Choose any geocache from the list and click on its
- 5. Enter the coordinates of the geocache into your GPS device
- 6. Use your GPS device to help you find the hidden geocache. The GPS gets you close, but the cache name usually offers the clue to the hiding place.
- 7. Sign the logbook and return the geocache to its original location for the next player to find.
- 8. Share your geocaching stories and photos online.

trees. They are even hidden in graveyards, local shops and museums. The game can be played as a couple, on a family outing, as a corporate team builder or used as an economic development tool for the community.

And it's still a good party game—entertaining enough to get even the most dedicated couch potato up and out on a hiking trail in search of hidden treasure. The GPS unit puts players within a few feet of a cache's location, but the exact hiding place is up to you to find. Treasure could be hidden behind a bush or in an abandoned mailbox.



Let's be honest, folks, you're not really hunting treasure. It's more like using a multi-billion dollar satellite system to find Tupperware in the woods. A cache is usually not much bigger than a man's hand and can be as small as a magnetic key holder. There are even micro-caches the size of a watch battery. And the booty, it turns out, is usually no more than a cheap plastic trinket that players can leave or exchange with a cheap trinket of their own. Micro-caches are for hard-core cachers since they are too small to hold treasure.

This is where the first rule of geocaching comes into play (there are always rules and consequences): the caches cannot be used to promote any commercial, religious or other affiliation.

Don't leave food either. Rangers at Belle Isle State Park tell the story of a dental hygienist who left dental floss—much to the delight of a raccoon attracted to the minty fresh scent. The raccoon didn't replace the floss but his breath was much improved.

Inside each cache is an itsy-bitsy logbook where players document their find by signing the team name. High-tech explorers like to use low-tech handles like "Muddy Frogs," "Godux," "RainRshine" and "Wheegeo." It's advisable not to use a long name like "Dragonspassion4caching" because it could take up the entire logbook in a microcache. >> 20

Geocaching Safety

- Learn how to operate your GPS device and pack extra batteries.
- Select a geocache with terrain and difficulty ratings you can handle. Ratings: 1/1 is easiest, a 5/5 is the most difficult.
- Read the description and the hints. Bring a map, just in case.
- Pack supplies: water, food, extra clothing. And wear proper footwear.
- Let someone else know where you are going.
- Mark your car or trailhead to ensure your safe return.
- Rely on eyes rather than your GPS within 50 feet of the geocache location.
- Geocaches are hidden in plain sight and never buried, but are often camouflaged.
- Be mindful of the environment: practice CACHE IN/ TRASH OUT.

Each cache is different, with some offering interactive treasure. Players can also create and hide caches then register them on geocaching.com for others to find. Many are listed under catchy names that are also clues, like Yakitty Yak, Coffee Break or Reflections.

This brings up another rule: never hide a cache in a dangerous location such as under a bridge, along a highway or near railroad tracks. Private property is also a bad idea. However, businesses sometimes welcome the extra traffic. Be sure to ask permission before choosing to hide one in, say, a bank vault or in the landscaping at historic Christ Church or the Steamboat Era Museum in Irvington (hint, hint).

"We've had a number of people come here looking," said Ann McClintock at the museum. "Some take time to tour the museum."

One popular cache is at the Kilmarnock Antique Gallery on School Street.

"It looks like fun to me," said gallery owner Steve Bonner, who has seen people wandering aimlessly through his parking lot with a GPS tracker. The hunt occasionally moves indoors, mostly to find out if they're headed in the right direction. "If it was hidden in the store, it would bring them inside. I think that's a great idea," Bonner thought out loud.

I could see visions of dollar signs dancing in his eyes.



Glenn Warner Jr. started geocaching two years ago after his mother passed away and he inherited her GPS unit. His dad, Glenn Sr., is well into his 70s but still enjoys geocaching and places caches at all the public marinas in the region.

The newer team of Glenn Jr., wife Aimee and daughters Danielle and Nicole are registered as "Scoopitup." They belong to River County Geocachers and participate in club events that include...what else?...exploring new destinations for hidden treasure. Glenn boasts 183 finds so far. He's worked his way to Gloucester.

I followed the Warners on a search that led to a cemetery north of Kilmarnock, past rows of grave markers, and into the middle of an enormous hedge of Leland Cypress trees. I won't give away any more, but suffice it to say, the caches' name, "Coffee Break," gave no clue to the location but was a hint for the container.

The Smerchansky family from Arlington, new cachers camping at Belle Isle State Park, led me on a quest for a cache called "P.O. (Box) Belle Isle." Hiking through brush, climbing over broken tree limbs covered with poison ivy, I couldn't help noticing 12-year-old Jake Smerchansky was wearing flip-flops. When we found the location, Jake and his little brother, Luke, were the first to spot the cache hidden behind some scratchy vines. Not wanting to rob them of the joy, I held back while they fished it out. That reminds me of one final rule: Don't forget to bring the calamine lotion.

And have fun!






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June is a happy month. Kids are out of school for summer, the landscape is once again a lush green and, most importantly, fishing is great!

Fishing is in full swing this month with a variety of species available. Some of the local favorites being bluefish, rockfish, spot, croaker, flounder and trout. Here are a few tips on how and where to catch them:

BLUEFISH used to be the mainstay in the bay. Menhaden would run scared along the channel areas as bluefish up to 20 pounds were considered the bullies of the neighborhood. After a lengthy hiatus they have made a comeback, yet remain much smaller in size than vears past.

These voracious fish enter our area when the water temperature climbs into the mid 60s. The larger blues traditionally are the first to arrive, yet an influx of smaller fish are already on scene. Bluefish are a large motivation for the hundreds of anglers that enter the local Reedville Derby each year. This two-day tournament, one of the longest running tournaments on the Chesapeake Bay, will be held June 11-12. The tournament includes bluefish, rockfish and croaker. The larger blues can be caught throughout June as they continue northward to the upper

most productive areas are: The MIDDLE GROUNDS, which are west of Smith Island just below the target ship.

Along the edge of the shipping channel at BUOY 62 there have been consistent catches for many years. This area is roughly 5 miles east of the Ingram Bay/Reedville area. The Northern Neck Reef, just north of Buoy 62, holds good numbers of fish as well.

The Asphalt Pile and Windmill Point reefs are good bets for blues throughout the season.

STRIPED BASS (ROCK-FISH) should remain available until the end of June. This species has become the main target of both spring and fall fishing. The Virginia spring season continues through June 15. You may keep two fish per person 18-28 inches, one of which may be over 32 inches. 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BITING BACK:

Harvesting the softshell crab for personal consumption

Ronnie and Linda Jett, who own Cockrell's Creek Seafood Deli in Reedville, are very familiar with soft crabs. They sell up to 1,200 dozen of the delectable delicacies during the course of a season, which runs from the end of April or early May until the middle of September every year, with two bigger runs in May and August.

"I love them," said Linda. " I could eat them every day."

Soft crabs come from peeler crabs that have been caught and put in shallow water-filled trays to molt. Watermen who specialize in soft crabs have shedding houses with many of the trays inside. Creek water is circulated through all the trays while the watermen wait for the peeler crabs to shed their shells and become the soft version.

Crabs that have molted must be retrieved as soon as possible or the other crabs in the trays will eat them. Remember, they are defenseless and cannot move once they molt until their new shell hardens in a day or two.

Peeler crabs are caught in either peeler pots or peeler traps. A pot is like a regular crab pot, but has a tighter mesh to the wire. They are deployed by crabbers in shallow water along the shoreline of a creek, a river or the Bay, much the same as a regular pot, but in areas where the molting crabs are known to frequent.

A trap is like a miniature fish pound trap and is set at a

t first glance for the uninitiated, eating a soft crab can be an intimidating endeavor. A normal blue crab has a hard shell and two formidable pinching claws that can inflict quite a bit of damage to the unwary.

A soft crab is a blue crab that has molted its hard shell as part of the growth process, rendering it completely defenseless. It also makes it quite an unexpected tasty treat when deep fried, grilled or sauteed.

right angle and close to the shoreline of creeks or rivers. A leader net guides crabs traveling along the water's edge into the pound trap, which is a rectangular wooden box with tight wire mesh that is placed closer to the shore. It can be lifted out of its frame to unload the catch onto a waterman's boat.

As the water warms in the spring, peelers are caught near the heads of the rivers or creeks first and gradually move toward the mouths and out into the Bay, according to Chip Williams, a peeler crabber from Reedville. He said the pots must be moved every day to keep up with the movement of the peelers. Years of experience have made him and other peeler crabbers familiar with this migration pattern.


A jimmy crab (a large male crab) is put in the pot or trap to attract female peelers, a procedure called "studding" a pot, according to Williams. Male peelers do not

need any bait, but apparently move into the and sell for about \$28 a dozen. The biggest pots or traps of their own volition, perhaps because they think it will be a safe place to molt, Williams said.

Once the peelers become soft crabs they are refrigerated to keep them from hardening and are sold to various markets in the States and overseas. The Jetts sell them by the dozen or singly in their deli as soft crab sandwiches or meals.

Bigger size soft crabs bring higher prices. Prices also fluctuate with the time of year, the supply and demand and the distributor, as with any commodity.

The smallest size the Jetts sell are called hotels and sell for about \$12 a dozen. \$20 a dozen. The next size up are jumbos of satisfaction in biting back!

are whales and sell for anywhere from \$32 to \$36 a dozen. All these are spring prices that were provided by the Jetts.

As with all crabs or fish, soft crabs should be cleaned before cooking and eating. The face is cut off first. Then the apron underneath the crab is peeled back and cut off. Lastly the flaps on either side of the shell are lifted to cut out the lungs and intestines.

The crab is now ready to be cooked. A variety of recipes can be used with seasonings according to the cook's discretion. But whatever the recipe, it is the whole crab that is consumed, intimidating claws and all.

For those who have ever been pinched by Primes are a bit bigger and can bring about a hard crab's claws, there's a definite sense

Bistro dining in the Northern Neck

My husband and I recently had the pleasure of enjoying a wonderful dinner at Town Bistro in the heart of Kilmarnock. It's co-owned by chef Christal Jett and Kate Messner.

After being greeted by the hostess, we were led to our window table, providing us with front row seats to witness the Friday night buzz around town. We could see crowds making their way over to Savannah Joe's, and we could hear the faint strains of the Friday night band when customers entered and exited the restaurant.

When offered the wine list, my husband and I were surprised by the limited selection of wines

sold by the glass (three, to be exact). However, we were pleased to learn that Town Bistro sells 1/2 bottles of wine, enough for two glasses, so we decided to enjoy a 1/2 bottle of the 2007 King Estate Oregon Pinot Noir.

I later learned that the wines are very carefully selected, and that none of the Bistro's wines are rated below 88 on the wine rating scale (the wine rating scale is 50-100, with anything over 80 considered very good, and wines rated over 90 considered excellent). Chef Jett's goal is for the wine list to be affordable and accessible.

Upon placing our drink orders, we were served a beautiful basket of warm European grain bread and butter.

While waiting for our wine, we studied the small, but beautifully crafted menu consisting primarily of fresh seafood, with one beef and one chicken option available. The menu is not overly extensive for a number of reasons. The first is that Chef Jett is the sole preparer of all dishes. With the exception of one dishwasher and a hostess on busy evenings, Jett and Messner run the restaurant entirely by themselves. Pretty impressive when you consider that everything from salads, to appetizers to entrees are made to order. The other reason is that Town Bistro doesn't have bulk freezer storage (or a deep fryer or a microwave for that matter!). The menu changes constantly to reflect the freshest ingredients available to the chef.

Table service was impeccable as the tables are handled by none other than Messner herself, who was incredibly knowledgeable and helpful regarding menu questions.

That evening, the menu included two salad options, a soup of the day, and two appetizers, clams or brie. These selections, as well as the entrees, change regularly in accordance with the season and availability. We decided on the brie and were not disappointed. The perfectly picturesque circle of warm French double cream brie drizzled with clover honey was topped with fresh herbs and toasted pecans and surrounded by lightly toasted crostini. Our red wine paired

wonderfully with this decadent dish.

We also shared the seasonal salad of mixed greens, sweet strawberries, toasted pecans and goat cheese served with a wonderful basalmic vinaigrette. The dressing was homemade, as are all sauces and dressings at Town Bistro, and the rich and intense flavors of the vinegar paired wonderfully with the goat cheese and strawberries.

When Messner arrived to take our order, I thought I had my mind set on the shrimp stuffed with jumbo lump crab meat and parmesan cheese, but made a last minute decision to ask which she most highly recommended.



Declaring the scallops her personal favorite, I decided to trust her expertise and switched to the restaurant's signature dish of panko crusted scallops with lemon-lime beurre blanc sauce. (See above photo). I chose one of the two starches being offered that evening, the roasted Yukon gold potatoes seasoned with herbes de provence. Chef Jett uses this seasoning particularly for the hint of lavender that goes well with most wines. My meal also included the vegetable du jour, a steamed crown of broccoli.

My husband chose the crabcake, which is made with a traditional recipe and a few "secret" spices, including the addition of tarragon. He chose the other starch of the evening, 100% pure wild rice, and the broccoli.

After we placed our orders, I took a moment to observe the style and decor of the restaurant. While not overly decorative, the restaurant manages to achieve a cozy and intimate atmosphere with burgundy walls, black chairs and tables, bistro prints hanging on the walls, wine racks and, my favorite touch, unique candle holders on each table. The restaurant has only seven tables, separated from the kitchen area by a sheer curtain. Patrons at many of the other tables seemed to know each other, and the overall feel of the restaurant was festive, as many of the parties surrounding us laughed and toasted their wine. While we were dining, Chef Jett

visited tables, clearly familiar with many of the patrons.

When our food arrived, my scallops were beautifully browned and crisp on the outside and perfectly moist and juicy on the inside. The beurre blanc sauce was a delightful addition, as the citrusy hints in this white wine butter sauce complemented the scallops wonderfully.

My husband's crabcake, also beautifully crisped, was accompanied by a small dish of the same buerre blanc sauce as my scallops, and we were later told the sauce is immensely popular among Bistro regulars and served alongside many other dishes by request.

> Our delicious meals, including the amazing brie appetizer that we polished off, didn't allow us room for dessert; however, it never hurts to check out the options. The signature desserts that are staples of the menu include the creme brulee and the flour-less chocolate torte. Other desserts, like the rest of the menu, change seasonally. That evening it was French toast pound cake with fresh fruit. We were immediately sorry we hadn't saved room for those mouth-watering treats!

> Town Bistro opened in June 2005. Chef Jett, a native of White

Stone, grew up hunting, fishing and spending time around her family's gardens and began her understanding of food preparation at a young age. She later attended Johnson and Wales University in Norfolk, graduating at the top of her class with an A.A.S. in culinary arts. Chef Jett makes it a priority to continue her culinary education and travels every year to various events to further her knowledge and techniques in an always-changing environment.

She describes her culinary style as "modern American cuisine," and the name Town Bistro was chosen not for the French cuisine influence, but for the style of intimate, family owned and operated neighborhood bistros in Europe. Jett and Messner strive for the restaurant to be a "customer friendly, come-as-you-are kind of place. Upscale without the uppity." Their philosophy is simply that they want their customers to be happy and believe it's important to establish relationships. Jett describes it as a "reciprocal process."

Chef Jett sources their products locally whenever possible, including local asparagus, tomatoes and soft shells, and says "Fresh is always best."

We thoroughly enjoyed experiencing the deliciousness that is Town Bistro and might just start with dessert on our next visit!

Soft Shell Crab Imperial

Ingredients:

1/4 cup butter 2 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk 2 teaspoons prepared

1/2 teaspoon salt 1/8 - 1/4 teaspoon red pepper 1 pound backfin crabmeat 12 soft-shell crabs, cleaned 3 tablespoons butter, melted 1 cup fresh buttered breadcrumbs

Preparation:

mustard

Melt butter in saucepan. Add flour and blend over low heat, stirring constantly, for 3 to 5 minutes. Slowly stir in milk. Cook and stir until thickened. Blend in mustard, salt and red pepper. Gently fold in crabmeat. Prick legs and claws of each soft-shell crab with the tines of a fork to prevent popping. Place crabs, bottom side up, on a broiling rack 3 inches from the heat. Brush with melted butter. Broil 4 to 5 minutes. Turn over, brush again with butter. Broil 4 to 5 minutes. To assemble: Place about 3 tablespoons of the crab mixture on top of each broiled crab. Sprinkle with buttered crumbs. At serving time, bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 15 minutes. Serves

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
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
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
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


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Public library offers summer reading program

here's a dogleg turn in the middle of Montross that forces motorists on King's Highway to slow down, in fact nearly stop, in the middle of the quaint Northern Neck town.

Otherwise, folks might zoom on through the county seat of Westmoreland County, which has a total area of only 1.0 square mile and just over 300 residents.

The 90-degree turn faces the Old Westmoreland Courthouse, which was the site of notable Revolutionary War events from 1774-1775.

In fact, Westmoreland County is steeped in history as the birthplace of George Washington, James Monroe and General Robert E. Lee.

Montross is home to the Westmoreland County Museum, the county's newspaper, a bottling distributorship, a few restaurants and shops.

The Westmoreland County Visitors Center is in the Westmoreland County Museum and Library at 43 Court Square. Established in 1941, it is the oldest museum in the Northern Neck. Built as a replica of Wakefield, the birthplace of George Washington, the museum was originally built to house Charles Willson Peale's 1768 portrait of William Pitt, the

Parlimentarian largely responsible for the repeal of the Stamp Act.

The museum exhibits include a geographical look at the region and depicts life in Westmoreland and the surrounding counties of the Northern Neck from the time of Native Americans and the first English settlements to the early 20th

century. The museum is also home to the Presidents' Don't Miss...

Garden, which honors Virginia's eight U.S. Presidents.

Open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., the museum sponsors many of the town's annual festivals including a spring wine tasting, the Montross Fall

Festival and Halloween and Christmas events.

One of the town's most popular events, the Montross Fall Festival is held on the first Saturday of October and features games, parades, crafts, theater shows and re-enactors. The festival, which will be on October 2, 2010, is often held in conjunction with Washington and Lee High School's homecoming celebration.

Once housed in the museum, the Northern Neck Historical Society moved in May just down the street to a private home at 15825 Kings Highway. Among the society's collection are vital records,

family histories, church and cemetery guides, histories of Virginia and Northern Neck towns and counties and immigration lists. Hours are 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday.

A visit to Montross wouldn't be complete without a stop at arguably one of the most interesting shops in the Northern Neck — The Carrot Cottage across from the courthouse on Kings Highway.

With flags waving in the breeze and yard decor along the sidewalk, it's a what-not shop like no other. The Carrot Cottage sells nautical and seasonal gifts, pastel portraits, Crocs sandals, children's clothing and toys, college apparel and memorabilia, jewelry, candles, knickknacks, dishes, soaps and hundreds of other items.

Just down the street, in a converted service station, is The Art of Coffee, a combination gourmet coffee shop, restaurant, art gallery and music venue. Promoting the arts of the Northern Neck, the shop provides a place to relax, sip coffee and dine while taking in artwork by owner Holly Harman and various local painters, photographers and woodcarvers. The shows change monthly. The current exhibit is one by art students from Washington and Lee High School.

For nearly five years now, the shop has promoted local entertainers with live music on the third Friday of every month.

Across the street from The Art of Coffee is possibly the town's most recognizable building, the Northern Neck Coca-Cola Bottling Company, which was established in 1921. The company is best known for its production of Northern Neck Ginger Ale.

Montross had its 15 minutes of national fame in 2000 when the town was featured on the Late Show with David Letterman. Comedian Biff Henderson, during his segment "Biff Henderson's America," visited Montross' museum, sheriff's department, a bargain shop and the bottling company.

benefit St. Stephen's Episcopal Church and their outreach partners, Hospice of the Northern Neck and SAIF Water.



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History

Essex County's history in written form dates from Captain John Smith's visit during the winter of 1607-08, when he wrote of the "excellent, pleasant, fertile, and navigable" Rappahannock Valley.

In 1645 Bartholomew Hoskins patented the Tappahannock site, which became known at various times as Hobbs His Hole. Hobb's Hole, the short-lived New Plymouth, and the Indian name Tappahannock. The port town was to become a center of commerce during the 17th and 18th centuries, establishing a crossroads.

The county came into being in 1692 when Old Rappahannock County, which once encompassed at least 50 modern counties in Virginia and West Virginia, was divided along the river with the north side becoming Richmond County and the south becoming Essex

During Bacon's Rebellion in 1676, armed men gathered near Piscataway Creek and defeated Governor Berkeley's cavalrymen. Later they prevailed in the Dragon Swamp, but eventually English warships and troops suppressed the uprising. Frontier patrols, however, were maintained against hostile northern Indians into the early 1700's.

The British Stamp Act of 1765 led directly to the American Revolution, and it was in

Leading merchant Archibald Ritchie, who supported the Stamp Act, was labeled as "the greatest enemy of his country." On February 27, 1766, gentlemen from nine counties gathered at Leedstown to draft the "Resolutions" that led Virginians to disobey Parliament. They also made plans to publicly humiliate

Ritchie and the Scots merchant Archibald McCall. These events occurred seven years before the Boston Tea Party.

The Essex Courthouse contains the oldest records in Virginia. James B. Slaughter's history of the area, "Settlers, Southerners, Americans: The History of Essex County, Virginia 1608-1984," recounts in detail the county's 350-year-old story. The book is available at

the county administrator's office.

Today Essex has a population of 9,989 and Tappahannock is one of the largest commercial centers in the region.

History

Exploration of what would become Gloucester County began soon after 1607 when Jamestown, the first permanent English settlement in the New World, was started 25 miles to its south.

Gloucester County was formed in 1651 from York County. It contained Kingston Parish, which became Mathews County in 1791.

Gloucester was home to several wellknown persons including Pocahontas, daughter of Indian Chief Powhatan. According to legend, she petitioned her father to spare the life of English explorer Captain John Smith, who was one of the first white men to see the area in the early

Another infamous resident was Nathaniel Bacon who, in 1676, led a force of planters against the Indians. Bacon's Rebellion defeated the Indians and then attempted to make the governor reform colonial policies. His army burned Jamestown and he briefly controlled the colony before his death ended the revolt.

Fortified during Bacon's Rebellion, Gloucester Point is just across the York River from Yorktown, site of the British surrender to end the American Revolution.

Originally called Tyndall's Point, named for an early mapmaker, it was renamed Gloucester Towne and was once the county seat until it was moved 13 miles north during the 1700s.

When Jamestown was burned by Bacon in 1676, the Virginia Executive Council considered moving the state capital to Tyndall's Point, but the motion was rejected. Jamestown remained the state capital until it was shifted to Williams-

In 1769, the new county seat, Botetourt 693-1264. Towne (old town Gloucester), was laid out. It was named for Baron de Botetourt, then governor of Virginia.

Today, Gloucester is the largest of the

Neck and Middle Peninsula with 34,500 residents.

Lancaster County

History

Indians had occupied the Northern Neck for some 10,000 years when Capt. John Smith sailed up the Rappahannock River in 1608. The Powhatan Confederate was represented here by the Moraughtacunds and the Cuttatawomen tribes. A short 43 years later, Lancaster County was formed from neighboring Northumberland.

Families of notable influence in the social, political and economic climate of the colonies built magnificent "empires" here, and family names like Carter and Ball still are prevalent today.

Robert "King" Carter (1663–1732) of Corrotoman was the son of the immigrant John Carter, who acquired property and lived at Corrotoman from 1654 until his death in 1669.

At the time of his death, his holdings had increased to some 300,000 acres, and over 1,000 slaves were working his various plantations. There were 18 buildings on the estate then (not counting the Mansion House he built, which burned three years prior to his death).

Married twice, he had 15 children. Among King Carter's descendants were eight governors of Virginia, three signers of the Declaration of Independence, two presidents, Robert E. Lee, and Supreme Court Justice Edward D.

Carter and his two wives are buried at Christ Church, the church he paid to have built a few miles from Corrotoman.

The Balls, meanwhile, established themselves at Millenbeck and at Epping Forest. Mary Ball, later to become the mother of George Washington, was born in 1708–09.

A courthouse was established in 1698 at Queenstown, a newly formed port town on the Corrotoman River. In 1742, the court was moved to Lancaster.

Today Lancaster County has a population of 11,300 and has one of the largest populations of retirees in the state thanks to its picturesque shoreline and temperate climate.

Mathews County

History

Mathews County was an established shipbuilding center for the Chesapeake Bay when it broke away from Gloucester in 1791 to become a separate county.

About that time, 12 sailing ships over 20 tons each were built in a single year in Mathews, which the Chiskiake Indians had called Werowocomico.

Between 1790 and 1820, approximately a third of the ships built in Virginia came from Mathews. The sharp, fast vessels, popularly known as Baltimore Clippers, were built throughout the Chesapeake Bay region. Before the War of 1812, these fast ships were simply known as "Virginia built."

From 1802 to 1844, Mathews was an official port of entry for the registration and enrollment of ships. During this period, 10,000 vessels called at the "Port of East River." The customs house stood at Williams Wharf (marker 13), which was a center of maritime activity until the steamers quit running in the 1940s.

Cricket Hill, near Gwynn's Island, was the site of one of the last naval engagements of the Revolutionary War. In June 1776, Continental forces bombarded the British fleet and encampment on Gwynn's Island. Lord Dunsmore, the last royal gov-

ernor, was driven from the colony, ending British rule in Virginia.

When water was the highway, boats were the standard means of travel. The arrival of steamships at Williams Wharf with cargo from Norfolk, Newport News or Baltimore was a daily highlight.

World War II put most of the steamboat lines out of business. In 1942 the government requisitioned most of the bay and coastal steamers for service in the war effort The last remaining steamboat line, the Old Bay Line, stopped its York River to Baltimore run in 1942. About 20 years later, the Old Bay Line dropped passenger service between Baltimore and Norfolk. The steamers stopped for good in the spring of 1962.

Today Mathews has a population of 9,200 people. While it is the smallest county in the Northern Neck and Middle Peninsula with only 87 square miles, it has some 367 miles of shoreline and some of

the area's best public access.

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
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


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

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Middlesex County

History

Middlesex County was formed around 1669 from Lancaster County, which makes it one of the oldest English settlements in the United States. Many plantation homes still stand from the Colonial era and it is rich in history that spans nearly 350 years.

Bordered by the Rappahannock and Piankatank rivers and the Chesapeake Bay, much of its history centers around the water. The town of Urbanna was formed in 1680 as a center for shipping tobacco from surrounding plantations.

Urbanna was the county seat until 1852 when it was moved to Saluda, a more central location for area citizens. Throughout the county are homes built in the 1700's and wartime stories abound dating back to the Revolutionary and Civil wars. During these wars, plantations such as Providence and Rosegill were bombarded and looted.

Stingray Point near Deltaville gained immortal fame as the spot where Captain John Smith was nearly killed by a stingray.

Three centuries ago ships from London, Liverpool, Bristol and Glasgow were common sights on Urbanna Creek. Just across the creek from Urbanna is Rosegill, one of the oldest plantations in America. It was for many years a center of influence

in the Colony and a power in the political and commercial life of this area. It was the home of five generations of Wormeleys, one of the most influential families in the colony. Colonial governors Sir Henry Chicheley and Lord Howard of Effingham made Rosegill their home.

During the Civil War, General George McClellan formulated a plan of attack to take Richmond by starting from Urbanna. The plan was named the Urbanna Plan, but it was never instituted.

In 1862, several Yankee warships bombarded the town but legend has it that the only thing the Yanks killed was an old hare. One of the cannonballs did hit the old courthouse, which today is the Middlesex Woman's Club building on Virginia St.

During the bombardment the townsfolk congregated on the creek bank near where the Urbanna Bridge is located today. Legend has it that an old man by the name of Montague stood at the top of the hill and whenever he saw a flash of a cannon firing he would scream "squat" and the townsfolk would squat down to the ground.

Today Middlesex County has a population of 9,600 and is home to the popular Urbanna Oyster Festival, which draws thousands to enjoy a weekend of music and mollusks every November.

History

Northumberland County is called the Mother County of the Northern Neck.

Presumably settled by the English in 1640, Northumberland was officially established by an act of the Burgesses in Jamestown in 1648. It was later divided into three additional counties, Lancaster, Richmond and Westmoreland Counties.

At its heart is Heathsville, the county seat. The location between the headwaters of the Coan and the Great Wicomico Rivers was chosen as the site of county courthouse in 1679. The building was completed and county justices were moved in 1681.

Over 100 years later, in 1797, citizens established a 20-acre town around the courthouse square naming it in honor of citizen leader John Heath who lived just down the road at Springfield, an historic plantation mansion still standing and occupied today.

In 1992, the National Register of Historic Places designated Heathsville an Historic District, along with the original courthouse and tavern, now a restaurant, gift shop and museum. The courthouse square also includes a blacksmith shop, transportation museum, old jail and carriage house.

Northumberland was once dependent upon

tobacco as its major cash crop and currency. Later, most of its residents relied on the water for their livelihoods. Today, many watermen work as charter boat captains during the summer months. Cruises, like those to Tangier and Smith Island, are major tourist attractions.

The quaint fishing village of Reedville, with its "Millionaire's Row" of Victorian homes, remains a tribute to the area's heritage and the Reedville Fisherman's Museum provides a comprehensive overview of the village's fishing industry, both past and current.

Burgess is home to the Northern Neck Farm Museum, which features the area's agricultural history, from the Indians who roamed the lands to the large commercial canneries that once lined the Northern Neck shores. Visitors can learn about agriculture, view the tools that assisted the farmers and learn the impact of these industries on the people of this region.

With more than 556 miles of scenic shoreline, Northumberland's rustic atmosphere has lured many urbanites. Northumberland's population has been changing in recent years from

Richmond County

History

Known as the Gateway to the Northern Neck, Richmond County was established in 1692 from the old Rappahannock County.

Originally explored by Captain John Smith in 1607–1608, the county was settled in 1640 when people migrated up from settlements below the Rappahannock River. It was presumably named after the First Duke of Richmond, cousin to both King William III and Queen Mary. One of the early settlers was Colonel Moore Fauntleroy, who patented land in the county in 1650.

The first county seat was thought to be at the mouth of Little Carter's Creek, then moved to Naylors, an early river settlement. The seat was moved inland in 1730 and renamed the Richmond County Courthouse. In 1831, the name was changed to Warsaw in sympathy with the Polish struggle for independence. Warsaw was incorporated as the county's only town in 1947 and is now the site of the courthouse, built in 1748, and the 188-year-old clerk's office, which housed the Richmond County Museum from 1992 to

Richmond County became the Gateway to the Northern Neck in 1927 when the Downing Bridge across the Rappahannock River

at Tappahannock was opened, connecting Richmond County to Essex and opening up travel to and from the Northern Neck. The bridge, which replaced 200 years of ferry service, was dedicated by Sen. Thomas Downing of the Northern Neck.

Richmond County was the home of the last president to be elected under the Articles of Confederation. In 1788, Judge Cyrus Griffin was elected president of the U.S. Congress Assembly and held that position until the U.S. Constitution was adopted and his successor, George Washington, was elected as the first President of the U.S.

William A. Jones gained recognition for Richmond County in 1916 when, in supporting self-government for all people, he authorized a bill that guaranteed independence for the Philippines. In 1926, the people of the Philippines erected a memorial at Jones' gravesite in the St. John's Episcopal Churchward in Warsaw

Today Richmond County has a population of 8,880. Serving as the crossroads of U.S. Route 360 and State Route 3, the county seat of Warsaw is currently the headquarters for many regional government agencies as well as a regional community college, vocational center, and the regional jail.

Westmoreland County

History

Established in 1653 by the colonial government in Jamestown, Westmoreland County was named for a British shire. The county's most significant contributions to history include its fostering of more statesmen than any other county in the country, and for the Leedstown Resolutions.

Considered the forerunner of the Declaration of Independence, the Leedstown Resolutions were signed in February, 1766. It was the first organized resistance to English aggression on American liberties. Prepared by Richard Henry Lee, the document was signed by 115 patriots who bound themselves together "To Prevent The Execution of The Stamp Act."

Stratford Hall was the boyhood home of Richard Henry Lee and Francis Lightfoot Lee, signers of the Declaration of Independence.

General Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee was a Revolutionary War hero in his 20s and served as one of General George Washington's most trusted officers. He is the father of Robert E. Lee.

General Robert E. Lee was born in 1807 at Stratford and soon after the family moved to Alexandria. Lee was a colonel in the U. S. Army when the Civil War broke out. Offered the command of the Union Army, Lee declined because he "could take no part in an invasion" of his home-

land

Most notable among the statesmen of Westmoreland, General George Washington, commander of the Continental Army, Revolutionary War hero and first President of the United States, was born at Popes Creek in 1732.

James Monroe, the nation's fifth president, was born in 1758 on a farm near Monroe Bay. Monroe served as president from 1817 to 1825.

Today, Westmoreland has a population

of 16,700 and is home to the only offtrack betting casino in the area. Fishing and agriculture are still the area's mainstays, with wineries, produce farms and seafood packers among some of the most prominent businesses in the county.
