I. Previous Meetings


October 15, 2001 Technical Dinner

Mr. Darcy Paulichuk, P. Eng., of Alliant Engineering & Consulting Ltd. and Mr. Bob Park of McAsphalt Western Ltd. gave an interesting and informative presentation on Micro-Surfacing technology and its importance to road maintenance.

Some of the key points members took away from the presentation were:

- Micro-Surfacing's history and versatility; developed by German scientists in the late 1960's that incorporates select bitumen, aggregates, polymers, and emulsifiers, producing a stable cold-mix paving material to remedy a broad range of road maintenance problems.
- Applications in Alberta transportation 2001 projects and abroad (e.g. German Autobahn, throughout the United States, Europe and Australia)
- How Micro-Surfacing is made and applied, often permitting traffic within *one hour*
- Micro-Surfacing Applications and Advantages..."creating a new stable surface that is resistant to rutting and shoving in summer and to cracking in winter."..."with a life expectancy usually exceeding seven years".
- Universal applications in the maintenance and optimisation of road surfaces providing..."attractive cost benefits, ecological compatibility's, and road safety benefits such as grip improvement, surface drainage efficiency, and better sound absorption"
- Future monitoring and pavement maintenance programs that extend pavement life by preventing damage from water seepage and oxidation.

VI. Did You Know That.....

Japan's Future-phones

You've heard the hype about 3G, the technology that promises to bring high-speed Internet and even video to the cellphone.

DoCoMo offers a 3G videophone, a standard 3G phone without video and a high-speed wireless modem card for portable computers.



Most impressive is the videophone. A rotating mini-camera is built into the hinge between the phone and the lid. To make video calls, you spin the camera to face inward and hold the handset out in front of you. You need to use an earphone and mike while doing this. For the most part, I found the video images crisp and surprisingly unjerky. If you rotate the camera to face outward, you can also use the phone like a camcorder or shoot still photos.

The phones and connection service are expensive. The video model sells for between \$518 and \$616, depending where you buy it. And by my reckoning, sending and receiving a lot of data could at least double my monthly phone bill. Another drawback with the videophones is that few people use them yet, making it difficult to find anyone to call. Battery life on the new phones is dramatically shorter, with the videophone offering 55 hours of standby time according to DoCoMo, one-eighth what I get on my current handset.

Jiang's Biggest Gamble

Global turmoil has set the stage for a new, more modern China. Will Jiang Zemin have the guts and the political savvy to push reforms — and stave off further social unrest? By SHAI OSTE



Crowds flooded into Tiananmen Square, shouting slogans and carrying banners. On the university campuses of northern Beijing, students slammed down their books and rushed outside. But unlike a decade ago, these public outcries were not calls for democracy or an end to corruption. Instead, the crowds gathered to sing the national anthem and shout "I love China." The source of this joy? China's soccer team ended 44 years of frustration by defeating Oman and qualifying for next year's World Cup. It's the kind of spontaneous outpouring of emotional nationalism that reinforces a belief that this is China's - and President Jiang Zemin's - moment in the sun. "It might be premature to say the state of our republic is strong," the English-language, Communist Party-controlled China Daily wrote in a National Day editorial. "But never before has our nation been so well-poised for mighty undertakings."

The terrorist attacks on the U.S. and the war on Afghanistan have catapulted China onto the global stage. Somewhat grudgingly, Jiang has backed the U.S. war on terrorism, despite a welling up of anti-American sentiment at home. The unprepossessing former engineer deserves a great deal of credit for China's rising stature. He has overseen 12 years of robust economic growth, during which the country was transformed from a maker of cheap plastic trinkets to an I.T. powerhouse. During his watch, Hong Kong and Macau returned to the motherland, economic ties with Taiwan deepened, and China's influence in Asia grew. Beijing got the Olympics after being shunned in 1993. Jiang has overseen the professionalization of government, as technocrats are promoted from within. And finally, after 15 years of negotiating, China has gained entry into the World Trade Organization.

But China's moment comes at a time of crisis. As the global economy plummets, China's exports will slow, putting new strains on society. If Jiang manages the challenges that now face China, the world's most populous nation could emerge as a respected player on the world stage, the political and commercial leader of Asia, and a stabilizing influence. If he stumbles, or succumbs to domestic political pressures, China could become an international bully and face political tumult at home. To succeed, Jiang will have to take chances on political and legal reform that he has thus far tried to avoid. He has just two years to put China on the right path, for he will step down from the Presidency by 2003.

The willingness to adapt may wind up being Jiang's true legacy. He shed his conservative fears of a domestic backlash to back China's entry into the WTO, the greatest achievement of his term. But the difficulties China faces in the coming years will require an even greater readiness to open up to global influences that can't be kept out and the desires of a population that can't be kept down. When Jiang hands the reins to the next generation of leaders 2003, he will have guided his society through the tumultuous post-revolutionary era. If he gets the next steps right, China will be on the way to becoming a truly modern country.

Hong Kong Update

The Hong Kong Government will be investing over C\$3.5 billion in major tourism developments, including Disney Theme Park, over the next five years.

Chief Executive, Mr. Tung Chee Hwa, said that Hong Kong was already Asia Pacific's leading tourist destination, welcoming more than 13 million visitors last year. He said that Tourism was one of the key economic drivers of Hong Kong.

Mr. Tung hilighted five major tourism developments:

- Development of Yam O on Lantau onto a new tourism node
- Leverage on the habours and countryside of Sai Kung, encouraging water sports and world class resorts
- Create a cultural belt for new arts, culture and entertainment areas on the West Kowloon Reclamation
- Build a heritage, entertainment, and dining area in Central
- Support the Ocean Park on its strategic plan, integrating it into the new Aberdeen Harbour tourism node

The Disney Theme Park looks forward to Mickey and Minnie in 2005.
