American colleges and universities—how will they change and how should they change as we enter a new century? To cast light on some of the vital issues involved in higher education, the Pope Center has convened a number of experts who will share with you their views on the direction of higher education.

This year's conference will focus on several topics of importance to higher education in North Carolina. Our first panel will discuss the condition of teacher training in the state. Do our education schools give the ideal preparation for the difficult task that teachers will face? Our second panel will take a look at academic freedom. Where should the lines be drawn? Our final discussion will consider the difficulties of private colleges and universities in a state where the government's university system is very heavily subsidized. Other talks feature key state and federal officials who have observed higher education closely and critically. As always, there will be ample opportunity for audience interaction. DIRECTIONS TO THE FRIDAY CENTER

FROM GREENSBORO:

Take I-40 East to
Exit 273 (Hwy. 54
West/Chapel Hill).
Take a right off the
ramp. Proceed to the
3rd stoplight and turn
left at Friday Center
Drive (approx. 2
miles). The Friday
Center is on the right.

FROM WINSTON-SALEM: Take I-40 East through Greensboro and follow the above directions.


FROM CHARLOTTE: Take I-85 North to Greensboro (I-85 and I-40 join here). Take I-40 East to Exit 273 (Hwy. 54 West/Chapel Hill). Take a right off the ramp. Proceed to 3rd stoplight and turn left at Friday Center Drive (approx. 2 miles). The Friday Center is on the right.

FROM RALEIGH: Take I-40 to Exit 273B (Hwy. 54 West/Chapel Hill). Proceed to the 4th stoplight and turn left on Friday Center Drive (approx. 2 miles). The Friday Center will be on the right.

FROM FAYETTEVILLE: Take I-95 North to I-40 (Exit 81). Follow the above directions from Raleigh.

FROM DURHAM: Take I-85 South to I-501. Take I-40 East to Exit 273 (54 West/Chapel Hill). Take a right off the ramp. Proceed to the 3rd stoplight and turn left at Friday Center Drive (approx. 2 miles). The Friday Center is on the right.

If you are arriving from the SOUTH on I-501 North, take the on-ramp to your right for the I-501 Bypass and 54 East. Follow the Bypass (approx. 2 miles). Take the Hwy. 54 East Exit (towards Raleigh). Proceed to the 4th stoplight and turn right at Friday Center Drive. The Friday Center is on the right.
