

#### **WACO's First War Baby**

We have come across the original WACO Words and thought it would be interesting to revisit what was being published back then.

This article is from April 1943.



Here's a photograph we know Waco employees will treasure. This unusual picture shows air-borne troops about to enter the XCG-3, Waco's "First-born" war glider.

Back in April 1941, the Waco Aircraft Company was given a contract to design and fabricate a 9-place troop carrying glider which was to be used as a trainer and a 15-place troop and cargo carrying glider which was to be used as a service unit. This important creative assignment fell to three of our skilled engineers - A. F. Arcier, the Designer and Chief Engineer; M. P. Baker, Waco's Assistant Engineer and F. A. Dobson, Project Engineer.

By November 1941, Mr. Arcier's designs were completed and were soon in the hands of the prime sub-contractors who started to produce America's first freight trains of the air.

This wasn't the first time that Waco had manufactured gliders, for back in 1931 the Troy plant, then just ten years old, created a glider to supply the demand of the sportsman. Waco made three hundred of these soaring craft and sold them for \$385 each.

These first gliders, the sportsman's toy

of a decade ago, soared the upward currents of the air and provided thrills and keen fun for all. It was some of the best kind of flight training, and besides being a lot of fun gave many a man his first lesson in flying. Waco little dreamed that these 1931 gliders would some day become the fore runner of such important instruments of war as troop and cargo carriers.

The glider picture is quite a simple one. Like the locomotive of a train, the powered plane can tow much more than it can carry. Take one powered plane and tow three gliders and you have a glider train of infinite value. Fully loaded gliders can easily be carried at the desired altitude, released some distance from the objective under cover of darkness, and can land without attracting the attention of the enemy.

Gliders have a very definite advantage over parachute landings in as much as they can reach their destination with full equipment. Food, ammunition, guns and even jeeps and tanks can be carried to points inaccessible through ordinary methods of land or water transportation and, of course, are built at a fraction of the cost of transport planes.
















#### Treasurer's Financial Report on 2012, by Don Willis

I thought it would be appropriate to update WACO's members on the financial condition of WACO as we end 2012 and begin a very busy year in 2013.

WACO is ending a very active period of building and growth. Since 2009 WACo has constructed the WACO museum building light tower, memorial patio, the paved parking lot with lights, refinished of the barn, constructed of the picnic shelter and RC aircraft sun shelter and built the Quonset hangar. Our facility is now in tip top shape and we are able to offer year round programs and activities.

This is paying dividends in 2013 as WACO has booked several large events which will generate revenue for WACO and support our triple goals of historic preservation, education and community service.

Balance Sheet: WACO ended 2012 with a strong balance sheet; assets of over \$1.7 million and liabilities of \$355K. Over \$1.1 million of WACO's asset value is in fixed assets (land and buildings), and we have an additional \$375k in inventory/artifacts.

Our cash stood at \$243k, but about \$203k of that is restricted to ongoing programs of building or the learning center. So our unrestricted cash stood at about \$40k. WACOs only large liability is the mortgage which stood at \$221k.

Income generation: Our income in 2012 was about \$158k and came from grants (43%), events-rides (19%), giftshop (12%), corporate sponsors (10%), fees and museum admissions (9%), dues and member donations

(5%), misc (2%). In the future we are planning to drive this to more self-generated (giftshop, events, rides, facility use) income and less grant dependency. The goal would be to have no more than 25% of our income from grants.

Expenses: WACO operates on a budget (excluding capital improvements) of about \$125k per year. WACOs expenses are mostly due to debt service (10%), building expenses (24%), salaries (27%), administrative and advertising (14%) and cost of rides and inventory (19%).

Our paid staff consists of the Executive Director (half time), the Learning Center Director (half time), and two museum monitors (about 4 days per month each). All the rest of the WACO mission (field maintenance, building maintenance, administration and treasury, event participation, Learning center programs, etc.) is accomplished by volunteers. We can't thank you enough for your dedication.

2013 Challenges: We have one unusual financial challenge in 2013: protection of our use of WACO airspace by securing the land on the south approach of the airfield. As some of you recall, this land on the Runway 36 approach is an EPA superfund site which has been in cleanup and remediation for the last 12 years. It is managed by the EPA and this year the EPA will seek to find a buyer for the property.

The WACO board has decided that we must be prepared to protect our airspace from possible incursion, which may include purchase of the property.

An appraisal has not been completed by the EPA yet, and the land has obvious problems for many uses due to its history and the ongoing EPA requirements, but it would be useful to WACO to protect the approach to our existing runway and for a runway extension at some time in the future.

So stay tuned as we learn more about this development.
