1.0 Background and Methodology

Injury Free Nova Scotia engaged us to conduct survey research on the topic of cannabis.

The primary objectives of the research were to:

- □ Assess public opinions on the recreational use of cannabis;
- Examine current levels of awareness of medical and recreational cannabis use;
- Determine current levels of knowledge of the risks associated with cannabis use.

Methodology

This project evaluated Nova Scotians' opinions on cannabis using survey research. We conducted telephone surveys with **400** adult (18+) Nova Scotians. The interviews were conducted between January 22, 2014 and February 2, 2015 by IMP Customer Care – Market Research Division, from their call centre facility in Windsor, Nova Scotia.

The sample was "boosted up" with cell phone numbers to ensure adequate representation of younger Nova Scotians, who are increasingly difficult to reach via landlines. The sample was provided by ASDE Survey Sampler. ASDE Survey Sampler is a privately owned Canadian company, with the ISA 9001-2008 certification.

A sample of this size yields results that are accurate within +/- 4.9 percentage points 19 times out of 20.

Sample quotas were set for the age, region, and gender of the respondent. The data was weighted by these variables to ensure that the final sample is representative of the province's population.

Questionnaire Design

We designed the survey in cooperation with Injury Free Nova Scotia.

Additional Considerations

The percentage totals detailed in this report may not add up to 100, due to rounding. Also, all figures are reported in integers.



3.0 Detailed Findings

3.1 Marijuana Use (general)

When asked about the important public health issues facing the province today, a large proportion of Nova Scotians mention issues relating to their ability to see doctors (e.g., wait times, access to family doctors, lack of doctors). A single respondent mentioned "illegal" drugs.






The vast majority of Nova Scotians see marijuana use as being common among those under the age of 19 and feel this use is increasing or staying the same.

Education:

Income:

Perceptions of marijuana use among youth appear to vary according to education level. Nova Scotians with less than a high school education are much more likely to say it is *not common at all* (17%); those with a college education are most likely to say it is *very common* (54%), while those with a university education are most likely to say *somewhat common* (50%).

Marijuana Use: Nova Scotians who have used marijuana are more likely to say marijuana use among youth is *very common* or *somewhat common* (93% total) than those who have not used marijuana (74% total).

Those with lower incomes are more likely to see marijuana use among youth as *increasing*: 52% of those who make under \$50k versus 34% of those who make over \$100k.


Gender: Women (49%) are more likely than men (33%) to say they think that marijuana use among those under 19 is *increasing*.


Area: Nova Scotians who live in an *urban* (37%) or *rural* (38%) area are the least likely to say that recreational marijuana use among those under 19 is *very common* (compared to 49% in *suburbs* and 46% in *towns*). Those in *towns* are most likely to say this use is *increasing* (54%).

Nova Scotians also see marijuana use among those <u>over 19</u> as being common; they are less likely to say it is *very common*, but also less likely to say it is *not common at all*. A slim majority of Nova Scotians feels that the prevalence of marijuana use among those over 19 is *staying the same*.

Area:

Age: Nova Scotians ages 35 to 54 are the most likely to say that recreational marijuana use among adults (19+) is very common (41%).

Geography: Residents of Industrial Cape Breton (53%) and the HRM (40%) are more likely to feel that recreational marijuana use among adults is *increasing* than residents of other areas.

Those with lower household incomes are most likely to say that marijuana use for recreational purposes is *very common* among adults age 19 and older (45% of those with household incomes of \$50k or less, versus 28% of those with household incomes over \$100k).


Those with kids under 18 living at home are more likely than those without kids to say that recreation marijuana use among adults is *very common* (43% vs. 32%).

Those in *suburban* areas are least likely to say that recreational marijuana use among adults is *very common* (24%). Those in *towns* are most likely to say this use is *increasing* (48%).

3.2 Opinions on Marijuana Use

Ratings of the acceptability of recreational marijuana use for adults (19+) vary greatly among Nova Scotians. The average rating is 2.9 on a 5-point scale.


Marijuana Use: As expected, Nova Scotians who have used marijuana are more accepting of marijuana use by adults for recreational purposes (average ratings of 3.6, versus 2.2 among those who have not tried marijuana).

Gender: Men (average rating of 3.3) are more accepting of recreational marijuana use than women (2.6 average rating).

Age: Acceptance of recreational marijuana use decreases with age (3.3 average for those ages 18 to 34, versus 2.9 for those 35-54, and 2.7 for those older than 55).

Nova Scotians are less likely to believe recreational marijuana is 'safe' (compared to 'acceptable'), with nearly one-half rating its safety as either a "1" or a "2" on a 5-point scale.

Q. On a scale from 1 to 5, where 1 is not safe at all, and 5 is extremely safe, how safe is the use of recreational marijuana, in your opinion?






Marijuana Use: As expected, Nova Scotians who have used marijuana are more likely to view recreational marijuana use as safe than those who haven't used marijuana (average ratings of 3.1 versus 1.9)

Gender: Men are more likely than women to rate recreational marijuana use as safe (2.7 versus 2.4).

Age: Ratings of the safety of recreational marijuana use decrease with age (3.0 average for those ages 18 to 34 versus 2.5 for those 35-54 and 2.3 for those older than 55).

Nearly all Nova Scotians feel that marijuana use increases the risk of poor driving behaviour; they are less convinced of its impact on intelligence, mental illness, and the risk of heart attack.





Further Analysis

Marijuana Use:

Nova Scotians who have *not tried* marijuana are more likely to say that its use increases the risk of every condition/behaviour listed. For example, 60% of non-users believe that marijuana use increases the risk of heart attack, versus only 32% of those who have tried the drug.

Parents:

Adults with children living at home are more likely than those without children at home to say that marijuana use increases the risk of *mental illness* (58% vs. 42%). However, those without children are more likely than those with children at home to say that marijuana use increases risk of *poor driving behaviour* (86% vs. 76%).


Area:

Those in *suburban* areas (68%) are most likely to say that marijuana use increases the risk of *lower intelligence*, while those in *urban* areas are the least likely (43%). This same pattern is seen for *mental illness* (61% for *suburbs*, 34% for *urban*).

3.3 Medical Marijuana

More than six in ten Nova Scotians estimate that the use of marijuana for medical purposes is very or somewhat common in the province. And most think that its use is increasing, compared to 10 years ago.

Q. To the best of your knowledge, how common is the use of marijuana for medical purposes among Nova Scotians?





Age: Nova Scotians under 35 are the most likely to estimate that medical marijuana use is not very common (41%).



Geography: Residents of the South Shore (67%) are much more likely to say that medical marijuana use is somewhat common than residents of other areas. Similarly, South Shore (28%) and Valley (28%) residents are more likely to say that the use of medical marijuana is *staying about the same* than residents of other areas.

More than one third of Nova Scotians personally know someone who uses marijuana for medical purposes. For those who do know someone, most say that those individuals were prescribed marijuana by a medical professional.

Marijuana Use: Nova Scotians who have used marijuana are more likely than those who haven't to know someone who uses medical


marijuana (45% vs. 28%).

Area: Nova Scotians who live in towns (47%) or rural (48%) areas are more likely to know someone who uses medical marijuana

than those who live in urban (25%) or suburban (23%) areas.

Ratings of the safety of medical marijuana are significantly higher than those for recreational use. Less than one quarter of Nova Scotians give medical marijuana an unsafe rating ("1" or "2").

Further Analysis

Marijuana Use:

Nova Scotians who have used marijuana are more likely to view medical marijuana use as safe than those who haven't used marijuana (average ratings of 3.9 versus 3.0)

Age:

Ratings of the safety of medical marijuana use are highest among Nova Scotians ages 18 to 34 (average of 4.0).

3.4 Personal Marijuana Use

Nearly half of all Nova Scotians report that they have personally experimented with marijuana. Of those who have, most began before the age of 25.

Further Analysis

Age: Younger (18-34) Nova Scotians are much more likely to reporting experimenting with marijuana than those 55+ (70% versus

28%), and more than half (52%) of young Nova Scotians report first trying marijuana before they were 16.

Geography: Reported experimentation is highest in the HRM (57%) and Industrial Cape Breton (55%).

Gender:

Men (54%) are more likely than women (44%) to report having experimented with marijuana. *Among those who have experimented*, there is an even larger gender gap in terms of reported use within the previous year (35% among men versus 13% among women).

Parents:

Adults with children living at home are less likely to have smoked marijuana in the last year than those with children (14% vs. 32%).
