Student Attitudes to School Survey

All Grade 5 & 6 students will complete the anonymous 'Attitudes to School Survey' before May 10th. This survey is conducted every year and it is a chance for students to express their views on our school in general, their experiences in the classroom, with the teachers and other students. The information is useful for the school in planning programs and activities and to continue to improve.

NAPLAN

All Grade 3 & 5 students will participate in NAPLAN testing on May 13-16 2013. We **strongly encourage** students to be in attendance on these days as the data we retrieve from these assessments is meaningful and important to us.

School Uniform

I have attached the school dress code below as a reminder to everyone to ensure your child is complying with the school's uniform requirements. Some of the things staff has noticed:

- quite a few students have come to school this week in shorts and a shirt and no jumper. Please ensure your child is dressed appropriately for the weather forecast that day.
- Jewellery- many students have been wearing necklaces, dangly earrings, rings, bracelets etc to school recently. The dress code document states "*No jewellery is to be worn except for ear studs and watches*". This is quite specific about what students are permitted and not permitted to wear, please ensure your child complies with this.
- Maroon pants, netball and maroon skirts and shorts- All pants, skorts and shorts should be navy blue not maroon. Maroon shirts with the school logo are acceptable. Netball skirts are not part of the school uniform so are therefore not permitted.
- Skate shoes- although the dress code does not specifically mention shoes other than them being flat heeled and having enclosed toes, I have noticed some older students wearing the big colourful skate shoes. These are not suitable for physical education and other running activities and they look untidy and cumbersome. I have spoken directly to the students who have been wearing them and they have worn more appropriate shoes as a result.
- Coloured Socks-Some students have been deliberately wearing socks that are not either white or blue.
- Dresses-Please note girls are not permitted to wear track pants or leggings under summer dresses but they are allowed to wear tights.

Quarry Hill PS Dress Code

Quarry Hill Primary School colours are navy, maroon and white. Children are expected to wear....

Girls:

 navy/white checked school dress or (tracksuit pants and leggings are not to be worn under the summer dresses)

Girls/Boys:

- white, maroon or navy polo shirt
- navy and maroon rugby top or bomber jacket
- navy shorts, skorts or pants
- Shoes are to be flat heeled with enclosed toes. Sneakers are preferable for all physical education activities.
- Socks & tights must be in school colours.
- Broad brimmed hats are issued by the school to all new prep enrolments. These are to be worn for all outside activities from September until the end of April. This complies with the school's Sun Smart Policy.
- Children are encouraged to wear clothing with the school logo. <u>All</u> other logos are unacceptable.
- > Stripes on pants, shorts, shirts or windcheaters are not allowed.
- Denim clothing is not allowed.
- Shorts and pants must be in one of the following fabrics: cotton drill, gaberdine, basketball weave, fleecy knit or rugby knit.
- No jewellery is to be worn except for ear studs and watches.
- > Hair bands, ribbons, clips etc must be in school colours.
- > Sunglasses are acceptable but must comply with minimum ASA standards and be clearly named.

The Department of Education Condition Assessment Program

As a part of the government's key election commitments, a condition assessment of all government schools has taken place. The assessment took 10 months and involved 1,539 government schools across 1,686 campuses. In total, the assessors reviewed approximately 27,000 school buildings.

Individual Condition Assessment Reports have been prepared for each school, itemising all building elements assessed and the overall rating for the school. The reports also show how each school has fared compared with other like schools and the state average.

These Condition Assessment Reports deliver a comprehensive industry best-practice assessment for all school buildings, building services and site infrastructure at every Victorian government school at a single point in time. The reports show the condition of each school building and identify those most in need of maintenance, or replacement.

The Victorian Government will invest \$51.5 million in the 2013 calendar year to improve the buildings at the 250 neediest schools.

All schools, even those with facilities above the condition threshold, should use their report's findings as a valuable tool to help manage planned maintenance and channel SRP funding.

THE STATEWIDE PICTURE – KEY RESULTS

The overall results from Condition Assessment Reports reveal that:

- 74 per cent of school buildings are above the threshold condition.
- 26 per cent of school buildings are below the threshold, requiring some maintenance work.

READING YOUR REPORT - RATINGS EXPLAINED

Each building, building service and infrastructure element has been given a rating between 1.00 and 5.00 by an independent expert assessor; broken down along the following lines:

Assessment Rating	Condition Description
4.51 - 5.00	Excellent: Asset has no defect; appearance is as new. Only preventative maintenance required
3.51 - 4.50	Good: Asset exhibits superficial wear and tear, minor defects, minor signs of deterioration to surface finishes; no major defects exist; does not require major maintenance. Condition-based maintenance required - Minor Repairs
2.51 - 3.50	Fair: Asset is in average condition; deteriorated surfaces require attention; services are functional, but require attention; backlog maintenance work exists. Repairs required
1.51 - 2.50	Worn: Asset has deteriorated badly; serious structural problems; general appearance is poor with eroded protective coatings; elements are broken, services are not performing; significant number of major defects exist. Major repairs required
1.00 - 1.50	Poor: Asset has failed; is not operational and is unfit for occupancy or normal use. Replacement required

Condition threshold ratings have then been used to enable all schools to be equitably compared and Victoria's neediest school buildings identified. Core buildings and site infrastructure receiving a below threshold rating have been considered for funding in 2013, with the neediest buildings located at 250 schools to be funded this year.

What does Quarry Hill Primary School's Report say?

Our report indicated that we will receive some maintenance funding as various aspects of the old building surrounding the quadrangle were deemed to be poor in the rating assessment scale above. These aspects included the roof, coverings, eaves, fascia's, rainwater goods and external finishes. All schools are encouraged to use the data from their Condition Assessment Report to assist with planned maintenance and determine individual areas for action that can be addressed using their existing maintenance funding allocation.

All students have been practising for cross country and will continue to do so right up to the school event on Friday May 10th. We acknowledge that not all students enjoy cross country running, however, this is part of our PE program and is a compulsory activity and we expect every child to participate to the best of their ability. We also expect that all students will be present on this day to represent their house in the school competition; this is not an opportunity to allow your child to stay at home because they do not like running!

Chinese Study Tour program

It is likely that Quarry Hill along with nine other Bendigo Primary Schools will again host up to five Chinese students each (hopefully from our sister school Wencui Primary School) from approximately 14th October to 9th December, as we did last year in a cultural immersion program. At this stage I am seeking an expression of interest from families (preferably with a student in Grades 4-6) who might like to be involved in hosting a student for four weeks (half the study tour program) or for all eight weeks. Please let me know if you are interested or you would like more information about the home stay program and when more information becomes available I will contact families personally. I am travelling back to Suzhou Industrial Park in China in late May, early June with the other 'Team China' delegates from Bendigo. We will be working on strengthening our sister school relationships and exploring the possibility of a student study tour from Bendigo Primary Schools to China for an 8 day experience next year.



School Camps & Excursions: Asthma

If your child has asthma, attending school camps and excursions can introduce them to new asthma triggers especially if they are going into new environments. It is essential that your child can participate fully and safely in all school activities. The following is a list of considerations to make for your child before they go on school camp or an excursion:

- Is your child's asthma currently well controlled (*e.g.* no symptoms at night, reliever use less than 3 times per week)?
- Has your child had an asthma attack or asthma symptoms recently?
- Does the school have an Asthma Action Plan for your child?
- Has the school asked you to complete a School Camp and Excursion Medical Update Form?
- Does your child have their reliever medication and spacer on hand at all times?
- Are they attending with any other medications to be taken on the camp/excursion? If so, are there sufficient instructions to staff for use/dosage?
- Does your child self-administer their medication? If so, has their technique been checked recently?

Asthma and Complementary Therapies

Complementary or alternative therapies are becoming increasingly popular in Australia, and many people seek out complementary remedies to support their health. As with any health condition, if you or a family member have asthma and are considering using complementary therapies, we strongly advise that you communicate with your doctor about your asthma treatment. They may even be able to suggest safe therapies to try! It is equally important to communicate to any complementary therapists about your asthma so that they can avoid treatments that are known to potentially make ones asthma worse.

Complementary therapies considered safe for asthma are: exercise programs, vitamin D, low-salt diet, some Chinese herbal medicines, some Indian (ayurvedic) herbs, music therapy, tai chi, buteyko (breathing technique).

Complementary therapies considered potentially unsafe for asthma are: inhaled salt (small risk of a fungal respiratory infection), echinacea, bee pollen or royal jelly (propolis), and products containing aspirin.

Remember, response to treatments and medications differs between people. Make sure you or your children continue taking any asthma medications prescribed unless otherwise instructed by your doctor. Stopping asthma medications suddenly can result in worsening asthma symptoms and even an asthma attack.
