Complex Families: introduction

- Government commitment to 'turn around' the lives of families with multiple problems/complex needs
- Around £8billion a year is spent on some 120,000 families that have multiple problems. This costs public sector disproportionate amount of money
- Funding via hundreds of separate schemes and agencies, but despite this investment families' problems continue
- Focus on complex families is part of wider Public Service Reform.

Complex Families: introduction

- We need a transformational reduction in demand, away from unplanned, expensive, reactive spend, moving the most challenging people and places from dependency towards self-reliance
- This requires new delivery models, underpinned by workforce reform and effective use of information, building on Better Life Chances pilots
- And new investment models that enable us to work at scale, so money can flow freely across silos – with incentives for partners to invest jointly to achieve returns for the whole public sector.

Complex Families and Community Budgets

- Community Budgets provides mechanism to help public sector partners invest in local priorities/agreed outcomes, e.g. complex families
- Not about a new source of money but a different way of using funding
- Works by pooling budgets and bringing together local priorities and public money so agencies can find the right solutions to issues in their area in a new and coordinated way
- Manchester announced as one of 16 Community Budget pilot areas in 2010
- Manchester Investment Fund established to act as a Community Budget focusing on complex families.

Manchester Criteria for Complex Families

- Crime and ASB *(also TFU)
- School exclusions or attendance below 85%** (also TFU)
- Worklessness and out-of-work benefits (also TFU)
- LAC and children on the edge of care
- Homelessness
- Mental health issues
- Alcohol misuse
- Substance misuse
- Benefits (not only out-of-work)
- Domestic abuse
- Debt
- Transiency
- Non-engagement.

Families with *three or more* of these criteria can be referred into the complex families project.

Message to staff – if in doubt on one of the issues, still refer.

A Manchester family includes single adult and adult-only families.


Scaling up: Manchester Phase 2

- Given the good progress made and the scale of ambition, MCC and partners will extend the approach from April 2012 to a much larger area
- We will work with 1,000 families across the SRF North
 Manchester area plus Collyhurst
- Learn from Phase 1 revised delivery model (next slide), revised identification and referral processes incorporating developments in the Troubled Families Unit, improved sequencing and prioritisation
- Partners involved in the design of Phase 2 from the start, ensuring their services and referral mechanisms are integrated effectively

Scaling up: Manchester Phase 2

- Prospectus for Investment Agreements setting out
 - New Delivery Model
 - Who benefits return on investment
 - Who invests
 - How savings will be apportioned incremental benefits will be reinvested
 - Governance and performance management
- NDM can evolve as Phase 1 evidence emerges, as RCT not required
- Workforce challenges will require significantly more FTEs

WHAT IS DIFFERENT ABOUT THE NEW MODEL?

- Evidence based on what actually works (not what we think works)
- Single assessment of need means we see the whole picture for the family not just the bit that relates to one service
- Interventions planned so they can happen in the right order, at the right time
- Support services working together (e.g. drug and alcohol treatment)
- Flexible and assertive support to families so that the interventions are more likely to work
- Better tracking of cases
- More evidence to help plan for the future

ESF Programme for Complex Families

- DWP co-financed: Funding for 3 years to support local families and individuals with multiple problems
- Tackling entrenched worklessness is the priority but also address multiple issues of the family affecting ability to gain employment
- Focussed on less complex individuals and families than other interventions e.g. FIP
- In Manchester G4S has subcontracted delivery of the contract to 3 Family Support Brokers - Work Solutions, Pertemps and Pinnacle People split on a ward by ward basis
- Full integration into Manchester's Complex Families
 Programme providing quality assurance and co-ordination between interventions

Criteria for the ESF Programme

- One member of family must be on a DWP working age benefit.
- The individual can passport the rest of the family into the programme
- If an individual is already on the Work Programme they will not be eligible for ESF family provision. However, this does not affect the eligibility of other family members who will be able to receive support from the ESF families' provision

Likely referrals include:

- Prevention looking to prevent families from falling into crisis
- 'Chaotic but not critical'
- Potentially Level 2 or 3 families on the spectrum of need
- Families who are ready for a conversation about work
- Families who, with some support, will be ready for a conversation about work
- Families who have gone through FIP and need further support

ESF Criteria in Manchester

(to fit in with the wider Complex Families Programme)

- At the start of the provision at least one member of the family must be in receipt of a DWP working age benefit
- They or their family must also exhibit <u>one</u> of the following criteria from the list below:
 - Crime and ASB *(also TFU)
 - School exclusions or attendance below 85%** (also TFU)
 - L.A.C. and children on the edge of care
 - Homelessness
 - Mental health issues
 - Alcohol misuse
 - Substance misuse
 - Benefits (not only out of work)
 - Domestic abuse
 - Debt
 - Transiency
 - Non engagement

NB. If the family meet <u>three or more</u> of the criteria they should be considered for other interventions e.g. FIP however the appropriate intervention will be considered for all referrals by professionals within the Local Authority

How do I make a referral?

- Identify the family/individual this may be a family/individual you have come across in your day to day activity or have picked up on as part of wider discussions
- 2. Check the family/individual meets the criteria as a rough guide a family/individual with three or more of the criteria can be referred into the complex families programme. A Manchester family also includes single adult and adult only families


How do I make a referral?

- 3. Obtain fully informed explicit consent from household/individual to make the referral.
- The Complex Families Referral form asks you to confirm that you have gained consent from the household/individual to make the referral and to share information relating to the referral.
- To record evidence of informed consent a 'Consent to Refer Form' has been created.
- The signed consent form is held on file by referrer for every case referred through to Complex Families programme.

How do I make a referral?

- 4. Fill in the Complex Families Referral Form or ESF Referral Form and sent through to the Complex Families inbox (cf.referrals/mcc@manchester.gov.uk) or the form can be faxed securely on 0161 274 0025
- 5. The referrer is contacted and notified which intervention the case has been allocated to and provided with the name and contact details for the key worker

Summary of the Complex Families Offer in Manchester

Phase 1 - Wythenshawe and Gorton/Longsight

- Target of 480 complex families before April 2013
- All referrals considered for Assertive Outreach, Complex Families Parenting Team, Family Intervention Project and Families First interventions (Phase 1 New Delivery Model)
- Randomised Control Trial in operation all referrals are split between those that will get New Delivery Model or Business As Usual services in order to demonstrate impact of prioritisation, better integration and more effective sequencing
- ESF Programme is not available in these areas as a result of the impact on the Randomised Control Trial

Summary of the Complex Families Offer in Manchester

Phase 2 – North Manchester (inc. Collyhurst)

- Target of 1000 complex families before April 2013
- All referrals considered for ESF Programme, Assertive Outreach, Complex Families Parenting Team, Family Intervention Project and Families First interventions (Phase 2 New Delivery Model)
- No Randomised Control Trial All referrals are New Delivery Model
- ESF Programme available focussing on supporting families at lower level of complex spectrum/supporting people into work
- Focus on families with lower level of complex issues until June/July whilst capacity being built within other services

Summary of the Complex Families Offer in Manchester

Other areas (not part of current pilots)

- ESF Programme available in this area supporting families at lower level of complex spectrum/supporting people into work
- Referrals can still be made to Adults/Children's services through standard channels
- New Delivery Model to be operational in these areas post April 2013
