

Dear Community,

This is the final newsletter for Term I and I can't believe how quickly this first quarter of the year has passed; it seems only a few weeks ago that we were welcoming new and returning students back for 2014. However we have achieved a huge amount in the past 10 weeks including providing powerful, focussed learning for both staff and students. The learning is probably more obvious for our young people – camps, assemblies, option choices, FI in schools, the V8s, our annual swimming carnival, Relay For Life, MARSSS and Catering – all these and more add to the carefully implemented core curriculum we provide for all students. Our teaching staff are always learning as well, seeking to continuously grow and improve their practice. This year we have taken the unusual step of organising ourselves into subject staffrooms, believing that improved student outcomes will result when we are grouped together and can meet, formally and informally, in our learning areas.

As I drive to school of a morning, coming up Queechy Hill I am impressed by the look of our students entering our school. Throughout Term I they have been appropriately and proudly dressed in full school uniform providing a strong message about the quality of our learning institution. As the weather cools and we move into second term I would hate for this to change. Please remember we have a number of uniform options suited to our winter conditions, at affordable prices and designed to be hard-wearing (certainly more so than some of the brand name items!) so there is no need to add non-uniform pieces. Would you please support us by ensuring your child does not come to school wearing:

- Ugg boots as well as giving the impression that students are at home and/or on holiday they present a safety issue as they do not protect feet in workshops, labs and the grounds and wearers tend to shuffle and stumble.
- Brightly coloured hoodies these should not be worn with our uniform whether over or under, our rugby tops or jumpers they detract from the neat, pride-inspiring look we have developed.

Last year we introduced the idea of wearing a plain black puffer jacket in particularly cold weather – this remains an option and does not detract from our Q-branded clothing. Wearing uniform has many short and long term benefits and is a part of our culture, locally and nationally. I am happy to talk further with parents and students who might want to discuss this issue and make suggestions as to how we might improve our look. We will continue, as a school community, to encourage and expect those who attend Queechy High School to uphold our policies and wear the uniform appropriately at all times.

Our Interim Reports went home last week and the Parent/Teacher Interviews on Tuesday evening were also important events. Hopefully all of you have spoken with your child/ren about their progress, recognising their strengths, acknowledging growth and discussing how they might address specific needs. We know that a strong partnership between home and school supports best possible learning outcomes for students so I would encourage parents to talk often with their child's teachers, especially if you have questions or concerns about their learning. Our teachers foster open and clear communication and will contact you via phone, letter, the school diary or email to ensure you are well informed.

I hope everyone has a relaxing, restful holiday and I look forward to continuing our positive partnership, achieving the best possible learning outcomes for your child, in Term 2.

Red Storm Racing returned from the National FI in Schools Nationals' Final, already planning their attack on the 2014 Tasmanian finals in September.

Travelling to Canberra with the two other Tasmanian teams allowed all the students to discuss different aspects of their approach to the competition. Saturday night was spent making sure that the cars were ready for the scrutineers on Sunday. Once they were handed over it was back to the hotel and checking the rest of the presentation material.

Monday started early with all material having to be at the convention centre before 8.00am, with set up beginning at 9.00am. It was at this time that all the teachers were locked out of the presentation hall and we had 2 hours to set up the pit display in readiness for judging. Looking at the other setups, completion was going to be tough.

In the first lot of racing we were able to see that our car was the 3rd fastest in the development class, however we soon came down to earth a little as one of our measurements on the car was out by 0.12mm and we received a 0.200sec time penalty. This however, only dropped us to 7th overall; however we were successful with Sam Walley recording the fastest reaction time for the Development class for the competition.

Over the next three days we had verbal presentations, portfolio and pit booth display and the all-important engineering judging. This was difficult as our design engineer wasn't able to attend, but the judges were impressed that we had made a video of him explaining what he had done and were still able to include him as part of the team.

Wednesday night arrived with the presentation dinner and we were able to relax and talk to some of the judges. One of these was our engineering judge who worked for defence and offered to help us design a wind tunnel to test our car.

Queechy did not leave the presentations without being recognised as our teacher, Mr Djakic received the Founders Award for services to the FI in Schools Program over the last 7 years.

Thursday and Friday allowed us to visit both old and new Parliament houses and although we did not get to meet our local member of Parliament, however we did get to debate the issue of conscription in a role play at old Parliament House. Sitting in the actual chamber where the actual debate took place in the late 60s. However this time we didn't actually have to send anyone to war.

Friday we visited the Australian War Memorial where after 4 hours we still wanted to look at more and see what others have done for us in the past. These two days were made possible through the PACER program which allows interstate students to visit Canberra to view and relive important aspects of our nation's history.

Saturday was a 2am start allowing us to drive to Melbourne and several hours of shopping for those all-important gifts before boarding the boat for home.

Over the last 6 months we have learnt a lot about ourselves and each other. On team work, cooperation and collaboration. In order to do this we have had the assistance of a wide range of people and businesses (as above) and would like to thank them all for their support and assistance.

Olá Brasil! Enrich your family - host a Brazilian student

Government Education and Training International is thrilled to announce that, in July 2014, we will once again welcome students from the North-Eastern Brazilian state of Pernambuco to our island.

Win the World

Following on from the extremely successful Brazilian program of 2013, in which Tasmania's Government Colleges hosted 50 Brazilian students as part of the Pernambuco State Government's 'Win the World' program, we, this year, have the privilege of welcoming 100 highly-deserving students to colleges across Tasmania for terms three and four.

The 'Win the World' program rewards the academic success of 1,000 students from disadvantaged backgrounds in Pernambuco, and provides sponsorship for these students to study internationally in English or Spanish speaking countries.

Ganhe o Mundo

Pernambuco's Ganhe o Mundo or "Win the World" program arose from a desire on the part of the local government to improve foreign language studies in its public high schools. Brazil, and in particular the Brazilian Northeast, is undergoing rapid economic growth. The country is preparing to host the 2014 Soccer World Cup and the 2016 Olympic Games. Foreign language skills – particularly English – are a vital priority for increasing international commerce as well as receiving tourists for these events.

1,000 students were selected in 2013 for the *Ganhe o Mundo* program, from 20,000 applicants, of which Tasmania was host to 50. And these are no ordinary students! All of them scored results at the top of the list in their State for an Academic test they sat before being selected for the Win the World program.

These vivacious and engaged students, aged 16-18, will attend Year 11, with between seven to twenty students attending each of the Tasmanian Government's eight 'international ready' colleges.

To give these students a truly Tasmanian experience, we are recruiting families who will offer a caring, supportive homestay environment, in which these students' studies, language skills, and personalities can thrive. In return for providing these students with support, and showing them as much of our beautiful state as possible, you will receive a weekly homestay fee to cover food and board.

Pernambuco

Pernambuco is a diverse state in the North-East of Brazil. Its location near the equator ensures a great amount of sunshine throughout the year, with an average temperature of 26 degrees. Portuguese is the official national language, and thus the primary language taught in schools. The economy is driven by agriculture, livestock farming and industry. The state is home to 8.7 million people, and boasts 187km of some of the most beautiful beaches in the Country.

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Students will be arriving in Tasmania mid-July, and departing in early December, 2014. 


