### **Sav Yes to Youth Success**

For the past year, Ken Flaks, Ken Kelting, and I have been collaborating with other leaders across the area who care about youth. As we began the Summer LUNCH program last year we tried to form a network of relationships. One of those led to our participation in the Lake County Afterschool Coalition, now called YES = Youth Empowerment for Success!

Their monthly meetings are a wonderful celebration of good things happening throughout Lake County. But, we got to host a special meeting last month. Through other connections, and wider relationships, we were part of a movement in the Chicago area called *On the Table* conversations. These conversations were to be about specific topics at specific locations, but all aimed at inspiring philanthropy. At our conversation about issues affecting youth, we were lucky to have eight students from North Chicago High School *SAVE* (Students Against Violence Everywhere), and a student from Mundelein High School Stand Up Coalition.

Below is the "Thank You" note, from the President of the organization that sponsored this event, but I want to say a brief word about what it meant to me. I truly felt like it was another church meeting being held in our fellowship hall, as people gathered around tables sharing their thoughts and discussing ways to work together to help improve the life of our community. Perhaps it was the blessing of the Holy Spirit, perhaps it was because we gathered on holy ground, perhaps it was the prayers in my heart for the blessing of the day; but it felt so right that we would be part of a wider movement for good.

May God bless all that we do at Ivanhoe Congregational Church, whether in the sanctuary, fellowship hall, kitchen, classroom, offices, outside on our beautiful grounds – and in the community – to share God's love and grace for all of God's children.

Peace, Pastor Kris + Pastor Kris will attend the UCC's General Synod June 25-30, in Cleveland.

As a delegate, I represent our church and the churches of the Illinois Conference, but I am also charged to prayerfully consider how the Holy Spirit is working through the deliberations before I vote. You still may be asking, "What is General Synod?" The answer is a short lesson in the polity of the UCC...

The United Church of Christ gathers its General Synod every two years, consisting of delegates elected from the Conferences (distributed proportionally by conference size) together with the boards of directors. While General Synod provides the most visible voice of the "stance of the denomination" on any particular issue, the covenantal polity of the denomination means that General Synod speaks *to* local churches, associations, and conferences, but not *for* them. Thus, the other settings of the church are allowed to hold differing views and practices on all non-constitutional matters.

Like any national gathering, there are keynote speakers, workshops, and worship. While there are business items and officer elections to be voted upon, the majority of the work is devoted to considering resolutions, and commitments we make to issues of social justice.

### **Strengthen the Church Special Offering**

On Sunday, June 7, we will be receiving the Strengthen the Church special mission offering of the United Church of Christ. This offering builds the UCC's future. It funds new congregations and renews existing ones. It supports programs for youth and young adults and nurtures current and future leaders. Strengthen the Church gifts help to create vibrant church communities of extravagant welcome.

On behalf of The Chicago Community Trust, I would like to thank you for participating in *On the Table* 2015. On Tuesday, a profound dedication to your community and our region was on full display. Last year's inaugural *On the Table* engaged more than 11,500 people to address the issues that matter to us most--quite a feat. Today, I'm pleased to report that **more than 25,000 Chicagoland residents** took part in *On the Table* 2015. Participants came from every neighborhood, every zip code in the city and each county in the region. It's staggering to think about the thousands of stories that were shared around the table on May 12, and the commitments that were made to take action to strengthen our communities and improve the lives of others.

On the Table 2015 was about celebrating and inspiring the everyday philanthropists across our region-people who donate their time, treasure, and talents in ways big and small. As an On the Table participant, you are certainly among them. On the Table 2015 was a bold initiative, and it served as a fitting kickoff to our yearlong Centennial campaign with an even more ambitious goal: to spark a movement to make our region the most philanthropic in the nation.

Throughout the coming year, we will support a wide range of substantive, thought--provoking events and programs to explore themes of philanthropy, community and civic engagement. But more importantly, our Centennial is about you. We will soon be launching "Stories of Philanthropy," a sustained effort to capture and promote the very kinds of stories you shared on Tuesday, with the hope that they will inspire others to call upon their own inner philanthropist and make a difference.



# **Ivanhoe Hosts YES Meeting**

Ivanhoe Church hosted the May meeting of the YES (Youth Empowerment for Success) Coalition on May 12. The "On the Table" discussion centered on the youth of Lake County and how we as a community can empower them to be of service and participate in philanthropy. Thirty-five people attended the meeting including eight students from North Chicago High School who are involved in a program called SAVE (Students Against Violence Everywhere), one student from Mundelein High School's Stand Up organization and leaders from the Stand Strong Coalition.

Pastor Kris opened the meeting with a brief overview of the history of Ivanhoe Church and our role in the Underground Railroad. Leaders of the YES coalition then explained the agenda for the meeting and four small discussion groups were formed, followed by a short review of the items discussed by each of the four groups. A complete recap of the discussion is posted on the bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall.

### Historian's Corner Steve Schmidt

150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the American Civil War 96th Regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry

#### **Mustered Out**

As the third and final year of their enlistment neared its close, the men of the 96th IL Volunteers camped outside Nashville were anxious. As recruits and replacements arrived in camp to fill out the companies of the Regiment, rumors of impending movement farther from home were rife. As the spring days of May lengthened toward June, the news of Joe Johnston's surrender to Gen. Sherman in North Carolina, and Jefferson Davis's arrest in Mississippi, lightened their hearts. On May 26, 1865, Confederate Gen. Kirby Smith surrendered in Texas, and the Civil War was over.

After the grand review of the Fourth Corps by commanding General George Thomas in Nashville, word came down that the 96th Illinois Regiment was to be mustered out of service. The Regiment was ordered to Camp Douglas outside Chicago for final pay and release from United States service. Arriving in Chicago on June 14th, the Regiment of fewer than 400 out of the 1,000 men who left Camp Fuller almost three years earlier, was welcomed by throngs of enthusiastic citizens lined up along Michigan Avenue as the 96th marched by. After a day of well-deserved feasting and ovations, along with a speech by Gen. Sherman, then in residence at the Tremont House, the 96th settled in to wait almost two weeks for the paymaster. On Wednesday, June 28, 1865, the 96th Illinois Volunteer Infantry received their final pay and discharges, and the next day, they passed into history crowned with glory from many battlefields. Among their many accolades, this proclamation from their division commander says it all:

# HEADQUARTERS FIRST DIVISION, FOURTH ARMY CORPS

Camp Harker, Tenn., June 1, 1865. Brevet Colonel J.C. Smith, commanding Ninety-sixth Illinois Volunteer Infantry:

You. with the officers and men of the Ninety-sixth Illinois, after three years' gallant devotion to the cause of our common country in this war against rebellion, are now about to return to your homes, with honor unstained and with reputation bright with glory. Your deeds will live forever. In nearly every battle of the southwest you have been engaged, from Fort Donelson, through Shiloh, Corinth, Perryville, Stone River, Chickamauga, Resaca, Rockyface, Dallas, New Hope, Franklin and Nashville—you have borne the flag of the Union and the banner of your noble State to victory over the foe who would have destroyed the Government and Union made by our fathers. God has given you the victory. Remember Him. And now that the war is over, the rebellion at an end, remember those whom you have conquered. Use victory as becomes true men and brave soldiers. Return to your homes with enmity toward none and charity for all.

I know that you will be the best of citizens, because I know you have been the best of soldiers. While we enjoy the honor and privileges which your valor has won and saved, let us ever cherish as idols of our hearts the memory of our comrades who have given up their lives for the salvation of our country—who fell by your sides battling for the right. Remember the widow and orphan of our dead comrades. Be true to them as our comrades were true to us and our country.

My comrades, accept my gratitude for your devotion to me personally; you have been true and noble soldiers, and brave men. May God ever bless you and crown your lives with happiness, and each of you with honor, peace and plenty. Be as you have ever been—true to God, to country, to friends, and to yourselves.

Good bye, comrades: again, God bless you.
