## - PARTICIPANTS CAN COMPETE IN ONE SINGLE AND TWO DOUBLES (Men/Womens Double and Mixed Doubles) but in only one age category

- IN THE CASE OF AN INSUFFICIENT NUMBER OF PLAYERS SIGNING UP, the executive committee reserves the right to regroup participants in the age category directly beneath them. Four medals will be awarded for each age category (Gold, Silver, Bronze for the top 3 contestants of the top table and Glass for the winner of the ' B ' table)
- EACH CATEGORY can hold a maximum of 80 competitors for singles competitions and 80 teams for doubles events. Registration closes $31^{\text {st }}$ August 2015 or as soon as the category is full.


## - REGISTRATION FOR DOUBLES EVENTS -

 it is the responsibility of individual competitors to find a partner they can compete with in the doubles competitions. The executive committee cannot take responsibility for finding a participant a team to compete with.

NB: All regulation conditions concerning categories, venues, the running of the competition and technical aspects are applied on a provisional basis and are subject to change when and how the executive committee sees appropriate, up until the beginning of the competition.

## ORGANISATION

## TYPE OF COMPETITION

## OPEN

- FOR EACH LEAGUE AND EACH AGE

CATEGORY participants will compete in a category made up of a level grouping of participants

## DRAWING LOTS

- FOR EACH LEAGUE LOTS will be drawn before the technical meeting and will be carried out by the executive committee (national technical delegate and head of activity)
- TOURNAMENTS WILL TAKE PLACE IN

2 PHASES: one qualifying pools phase and one finals phase with knockout (provided that the enrollment is sufficient)

## SCHEDULE

- AFTER LOTS are drawn the definite match schedule will be released
- EACH PARTICIPANT will play a minimum of four matches in the qualifier stages


## - THE EVENTS WILL TAKE PLACE from

Friday $2^{\text {nd }}$ to Friday $9^{\text {th }}$ October 2015

## TECHNICAL MEETING

## - A TECHNICAL MEETING WILL TAKE

PLACE the day before the start of the competition in order to introduce the tournament and remind those involved of the regulations and the behaviour that is expected

## TRAINING

## - THERE WILL BE NO SPECIFIC TRAINING SLOT SET ASIDE FOR PARTICIPANTS BEFORE THE EVENTS

## POOLS AND RANKINGS

## - EACH POOL WILL CONSIST OF

5 PLAYERS (assuming that a sufficient number of players register)

- AT THE END OF THE POOL PHASES, the $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ place qualifiers will move directly to the finals phase. The $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ place qualifiers will play in the consolation phase and the 5th place participant will be eliminated


## - IN THE FIRST ROUND OF THE FINALS

 PHASE ( $1 / 16^{\text {th }}$, provided that a sufficient number of players register), the $1^{\text {st }}$ will compete against ${ }^{\text {nd }}$ place qualifiers of other pools and of the consolation phase the $3^{\text {rd }}$ against the $4^{\text {th }}$ place qualifiers
## - NO RANKING MATCHES WILL TAKE

PLACE in the finals phase except the match between the two losers from the semi-finals of the finals phase in order to determine the recipient of the bronze medal

## NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS

## GAMES FORMAT

## - EACH MATCH WILL CONSIST OF 5

ROUNDS. Only rounds which will sway the results will be played. The first player or team to reach 11 points with a 2 point difference will win the match

## UMPIRE

- GAMES WILL BE AUTO-REFEREED or overseen by another player from the pool or final league with the exception of games playing for the medals where there will be official umpires
- BOTH PLAYERS OR SIDES must sign the results sheets


## RULES

- THE COMPETITION WILL BE PLAYED under regulations of the International Table Tennis Federation


# THERE ARE 10 SINGLES CATEGORIES AND 6 DOUBLES CATEGORIES SUGGESTED FOR THIS SPORT 

## THE RULES APPLIED WILL BE IN KEEPING WITH THE REGULATIONS FROM THE INTERNATIONAL TABLE TENNIS FEDERATION EXCEPT FOR THE FOLLOWING CHANGES:

## SERVE (ITIF Rule .6.)

## DURING SINGLES MATCHES THE SERVE WILL BE CONSIDERED A LET (ITTF 2.9):

## - IF THE BALL, AFTER TOUCHING THE

 RECEIVERS COURT, returns in the direction of the net- IF THE BALL COMES TO REST on the receiver's court
- IF THE BALL LEAVES THE RECEIVER'S COURT after touching it by either of its sidelines
- HOWEVER IF THE RECEIVER TOUCHES THE BALL before it has crossed the net or before it has bounced a second time on the table the serve is not considered a let

DURING DOUBLES MATCHES THE SERVE WILL BE CONSIDERED A LET (ITTF 2.6.3):

- IF THE BALL, AFTER TOUCHING THE RECEIVERS COURT, returns in the direction of the net


## - IF THE BALL COMES TO REST ON THE RECEIVER'S COURT

- IF THE RECEIVER TOUCHES THE BALL BEFORE IT HAS CROSSED THE NET or before it has bounced a second time on the table the serve is not considered a let


## DOUBLES

- IN DOUBLES THE RECEIVER SHALL then make a return but thereafter either player of the disabled pair may make returns.
However, no part of a player's wheelchair nor a foot of a standing player of this pair shall protrude beyond the imaginary extension of the centre line of the table. If it does, the umpire shall award the point to the opposing pair.


## TOUCHING THE TABLE WITH YOUR FREE HAND

- WHEN THE BALL IS IN PLAY, a player can use their free hand to steady themselves after the ball has been struck (provided that this does not move the table


## - HOWEVER THE PLAYER CANNOT USE

THEIR FREE HAND to help them serve the ball

## FINAL STAGE REGULATIONS

## THE NUMBER OF CONTESTANTS IN THE FINAL STAGES DEPENDS ON THE TOTAL NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS. THE MAXIMUM BEING 1/16 IN THE FINALE. IF THE MAXIMUM NUMBER IS REACHED THE LEAGUE WILL BE AS FOLLOWS:

- THE $1^{\text {ST }}$ AND ${ }^{\text {ND }}$ PLACE QUALIFIERS will move directly to the final league. The $3{ }^{3 \text { rd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ place qualifiers will play in the third place round and the $5^{\text {th }}$ place participant will be eliminated
- THE $1^{\text {ST }}$ AND ${ }^{\text {ND }}$ PLACE QUALIFIERS will move directly to the finals phase. The 3rd and 4th place qualifiers will play in the consolation phase and the 5th place participant will be eliminated

- THE OFFICIAL CEREMONIES for each category and each event will take place at the end of the competition at the Athletes Village in a venue set up for this purpose or directly at the competition venue.

- MEDALS BY CATEGORY: For each category, 4 players or teams will receive a medal. In the event of certain categories being grouped together, within the same event, each of these categories will have 4 medallists.

## ANTI-DOPING CONTROLS

## - THE INTERNATIONAL MASTERS GAMES

 ASSOCIATION has put the executive committee in charge of enforcing anti-doping rules and setting up anti-doping inspections.- ANTI-DOPING INSPECTIONS WILL TAKE

PLACE in compliance with advice given by the International Masters Games Association taken from the World Anti-Doping Code.
