This month is a little different. My mother, Leah Powell, interviewed me. (She did the interview and then I got to type it.) I was born in Clarksburg, at St. Joseph's Hospital. My parents are Carl and Leah Powell. Dad died in 1998. I have a brother Brian and his wife Peggy who live in Fairmont; they have two children, Megan and Jarryd. My sister Kim lives in Grafton and has two children, Leah and Rickey. The best thing about my childhood was that I always knew that I was loved.

Two special memories from my childhood come to mind. My grandmother lived in Parkersburg, and my grandma lived in Elizabeth. When we went to visit them we traveled old Route 50. We would stop at a grocery store in Pennsboro for a snack or lunch. Dad would buy bread, something for a sandwich, bananas, chips and chocolate milk. We all drank from the same quart of chocolate milk and none of us became sick. One time on our way home we stopped at North Bend Park and Mom gave an apple to a deer. The car door was open and Mom was the only one in the car. The deer started to get in the car with her to get another apple. The deer's head was all the way in the car. She started yelling at Dad to help her and he told her to give it another apple. She told him she didn't have any more; he told her that he didn't

know what to do. Everyone except Mom was laughing really hard.

I grew up in Fairmont and went to Butcher School, White School, Miller Junior High (I was in the integrated class at that school), and Fairmont Senior High School. I earned a Bachelor of Arts in Education, specializing in Home Economics at Fairmont State College. I also have a Master's in Vocational, Technical and Adult Education from Marshall University. I have two master's degrees from WVU, one in Communication Studies and another degree in Special Education. We moved to Grafton in 1982 when Dad was transferred here. Mom and I have a cat named Bobbin.

My first paying jobs were delivering newspapers, mowing grass and cleaning houses. My paper route was an evening route so I delivered the papers after school. My dachshund went with me sometimes and he always wanted to leave a paper at everyone's house. I can't imagine how many steps that little dog took on the paper route. My brother also had a paper route. I was spoiled though, because on the weekends the papers went out in the mornings. Dad would drive Brian around on both routes to deliver the papers and I got to sleep in.

I worked as a substitute teacher for four years and have taught in

Preston County for twenty-seven years.

I worked as a home economics teacher for ten years. At that time I received a reduction in force letter and went back to school to work on a special education degree.

Mom said that hard times make us stronger. The hardest thing ever to happen to me was when my father died. I didn't realize how much he spoiled me until after he died. Another hard time was when Mom was getting her chemotherapy treatments. It was also really hard when I lost my job. I don't know how people get through these hard times without the support of their church and friends. So many people in this church really helped us and lifted us up when Mom was getting her chemo treatments.

Mom said that she knows that God is a big part of my life. I grew up at Central United Methodist Church in Fairmont. I attended that church for forty years and taught Sunday School for twenty-five years. I remember really feeling a sense of pride when I started to read hymns in the hymnal—that was when I knew I really was learning how to read. When I was in the third grade the church gave me a Bible. We had a wonderful minister, Ottis Linger, who told us that someday he wanted to


CHANCE

But it could, in reality, apply to anyone who thinks that his/her profession, job, or care-giving position takes precedence over personal care.

We are taught from childhood to be unselfish, giving, sharing, helping members of our families, the groups to which we belong, society, the world. Too seldom are we taught to take time simply to be good to ourselves.

This is the month that we celebrate motherhood. Way too often, we hold mothers to impossible standards of self-giving love. We blame defective mothering for our own short-comings and failures to be(come) what we think we should be.

As a therapist, I often told my clients that it was time to grow up, to

give to themselves the caregiving that they believed they had not experienced in earlier times. Jesus tells us to love God with all that we are and have, and to love others, AS WE LOVE OURSELVES.

see our Bibles worn out from reading. I still have that Bible and it is showing definite signs of wear. At Good Shepherd I am the chair of the Nurture Committee. Some of the most important things that we do are the prayer blankets and sending things to the "Outer Flock."

My favorite food is Grape Nuts with fresh peaches. I also love a peach crisp that is in a restaurant at the Amish Country in Ohio. I am so partial to chocolate. Some of my hobbies are knitting, quilting, sewing (I learned to sew by watching Mom sew when I was little), making baskets and reading. I like to read Christian fiction, since it usually leaves you feeling good. I also like reading books by Debbie Macomber and devotion books.

Stella Hawk encouraged me to

make chemotherapy hats to donate to the local hospitals. I usually use Shirley Shay's basic knitted hat pattern. One time I thought it would be nice if I could make fleece hats with the Flying WV. Mom told me that I would never be allowed to make the hats. I received permission to make as many hats as I wanted to one time. I finally got to tell my mother, "I told you so!" We made 115 hats and donated them to Ruby, Mon General, Fairmont General, and Dr. Beall's office. We were able to deliver the hats on Martin Luther King Day one year to the day that Mom finished her chemo.

At Good Shepherd I know that this church is full of people that would help Mom or me if we needed anything. I know this because of help we received when Dad died and when

Mom was sick. We are really blessed by our friends in this church.

My favorite Bible verse is Philippians 4:7 – "And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." I heard this verse in my head when I went to bed the morning that my father died. I didn't know that it was a Bible verse until we received a sympathy card with that verse. Joy Butcher-Winfree told me that God was talking to me. I have learned that some things are very hard to understand but with God's help we eventually find peace with whatever we face.

My favorite hymns are "As the Deer" and "Amazing Grace." Both of these hymns tell me that you have to have God's grace in your life to survive.
