- February 18 *Thelma and Louise (US, 1991, 129 mins). Directed by Ridley Scott. With Susan Sarandon, Geena Davis, Harvey Keitel, Brad Pitt. A female version of the road picture sub-genre. Two women accidentally find themselves wanted criminals and take to the highways for escape.
- February 25 *Port of Shadows (France, 1938, 90 mins). Directed by Marcel Carne. With Jean Gabin, Michel Simon, Michele Morgan. The epitome of the 1930s French poetic realism film cycle. An army deserter searches for a better life but must deal with both his own past and Fate.
- **Chungking Express** (Hong Kong, 1994, 102 mins). Directed by Wong Kar-Wai. With Brigitte Lin, Tony Leung, Takeshi Kaneshiro. Breakthrough film for Hong Kong director Wong Kar-Wai. He follows the stories of various customers at a central and popular eatery. Romance, fun, and fine directing.
- March 11 Scarlet Street (US, 1945, 101 mins). Directed by Fritz Lang. With Edward G. Robinson, Joan Bennett, Dan Duryea. Classic Lang film noir: a naive bank teller and amateur painter rescues a strange lady in distress one night and becomes trapped in her world.
- March 18 *The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel (UK, 2012, 118 mins). Directed by John Madden. With Judi Dench, Bill Nighy, Maggie Smith, Dev Patel. Seniors'Week choice. Romantic comedy: seven English retirees take a bus to an old folks' resort in India and discover romance, relationships, and comedy in abundance.

Are you interested in participating in a research project and possibly winning an iPAD or \$500?

A national research project is currently underway examining the social connections of older Australians and what interventions work to reduce social isolation. Research has found both in Australia and overseas that people's social connections are declining and this can lead to feelings of social isolation and loneliness. Our social networks allow us to share information, to learn, to be of value and to be valued. They are essential to wellbeing.

The research project is seeking the experiences and views of older Australians aged 65 years and over living in the community (not residential care). We wish to gain an in-depth knowledge and understanding of older people's experiences in terms of social connections, social support, loneliness and social isolation.

The survey opened on Wednesday 12 November 2014 and closes on the 31 March 2015. This is a national research project involving a number of universities and a range of partner organisations and has been approved by the relevant Human Research Ethics Committees.
