Harborview Family Investment Center welcomes the Baltimarket Virtual Supermarket. This online shopping concept allows low-income residents with limited vehicle or Internet access to place and receive grocery orders at their local library or Family Investment Center.

People, who live in the Cherry Hill, Patapsco and Brooklyn areas of Baltimore City can order food from Santoni's Supermarket on computers at the local library or the Harborview Family Investment Center.

Customers can pay for their food with cash, EBT, credit or debit cards. The food will be delivered for free to the Enoch Pratt Library branch in Cherry Hill every Friday from 4 p.m. – 5 p.m.

Holiday Reminder

The holidays are traditionally a season of family gatherings, giving and sharing. During such times, those who have suffered losses often experience more frequent feelings of insecurity, loneliness or sadness. Loss comes in many forms for our foster youth. This time of year is a particularly harsh reminder that they are not with their own families. We ask that you be mindful of such during this holiday season. Try to include them in the activities that have become traditions for your family, allow them to contribute by adding a special something to your list of things "we do" to celebrate or simply give them the space they desire to reflect.



Keeping Your Family Safe

- Have you had your influenza (flu) virus vaccine? The Department of Health & Human Services' Center for Disease Control & Prevention recommends that all people 6 months of age and older get the flu vaccine. For more information contact the CDC at I-800-232-4636 (I-800-CDC-INFO) or visit www.cdc.gov/flu. Many health insurance companies are paying for the cost of the shot this year.
- Families often burn candles during the holidays to create a warm atmosphere. Please blow out all candles before leaving the house or going to bed.
- Protect your electronic equipment from power surges.
 To protect your electronic equipment, use electrical surge suppressors or arresters. Most are designed to be plugged into a wall outlet. For more tips, visit http://www.bge.com/waystosave/Pages/default.aspx.
- Keep all drugs in a safe place away from kids, regardless of their age. Never give your child medicine prescribed for someone else. Ask your physician for advice on calming ailments and storing medicines appropriately.
- Have you changed the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors?
