Cardiology for the Practitioner

Objectives

Yosemite National Park will be the site for the 25th annual course, "Cardiology for the Practitioner." This three day symposium is an intensive course designed for internists, primary care physicians, family practitioners, cardiologists, and other health care providers who encounter patients with various heart diseases. Recent advances in pathophysiology, treatment, and clinical relevance of common cardiovascular disorders will be presented. Emphasis will be placed on the frequently encountered clinical problems in cardiac patients by primary care physicians. There will be state-of-the-art and comprehensive reviews on global risk assessment, coronary artery disease, acute coronary syndromes, cardiac arrhythmia and heart failure. Special emphasis will be placed on review of various newer diagnostic modalities in chest pain patients and selection of therapeutic choice in patients with chronic coronary syndromes. There will be reviews on recent guidelines in management of hypertension, dyslipidemia, stable angina, heart failure, atrial fibrillation, and CV disorders in women. This year's program will be devoted to topics of clinical relevance in practice. The program will include special emphasis on cost-effective, office-based evaluation of common symptoms as well as typical cardiac conditions. The topics and speakers will put a special emphasis on the clinical problems frequently encountered by the primary care physician in his/her practice. Special features of the program this year will include a workshop on ECG interpretation and cardiac auscultation. Throughout this course, efforts will be made to provide the clinician with practical knowledge required for the management of cardiac patients by the clinician. Emphasis will be placed on selection of evidencebased, cost-effective therapies in the current climate of cost-containment in health care. At the conclusion of this program, participants should be able to discuss and as appropriate apply in practice the following:

- ▲ Global risk assessment and prevalence of coronary risk factors in U.S. population
- ▲ The role of emerging risk factors in cardiovascular disease
- ▲ The importance and interplay of obesity, metabolic syndrome and diabetes in CVD
- ▲ The diagnostic and therapeutic importance of exercise in CVD
- ▲ Critical appraisal of cardiac imaging modalities in CVD assessment
- ▲ The significance and management of lipid disorders in CHD
- ▲ The role of various therapeutic modalities for atherosclerosis regression
- ▲ Current guidelines and emerging therapies for hypertension
- ▲ Role of optimal medical therapy and interventions in stable CAD
- ▲ Comprehensive approaches in management of acute coronary syndromes
- ▲ Benefits and limitations of coronary angioplasty and stents
- ▲ Evaluation and management of patients with chest pain
- ▲ Current state of art in the management of patients with heart failure
- ▲ Evaluation and management of patients with mitral valve disease
- ▲ Evaluation and management of patients with syncope and dizziness Evaluation and management of patients with combined dyslipidemia
- Practical tips in the evaluation of patients with cardiac vs. pulmonary dyspnea
- ▲ Interpretation of electrocardiogram and recognition of common abnormalities
- Recognition of common cardiac sounds including various gallops and cardiac murmurs
- ▲ Evaluation and management of patients with atrial fibrillation
- Evaluation and management of patients with aortic valve disease
- Evaluation of patients with aortic dissection and aneurysms
- Evaluation of cardiovascular disease in the elderly
- CAD in women: the newer emerging data regarding evaluation and management
- ▲ Review of various established practice guidelines for cardiovascular disorders
- ▲ Selection of appropriate diagnostic tests for comprehensive cardiac evaluation
