You could have hearing loss due to Military service from gun fire, engine noise, sudden altitude changes in aircrafts etc. and at our age we all have some form of hearing loss. They can only say yes or no if you apply. If you don't apply it will always be a negative answer.

Unfortunately not all applicants qualify. Some because of a means test, others lack of service but the unfortunate widows of a deceased veteran, who perhaps was to proud to apply, are now into their later years and could really use the help.

For the record I would like to say in the last eighteen months seven local veterans have been accepted for benefits, two have been upgraded to full benefits, two have been accepted at the Tony Stacey Centre and three are being processed.

I received a call from the office of Mr. Jim Karygannis M.P. he would like to interview any veterans with the Battle of the Atlantic Star Medal to be published in their annual constituency publication. If you are interested give me a call at 416-267-1558.

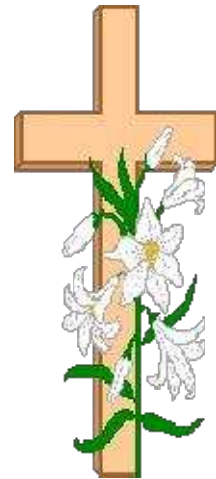
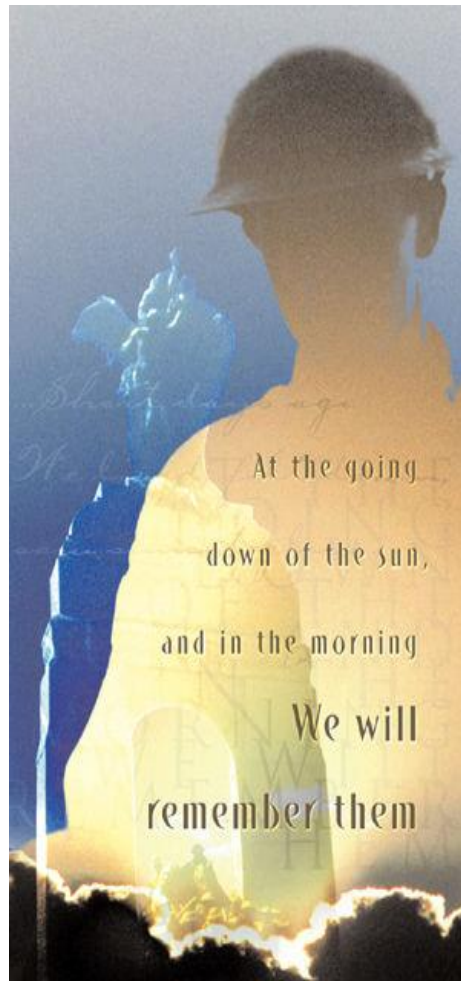
