Moon Valley High School is an excelling school in the Glendale Union High School District. It promotes measurable academic achievement and observable growth in emotional maturity, physical well-being and social responsibility by all students.

#### CURRICULUM AND GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS/ PLAN DEVELOPMENT

All students develop an educational plan during their first semester at Moon Valley. Student, parents and counselor will choose a Diploma plan and develop a curriculum appropriate to the student's educational and vocational needs.

• August/September: Senior reviews

• January: Junior reviews

• October/November: Freshman four-year plans

• January: Sophomore reviews

#### **EDUCATIONAL PLAN CHANGES**

Changes in students' schedules will be under the direction of the Assistant Principal for Student Services. Schedule changes may affect a student's educational plan and students should consult with their counselor before requesting changes.

Schedule changes will be made for the following reasons only:

- 1. Course completion in summer school, GUHSD Online or by correspondence
- 2. Placement error
- 3. Clerical error
- 4. Administrative leveling

#### SOCIAL WORKER SERVICES

Services including group activities are provided. Topics include anger management, peer mediation, substance abuse counseling, teen parenting, grief and loss, self-esteem, coping skills and family issues. Resource referrals are also provided, including information to obtain food boxes, clothing and counseling of all types.

#### HOMEBOUND PROGRAM

Students who must be absent from school because of orthopedic impairment or extended illness may qualify for Homebound instruction. A doctor's written recommendation is required. For further information, see a counselor. The student must be unable to attend school for at least 60 consecutive days.

#### ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE

Students seeking academic assistance are encouraged to visit the Title I-funded B.L.A.S.T. Center. It is open from 7:00 - 7:55 AM, Monday through Friday and 2:40 - 4:00 PM Monday through Thursday, and is staffed with instructional tutors.

#### RELEASE OF RECORDS TO U.S. MILITARY BRANCHES

All junior names will routinely be provided to the military recruiting services in June of each year unless juniors or their parents, if student is under 18 years of age, specifically request the deletion of their names.

#### COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE SERVICES

Each student will be assigned a counselor for guidance and counseling services for the four years of high school. The Counseling Center aims to help students acquire knowledge, attitudes and skills needed in educational planning, career planning and personal/social development. The following are some of the services provided by the Counseling Center:

- 1. Evaluation for placement and registration
- 2. Educational Plan development
- 3. Individual counseling
- 4. Group educational/career guidance
- 5. Test score interpretation (PSAT/SAT/ACT)\
- 6. Post-secondary educational/training/information
- 7. Resources to parents and teachers
- 8. Scholastic and academic placement
- 9. Scholarship and financial aid information

#### **EDUCATION & CAREER ACTION PLANS (ECAP)**

Freshman begin planning their four-year high school career by completing the Interest Profiler and Career Finder on AZCIS.intocareers.org, a planning tool that includes a personal portfolio which will follow students through high school and beyond. Students then begin to build an ECAP for high school with the Student Planner and start to create a resume.

Sophomore students complete the Cluster Finder to help identify their career path and begin to investigate schools, adding at least one school to their portfolio. Sophomores may take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) entrance exam, as it may significantly improve scores when they take it as juniors.

Junior students select a program using the AZCIS career cluster browser. At this point, they will utilize the Scholarship Finder and continue to work on their resume. Some juniors will select their post-secondary institution, which is called "early decision". Students should investigate how this may bind or eliminate other options depending upon the school they select.

Senior students focus on selecting a post-secondary institution with the help of the School Finder and continue to use the career clusters to research programs and apply for scholarships.

#### CAREER CENTER

The career center is located in the Media Center and is available for student use from 7:30 AM to 3:30 PM. Students are encouraged to stop in for information regarding post-secondary opportunities.

Each year Moon Valley offers both a Career Day and a College Day where students gain information regarding career fields and college opportunities.

Moon Valley High School effectively combines academics with extra-curricular activities. Participation in sports, music, arts and clubs develops leadership, teamwork and good sportsmanship. Students learn how to maintain a positive life balance through effective time management of these academics and activities.

#### ACTIVITY CARD

This card may be purchased for \$30 during registration by students registered at Moon Valley High School. The card entitles the purchaser to "free admittance" to ALL regular season home athletic events. The Administration highly recommends purchasing an Activity Card.

The card does NOT entitle the bearer to free dances or theater productions and is NON-TRANSFERABLE. It will be forfeited by violators of the non-transferable policy. Pricing is subject to change based on school funding by state legislature.

#### ALL-SCHOOL PICTURE INFORMATION

#### STUDENT ID PICTURES

Photographs for all student IDs are taken during walk through registration prior to the start of school. Students are responsible for wearing school-appropriate clothing for this photograph. Students who are absent during registration will have their student ID pictures taken in the bookstore.

#### YEARBOOK PICTURES

#### **Underclassmen (Grades 9-11)**

Student ID pictures will be used for the yearbook, except for students who had their pictures taken in the bookstore. These students must attend re-take day which is posted in the bookstore.

#### Seniors

It shall be the responsibility of each senior wanting a photograph in the yearbook to make an appointment with GRADS Photography at 602-547-1117 before the deadline of October 1st. GRADS is located at 20100 N. 51<sup>st</sup> Avenue in Glendale, which is southwest of 51<sup>st</sup> Avenue and the 101 freeway. There is no charge for the senior headshot but students may purchase additional photographs at their expense. #### **CAFETERIA**

The cafeteria operates as a service to students and faculty; it is a non-profit organization. Students are expected to cooperate and maintain an atmosphere of courtesy and neatness.

Lines will move promptly if students know their ID numbers and have the correct change. Students paying cash daily or who have money on account pay \$3.00. Checks or cash may be applied to accounts only in the morning, either inside the cafeteria, or at the breakfast-serving window. Deposits will be available by lunch time. Breakfast is \$1.50.

Applications for free and reduced lunches will be available during registration as well as through the social worker's offices. Applications will also be available in the cafeteria.

Students with existing free or reduced lunches are required to fill out a NEW application before September, or their accounts will automatically close. Processing time takes up to 10 days, so plan accordingly.

Students may be required to show their ID card at the register in order to receive their "account lunch." This process reduces unauthorized use. Protect your account or you could lose your privilege. Parents can monitor student lunch accounts through Meal Pay Plus @www.mealpayplus.com

#### USE AND CARE OF TEXTBOOKS

In compliance with Arizona Revised Statutes, the Glendale Union High School District will provide free textbooks for all students. Additionally A.R.S. 15-727 and 15-729 require students to be responsible for the care of textbooks and related material. There will be a \$3.00 charge for bar code replacement and there will be a \$3.00 late charge for books not returned at the time of a class change. Any alteration of the ID number/bar code originally stamped in the books will be classified as a lost book and the student will be charged full book value.

All students must return their books within five (5) days of withdrawing from a class, whether schedule change or end of semester. Any books returned after five days will be charged a \$3.00 per book late fee.

Students who fail to return textbooks and materials to school prior to summer shut-down date will be charged the full purchase price to replace lost or missing books and materials.

#### DERT

No records or transcripts will be sent to any other institution until all debts to the school are paid. Seniors must clear all debts in order to participate in graduation.

#### MEDIA CENTER

Books will be shelved in open stacks for students' selections. New magazines and daily newspapers will also be available and may be read in the center. Audiovisual equipment and computer directories are also accessible to faculty and students.

#### TAX CREDIT

A credit of up to \$400 is available for payment of fees to an Arizona public school for support of extra curricular activities. Additional information and state tax guidelines are available through the school bookstore.

#### TRAVEL REDUCTION

The 1988 Arizona Legislature passed an Air Quality Bill which requires employers—including school system—with more than 100 full-time employees/students to reduce single-car occupancy travel to and from the work or school site by 5 percent.

In order to comply with this legal requirement, each Glendale Union High School District school has developed a plan to accomplish this goal. The plan includes encouraging car pooling, van pooling, alternate travel (bicycles), and preferred parking. It also may include restricting student parking to upper-grade students. Community understanding and cooperation will help all GUHSD schools meet Air Quality Bill requirements.

#### **LOCKERS**

Moon Valley High School no longer provides book lockers. However, P.E. lockers and "special class" lockers may be issued.

"Lockers are school property and remain at all times under the control of the school. However, students are expected to assume full responsibility for the security of their lockers. Inspections of lockers may be conducted by school authorities without student consent at any time, for any reason and without a search warrant." Reference: Board Policy #6308.

#### **ATHLETICS & ACTIVITIES**

During the 2015-16 school year, a student is required to earn a passing grade in each course in which he or she is enrolled.

A student must be enrolled in and passing a minimum of five (5) subjects during their first six (6) semesters (freshman through junior years).

A senior must be enrolled in and pass a minimum of four (4) credit -earning subjects during his/her seventh (7) and eighth (8) semesters.

Additionally, a student must receive a passing grade in a minimum of five (5) credit-earning subjects at the end of each two (2) week intervals for eligibility. A student failing any course during a failing eligibility period will be ineligible for games/contests until he/she is passing all courses.

### YOU ARE ELIGIBLE FOR ARIZONA INTERSCHOLASTIC ASSOCIATION COMPETITION

- 1. If you have not reached your 19th birthday on or before September 1st of the school year in which you compete.
- 2. If you are enrolled in at least five (5) credit-bearing classes for the semester in which the event takes place. (In case of registration after the 1st day of a semester, and by the 14th school day, you must have been in attendance as many school days as missed from the opening of the semester before you are eligible to compete.)
- 3. If Academic Requirements for participation in extracurricular activities are met.

- 4. If your school attendance has not lapsed for a period of more than 10 consecutive days (disabling sickness of self or immediate family excepted).
- 5. If you are an amateur, having never accepted any monetary award in any amount.
  - 6. If you have never competed under a false name.
- 7. If you have never appeared on a boxing card during the school year.
- 8. If you do not play on outside teams during the sport season. (When a student appears in a uniform and sits on the bench with the team, he/she will be considered to have played on that team.)
- 9. If you are enrolled in grades 9, 10, 11, or 12, for not more than 8 semesters. (The 7th and 8th semesters must be consecutive.)
- 10. If you have not competed or had the opportunity to compete for more than four seasons in any one sport.
- 11. If you transfer from another school providing your parents have become domiciled in the MVHS attendance zone.

NOTE: If you transfer to MVHS with an approved variance and your parent(s) do not move into the MVHS attendance zone, YOU WILL BE INELIGIBLE for one calendar year from your enrollment date in the sports/activities you competed in during the previous year. A "520" form must be completed by the parent, sending school, and receiving school before interscholastic competition.

- 12. If you are familiar with the rules of the game and standards of sportsmanship.
- 13. If you understand and abide by the Conduct of Character Rules: Players who are under discipline or whose conduct of character is such as to adversely reflect upon the school may forfeit their eligibility.
- 14. If you understand and abide by the Tobacco, Drugs and Alcohol Rule: Any student who is using drugs, tobacco or alcoholic beverages in any form while participating in high school activities (including athletics), may forfeit his/her eligibility. See Student Athletic Handbook for further guidelines on disciplinary dispositions for athletics.
  - 15. If you have had a physical examination.
- 16. If you have recorded your birth certificate with the secretary in charge of eligibility.
- 17. If you have a parent permission card on file at the school office and seen the "Informed Consent Video."
- 18. If you have the school insurance or your own family insurance plan on file at the school office.
  - 19. If you have passed the Brain Book Concussion Course.

This is a synopsis of the rules and regulations for eligibility as prescribed by the Arizona Interscholastic Association. For more information regarding the specific rules and regulations of eligibility, contact the Assistant Principal for Operations & Resources.

#### **CLUBS & ORGANIZATIONS**

ACADEMIC DECATHLON — This club is open to high school students from all grade levels. The goal of the club is to prepare one or more teams of 9 students to compete locally in an Academic Decathlon event. A team is made up of nine students, including three A students, three B students, and three C students. The Academic Decathlon, held in February, for the first level of competition, consists of 10 events: Math, Science, Fine Arts, Social Science, Economics, Language & Literature, Interview, Speech, Essay and Super Quiz.

**ANIME CLUB** — The Anime Club is for students who are interested in anime

ART CLUB — The Art Club is for students who are interested in art.

ATHLETIC TRAINING STUDENT PROGRAM (ATS) — Facilitates development of knowledge and skills necessary for students to pursue education in any allied health care profession. Students interested in careers as ATCs, physicians, physician's assistants, physical therapists, EMTs, nurses and many other additional health care professions will benefit from athletic training room education and clinical observations while in the program.

**BADMINTON** — The Moon Valley Badminton Club is open to students with an interest in playing badminton.

**BAND** – The Moon Valley band program currently includes four performing groups: the marching band, concert band, percussion ensemble and jazz ensemble. The groups perform at pep rallies, concerts, parades, festivals, and many other events at school and around the state.

**BAND COLOR GUARD** – Color Guard is a part of the Marching Band, and functions to visually enhance performance with flags, dance and various equipment. Throughout the fall, the club's many activities include participation in concerts, festivals and fundraising activities. Field trips include away football games. Color Guard tryouts are held every spring.

CHESS CLUB – Chess is both a club and a team; club members are not required to be on the team. Players improve their skills at scheduled practice sessions, at workshops, and by challenging one another. Chess is also an A.I.A. sport. Team players participate in tournaments throughout the Phoenix area and may earn a letter.

**CLAY CLUB** — The MV Clay Club is open to all students interested in pottery and ceramics. Anyone who is interested in learning more about the potter's wheel and hand-building in clay is invited to join.

CLOSE-UP CLUB – The purpose of the Close-Up Club is to foster a better understanding and appreciation of government among Moon Valley students and teachers. Through issue seminars, speaker forums, and panel and group discussions, members learn how they and their communications can affect, and are affected by, government. Many club members travel to Washington, D.C. for one week during the school year to study the national government "close up", and to participate in a two-day program in Arizona that focuses on state and local government and issues. Membership is open to any student currently enrolled in a Social Studies class.

**CONCERT CHOIR** – Concert choir is a performing choir. Contact Mr. Jenkins for further information about tryouts.

CULINARY CLUB – In conjunction with the Culinary and Intro to Culinary classes, this club prepares students for pursuing goals in the culinary field. Members help coordinate and run the school café during lunch. This club also organizes all special events and is open to any MV student.

**DECA** – This student organization prepares students for a future in marketing or business related fields. DECA students are responsible for the operation of our school store, gaining real experience in small business operations. DECA students have the opportunity to travel throughout the country during the year. Students will be involved in fundraisers, store operation, club outings and community service. Membership is required for the marketing class; however, it is open to any other business student.

**DIAMOND CLUB** – The Diamond Club is the support group for the Baseball teams. Members assist in organizing and running all home baseball games. Their responsibilities include scorekeeping, working the scoreboard and concession stand and acting as batgirls. Fundraising activities include a carwash and sales during the season.

FCA (FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES) – Organization whose purpose is to provide students who have similar beliefs with an opportunity for fellowship in non-denominational atmospheres.

**FCCLA** – Family, Careers, and Community Leaders of America is a dynamic and effective student organization that helps young men and women become strong leaders. It is a nationwide organization with over 200,000 members. It is the only in-school student organization with the family as its central focus. This organization strives to create student leaders, while giving back to both community and family.

**FIRE SCIENCE** – This is a class and a club. Contact the sponsors for further information.

**FRESHMAN** CLASS – Represents all freshmen at Moon Valley. Fund raising activities include a spring candy sale.

**GREEN THUMBS** – Members study horticulture, learn to install drip systems, prepare soil, plant and maintain their gardens. Members also learn the "when, where and why" of landscaping.

HOOPSTERS – Hoopsters is a support group for the Boys' Basketball teams at Moon Valley. Members are responsible for participating in fund-raising activities, working concessions, taking scoreboard team stats, being team manager at home games, and attending weekly meetings and spirit activities. Monies raised by the group are used to supplement funding for the basketball program. Social activities are shared by the group with members of the Boys' Basketball teams.

**JUNIOR CLASS** – Junior class officers have the responsibility of planning and carrying out the prom. Most activities of the Junior class are therefore directed toward that end.

**KEY CLUB** – Key Club is an International High School Service Organization whose goals are service to school and community by contributing time, effort and club profits to charitable causes. Key Club offers leadership potential and an exposure to social and community problems. The club's activities are highlighted by a three-day Southwest Convention.

**MATH CLUB** – Members work on math problems and puzzles. They study for the state Math Contest and organize and conduct the Math Bowl, a competition for top math students at each level.

**MOON VALLEY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION** – M.V.A.A. is a social service organization open to all recipients of varsity athletic awards. The major function of the organization is to promote the welfare of athletics beyond the limits of the programs offered by the school. M.V.A.A. also sponsors the Homecoming dance.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY – To be eligible for consideration in the National Honor Society, a student must be a sophomore, junior or senior with a minimum Honor Point Quotient of 5.2 and have been in attendance at Moon Valley for at least one semester. Students must demonstrate outstanding qualities in scholarship, service, leadership, and character; references on students are solicited from faculty and administration. All members must participate in service projects for school and community.

**NJROTC CLUB** – Membership is limited to students enrolled in Naval Science classes. The club provides an avenue for leadership and organizational opportunities through scheduled activities. Activities include fundraising activities, an annual military ball, an annual awards program, field trips to naval activities in the San Diego area (Naval Air Station) and shipboard visits during the spring and summer vacations.

**ORCHESIS** – Any student enrolled in any level dance class is eligible to join this Dance Club. Members have the opportunity to participate in club activities, to earn points towards awards and to perform in the annual dance show. Dance members help raise money through sales to finance the spring dance production and to supply the dance program with materials and equipment

**OUTSIDERS CLUB** – All students who love the great outdoors are invited to join the Outsiders Club. Activities include hiking and some rock climbing.

**PHOTO CLUB** – The club provides an opportunity for students with similar interests in photography to gather and learn more about their hobby. No experience with developing is necessary. All students are invited to join.

**PIN-PALS** – Pin-Pals is the support group for the school's wrestling program. Members help organize and run all home wrestling matches. Social activities are enjoyed by the Pin-Pals and wrestlers during the season. Sales and other money making activities provide funds for extra equipment and wrestling camp scholarships.

**POOL SHARKS** – The Moon Valley Pool Sharks' main purpose is to support the boys' and girls' swimming and diving teams. Activities include timing and scoring the meets, promoting spirit and fundraisers. This club is open to all Moon Valley students.

**RESCUE ROCKETS** - Rescue Rockets is a club that will be open to all students interested in learning more about caring for pets, animal shelters, fostering pets, adopting a pet, and animal advocacy.

**ROCKET REPORTER** – This is the student newspaper published monthly by Moon Valley's Advanced Journalism class. Student duties include interviewing, writing, editing, photographing, layout, cartooning, and circulation. Contributions from students, staff and the community are welcome.

**ROCKET POM -** The Moon Valley Pom Line consists of enthusiastic, talented and athletic young performers who provide leadership, and promote school spirit by performing at all basketball games as well as regional and state competitions.

**ROCKET SCIENCE & ENGINEERING** – Students who are interested in science and engineering connect with people in these fields. Students participate in related field trips, relevant competitions and engage in activities.

**SENIOR CLASS** – Senior class officers are elected representatives of the graduation class. Their function is to represent the Seniors in student body decision making and to provide leadership for Seniors in the numerous campus activities of their final year at Moon Valley.

**SIDEKICKS** – Sidekicks is the support organization for Moon Valley's Soccer teams. Funds are raised through a major carwash, sales of refreshments at the home soccer games, and other sales on campus. The money is used to buy necessary items for the Soccer teams and to pay for social activities between the teams and the Sidekicks. Membership is by application and is open to all, Freshmen through Seniors.

SKILLS USA / VICA – Students who are interested in competing in design competitions in the areas of architectural drafting and automated manufacturing technology should join. The purpose is to prepare for competitions in these areas.

**SOCCER CLUB - GIRLS** – This is the support organization for Moon Valley's Girls' Soccer teams. Students are involved in activities that include fundraisers.

**SOFTBALL CLUB** – This club helps support the girls' softball program: Freshman, Junior Varsity, and Varsity Teams. All MV students are welcome.

**SOPHOMORE CLASS** – The sophomore class represents the sophomore student body at official school functions and activities. Sales, fundraisers and many other activities are coordinated by the students in a cooperative learning, sharing, and working experience on and off campus.

**SPIRIT LINE** – The Moon Valley Spirit Line consists of enthusiastic, talented and athletic young performers who provide leadership, and promote school spirit by performing at all football games as well as regional and state competitions.

Tryouts for Varsity and Junior Varsity positions are held each Spring for the following school year, and again in the fall for incoming freshmen.

STREAKERS – The Streakers organization is a support group for the Cross Country teams. Funds raised through sales are used to provide entry fees for competitions, to provide awards for achievements in running, and to promote social activities for the club and the teams. Active participation in club activities is required for membership retention.

STUDENT COUNCIL – Student government is designed to provide participating students with the opportunity of being directly involved in school and community service. Students develop leadership potential and an awareness of the need for productive involvement. Membership is determined by elections in the spring.

**TENNIS CLUB - BOYS** – For students who wish to help support the Boys tennis team.

**TENNIS CLUB - GIRLS** – For students who wish to help support the Girls tennis team.

**THEATRE - INTERNATIONAL THESPIAN SOCIETY** – I.T.S. is an international society for recognition of participation in high school theatre arts. Students who have completed at least 100 excellent hours of work in at least two Moon Valley plays are eligible for membership. This work must be completed in at least two of the following areas: acting, technical, production/direction, or music. An annual event is held in May to honor outstanding theatre arts students.

**TOUCHDOWN CLUB** – Provides support to the Moon Valley Varsity and Junior Varsity Football programs. Club members raise money and support all areas of the program year-round.

**VOCAL MUSIC CLUB** – Vocal Music Club consists of all students who are members of Concert Choir and Vocal Ensemble classes. Various fundraising projects earn money for equipment, uniforms, letters and awards. The club usually takes an out-of-state trip at Spring Break.

**WORLD CULTURE CLUB**— The World Culture Club is open to any student on campus who is interested in exploring the many fascinating cultures of the world. Funds are raised through food and / or item sales, and are used to help pay for cultural events, the exploration of foods and activities from around the world, and team-building events. Club officers are elected annually by the membership.

**YEARBOOK** – The yearbook is compiled by the students in Publications, which is an elective class for credit. In producing the yearbook, **Countdown**, students prepare layouts, copy, artwork and photography while learning to organize and meet deadlines.

### STUDENT COUNCIL

Moon Valley High School is a unit of the Glendale Union High School District and therefore governed by the policies and procedures which allow for self-governing under the sponsorship of teachers and administrators. The administration appoints a sponsor for all classes, club organizations, and the Student Council. It is the responsibility of this sponsor to assure the administration through his or her advisor role that clubs or student government do not exceed their powers or responsibilities. Therefore, all activities and legislation must be submitted to the sponsor and the administration to insure that they do not violate school and district policies and procedures.

Furthermore, students are elected to office and it is their responsibility to carry out those duties as specified in the various constitutions. When a student's failure to carry out the duties of the office interferes with the functioning of the organization, he/she may be removed from office through the established process or, if necessary, the administration may take appropriate action.

Luanne Ashby Assistant Principal Discipline & Attendance

Moon Valley High School encourages student responsibility through regular classroom attendance. Students are able to better understand what is being taught when they are present in the classroom. Good attendance is also an indicator of future success.

#### **IDENTIFICATION (I.D.) CARD:**

Each student is issued an identification card on which appears his/her photograph, name and ID number. New ID cards will be issued at the beginning of each school year. If a card is lost, stolen, destroyed or defaced, the student must purchase a new ID card for \$5.00 at the Bookstore. Temporary ID cards will NOT be issued. Failure by a student to carry his or her ID card on campus may result in an assigned detention with appropriate increases with each additional occurrence.

Students must present ID cards to gain entrance to dances, athletic events, to check out library or textbooks and to engage in other school activities.

I.D. cards are the property of MVHS and must be surrendered by all students withdrawing from Moon Valley High School.

#### PERSONAL PROPERTY:

Any personal property brought on, or left on school premises -- IS AT RISK OF THE OWNER. Neither the school nor the district carries insurance to cover such losses. Skateboards, in-line skates, or other personal conveyances may not be used within the campus and may be confiscated.

#### **SCHOOL BUSES:**

Missing the bus is not an excuse for being tardy to school. The bus driver has complete charge of the bus and his/her instructions must be followed. Rules for passengers are posted in the front of each bus. Students riding the bus must show their school ID to the bus driver each time they ride the bus. Students whose behavior threatens the safety of others will be denied transportation. Inappropriate behavior, including vandalism and/or destruction of equipment on a bus, will result in disciplinary action by administration. For more information on Bus Discipline Guidelines refer to the

#### BICYCLES, MOTORCYCLES, VEHICLES

All motor vehicles and bicycles are to be parked in the areas provided within the campus and are not to be ridden on any sidewalk within the inner campus.

#### **TELEPHONE MESSAGES:**

Telephone messages for students WILL NOT be accepted except in emergencies. Emergency messages would include doctor's appointments, transportation, etc.

The school will not deliver lunches, money, gym clothes, flowers, balloons, etc., to students. The office has no employees or resources for deliveries and classes will not be interrupted for these reasons.

#### STUDENT PARKING:

Students who have been issued a parking permit are only allowed to park in the student parking lot. Carpool spaces are available for cars carrying two or more passengers. Any parking violation may result in disciplinary action including loss of driving privileges on campus, loss of parking permit, or having the vehicle impounded. A parking permit does not guarantee a parking space. Parking permits must be displayed on the lower left corner (the driver's side) of the windshield. Keep your car locked. Do not leave books or other valuables in your car. Students are not permitted in the school parking lot during school hours. Automobiles driven on the school facility, whether or not those automobiles are student owned, are subject to search by school authorities and law enforcement personnel working with them. Such search may be conducted without a warrant for any reasonable purpose. The school may limit parking permits to juniors and seniors. Students not issued a parking permit will have their names placed on a waiting

The only student drop-off area is located in the east driveway. The administration reserves the right to modify parking and drop-off policies depending on school safety and security.

list. Student parking is NOT permitted at Cactus Park or at nearby busi-

nesses. Students must register their vehicles with the attendance of-

#### **CONDUCT DURING LUNCH PERIODS:**

fice. Failure to comply will result in disciplinary action.

Classes are in session during lunch periods. Students must stay away from buildings during lunch periods so that classes will not be disturbed. They should enter the building only if they have a pass. Students should dispose of paper, wrappers, and lunch refuse in the proper containers. Running in the cafeteria is not allowed as this endangers others. The administration reserves the right to designate/limit eating areas.

**INAPPROPRIATE DISPLAY OF AFFECTION:** It is in poor taste for students to embrace each other on campus. Good taste decrees that students conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen at all times. Because it is hard to determine the fine line of what is or is not an embrace, holding hands is the limit for affection shown on the Moon Valley High School campus.

RACIAL/ETHNIC INSULTS AND INTIMIDATION: A healthy school environment must be free from racial/ethnic/sexual insults and intimidation. Under the heading of "Harassment and Verbal Abuse," any behavior which intimidates or demeans others violates school rules. However, behavior which intentionally intimidates or demeans another person or group on the basis of racial or ethnic or sexual background has a uniquely destructive effect on school climate, often eroding an entire group's feeling of safety and well-being. For this reason, racial/ethnic/sexual insults or intimidations are not tolerated at any time.

**CONDUCT AT DANCES & SPORTING EVENTS:** Special event dances are held in the gymnasium or cafeteria. The Junior/Senior Prom may be held off campus. See the section for Guest Passes on page 14 for information on inviting guests.

Dances are always well chaperoned and held by a high school group only with Student Council and Administrative approval.

The following regulations are enforced at all dances and sporting

- When a student leaves the building, he/she leaves the activity for the remainder of the evening.
- Use of and possession of tobacco products is prohibited anywhere on campus, near the campus perimeter, and at school sponsored events.
- 3. No one will be admitted with alcohol or drugs on his/her breath or person.
- 4. There shall be no loitering at the doors or on the grounds outside.
- 5. Appropriate school dress except for special dances is required.
- 6. Students who do not act as ladies and gentlemen will be asked to leave.
- 7. Students must present their ID cards at each event they attend.
- 8. Backpacks and extra large purses may be prohibited at certain events and may be searched by administration at all other events.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT DRESS**

ARS 13-205.A.5. states, "Student conduct, dress, and personal appearance must be such that it is appropriate and meets reasonable safety, health and decency standards and that it will not disrupt or distract from the instructional procedure of the school nor tend to diminish the disciplinary control of the teacher."

The school has a responsibility to encourage students to maintain high standards of scholarship. This can be accomplished only through strong feelings of self-respect. One avenue of creating self respect is to dress well. We strongly recommend the following standards:

- Cleanliness should be observed with regard to clothing, hair, and personal hygiene.
- 2. Bare feet in public places are prohibited by state health laws as a precaution for public health and safety.

#### STUDENTS SHALL NOT WEAR

- 1. Clothing that reveals the torso (front, back or sides)
- 2. Clothing that reveals cleavage
- 3. Tops with straps that are less than two inches in width. NO tube tops, halter tops or spaghetti straps (layering multiple tops against dress code is also prohibited).
- 4. Tops that are not long enough to be tucked in and allow the midriff to show.
- 5. Clothing which reveals undergarments. This includes bra straps, boxers (and other undergarments) and sleeveless undershirts.
- 6. Clothing, hats, jewelry, backpacks or notebooks that carry symbols endorsing or implying the use of illegal substances, substances not legally available to minors which include but are not limited to tobacco products, hooka products, alcohol products, or drugs.
- 7. Clothing, backpacks, notebooks or jewelry that have profane, sexual, illegal, violent or otherwise disruptive connotation.
- 8. Pajama pants, slippers or sleep attire.
- 9. Jackets, coveralls, sweatshirts, or see-through garments to "cover up" any inappropriate clothing.
- 10. Clothing or material that contains racial, ethnic, religious, or handicap slurs. This includes backpacks.
- 11. Apparel which may be converted to form a weapon such as spiked jewelry, wallet chains, arm, wrist and neck bands, or chains.
- 12. Hair nets, skull caps, do-rags and similar apparel.
- 13. Clothing that may be identified as gang related, including bandannas or any other attire that is identified by the campus administration.
- 14. Shorts, skirts and dresses that do not reach mid-thigh.
- 15. Hats inside classrooms, the media center, the administration building, the cafeteria, and the gym during school hours. Students are required to remove hats in the auditorium at all times.
- 16. See-through garments.

#### THINGS TO REMEMBER

- To comply with city ordinances, students who walk to or from Moon Valley and cross Cactus Road must use the designated crosswalk at 35th or 37th Avenue.
- Any theft should be reported to the Attendance office at once. Keep your P.E. lockers LOCKED and make sure that no one else knows your combination.
- 3. The school day officially begins at 7:55 am and ends at 3:30 pm. If a teacher requests you to be at school for remediation, make-up work or detention within the official school day, you must attend.
- 4. According to ARS 13-905, students are not permitted to loiter in or around the school campus. This includes Cactus Park, businesses around 35th Avenue and other perimeter areas. Students not directly involved in sports or after school activities must leave campus at 2:45pm.
- 5. Students are reminded that the school's Good Neighbor Policy extends one hour before and after normal school hours and that loitering when going to and from school is a violation of this policy.
- 6. The Moon Valley campus is subject to camera surveillance.
- 7. Silent Witness offers rewards to students who provide information regarding crimes or potential crimes at school and/or in the community. Students can earn cash rewards of up to \$1,000 for providing this information. It's all anonymous. Call one of these easy-to-remember numbers: 480-WITNESS (948-6377) or 800.343.TIPS. The Moon Valley Silent Witness line is (623) 915-8016.

#### ELECTRONIC DEVICES

The use or possession of iPods, cell phones, hand-held games, CD players, MP3 players, etc., is prohibited on campus during school hours. Students must have all electronic devices turned off and out of sight from the time the first school-hour bell rings until the end of the last school period (7:55am-2:35pm). This includes passing periods and lunch. **Consequences** for violating the restriction on electronic devices may include confiscation of the device, detention, parent conference, suspension. Repeated violations may result in student not being allowed to possess any electronic device on campus at any time.

#### ATTENDANCE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Promptness and regular attendance are points that characterize dependability in any person. This is a vital part of education and preparation for business.

#### **TARDY**

When the bell rings to start a class, all tardy students are to report to the attendance office and will return to class with a pass. Non-compliance is considered insubordination.

#### ABSENT

If a student is absent from school, a parent should call the attendance office from 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on the day of the absence. If the school does not hear from the parent, the school will make every effort to contact the parent by telephone.

Upon returning to school following an absence, it is not necessary for the student to report to the Attendance Office. A student should report directly to class. A student who returns to school on the day of an excused absence must check in through the attendance office

Absence notification must be made within 24 hours by the parent/guardian or the student will be considered truant.

To participate in extracurricular activities (practice, rehearse, perform, compete), the student is required to attend ALL his/her classes. Exceptions:

- Circumstances beyond the control of the student as determined by coach/sponsor/director.
- 2. Unavoidable absence verified by parent(s) and/or the school to the coach's/sponsor's/director's/teacher's satisfaction.

#### SUSPENSIONS

Any student suspended off campus is ineligible to practice/participate/compete for the duration of the suspension. Students cannot be on campus for the duration of the suspension for any reason without administrative approval. Unless the suspension is immediately invoked (student removed from campus), suspension is served according to the disciplinary disposition.

#### LEAVING SCHOOL DUE TO ILLNESS

If a student becomes ill during the school day, he/she must obtain a pass from his/her classroom teacher to go to the Health Center and receive a nurse's absence permit before leaving the campus. Leaving without a pass is a truancy.

### LEAVING SCHOOL FOR REASONS OTHER THAN ILLNESS

If it is necessary to leave campus during the school day for any reason other than illness, the student must bring a written request from the parent or guardian to the attendance office **BEFORE** the absence occurs. Students must check out through the attendance office. Leaving without a pass is a truancy.

#### DETENTION

If detention is assigned for any reason through the attendance office, it shall be served on the days designated on the detention slip. If the student is in school but fails to report for detention for **any reason**, the penalty will be SUSPENSION. If the student has a conflict with detention (job or appointment), the latter will have to be changed. Detention is not designed to be served at students' convenience.

#### **CAMPUS POLICIES**

No student is authorized to leave the campus during regular classroom hours. Other individuals who are not employees or students of the school are not authorized to be on the school campus during school hours except by express permission of the school administration.

#### VISITORS' PASSES

Parents and guardians are always welcome on the Moon Valley campus, but to avoid misunderstandings they are asked to check in at the administration office.

Because we value quality education and "time on task," student requests for visitors passes during the school day will NOT be issued

VISITORS WHO HAVE NOT BEEN ISSUED A VISITORS PASS THROUGH THE ADMINISTRATION OFFICE WILL BE CONSIDERED TRESPASSERS.

**Guest passes** for dances are limited to one per student. Guest passes are issued as a courtesy and may be revoked by school

personnel if the guest abuses his/her privileges.

- Sign up for a guest pass in the Attendance Office at least one week prior to the event.
- 2. Issuance of guest passes is subject to administrative approval.
- 3. Guest passes will be issued by the Attendance office only to approved visitors and will be available the day following submission of the request. Guests must be under 21 years of age.

#### SUMMARY

A primary responsibility of the Glendale Union High School District and its professional staff shall be the development of an understanding and appreciation of our representative form of government, the rights and responsibilities of the individual, and the legal processes whereby necessary changes are brought about.

The school is a community and the rules and regulations of a school are the laws of that community. All those enjoying the rights of citizenship in the school community must also accept the responsibilities of citizenship. A basic responsibility of those who enjoy the rights of citizenship is to respect the laws of the community.

Recent court decisions have indicated clearly that young people in the United States have the right to receive a free public education and the deprivation of that right may occur only for just cause and in accordance with due process of law.

Administrators and teachers also have rights and duties. The teacher is required by law to maintain a suitable environment for learning. Administrators have the responsibility for maintaining and facilitating the educational program; the principal and assistant principals are authorized to suspend students for cause.

The following rules, regulations, and due process procedure statements are designated to protect all members of the educational community in the exercise of their rights and duties.

All conduct which materially and substantially interferes with the educational process is prohibited. Persons engaging in this type of behavior are subject to suspension or a recommendation for expulsion.

Students must obey the lawful or reasonable instructions of school district personnel. The failure to do so shall be considered insubordination.

All persons must, upon request, identify themselves to school authorities or staff. This provision covers all persons on campus or at schoolsponsored events. The failure to comply can result in a suspension and/or the notification of law enforcement officials. A current school I.D. card must be carried by all students and will be presented to any district staff member upon request.


