The achievement of an additional 4 Eden Alternative Philosophy principles in late 2013 was a great success that was celebrated by residents and staff accordingly – Congratulations to all who were involved in this worthwhile recognition. Margaret Wilson Home, The Croft and Wallingford Home now have recognised International Accreditation against 6 of the 10 Eden Alternative Philosophy Principles and have this resident-centred philosophy imbedded within the culture of each home.

#### **Eden Alternative Philosophy Principles Achieved:**

2. An Elder-centred community commits to creating a Human Habitat where life revolves around close and continuing contact with plants, animals and children. It is





these relationships that provide the young and old alike with a pathway to a life worth living.

- 3. Loving companionship is the antidote to loneliness. Elders deserve easy access to human and animal companionship.
- 4. An Elder-centred community creates opportunity to give as well as receive care. This is the antidote to helplessness.
- 5. An Elder-centred community imbues daily life with variety and spontaneity by creating an environment in which unexpected and unpredictable interactions and happenings can take place. This is the antidote to boredom.
- 6. Meaningless activity corrodes the human spirit. The opportunity to do things that we find meaningful is essential to human health.
- 10. Wise leadership is the lifeblood of any struggle against the three plagues. For it, there can be no substitute.





## Family Works

Many of our local stakeholders are unaware that the seven Presbyterian Support regions around the country are part of a national federation that is visible through a small national office team – Presbyterian Support NZ (PSNZ). PSNZ is based in Wellington and as well as being our national advocacy voice with government their role is to facilitate the sharing of ideas and innovative service development that is drawn from across the seven regions. The PSNZ National Executive Officer, Christine Hurley leads a small, but effective team in this endeavour. Christine will be retiring in June 2014 and we thank her for her commitment.

With government signalling its desire to 'do more with less' resourcing and seeking to engage more effectively with larger organisations in the social services sector, the seven Presbyterian Support regions as a federation have looked long and hard at how to structure the PSNZ national office to deliver the best results for all.

While we have recognised the benefits of building our expertise nationally, it has been extremely important to all the Boards to retain both regional autonomy and responsiveness. As a result of many hours of planning and development, agreement has now been reached to establish a new focus for PSNZ through the development of a Family Works Service Development Unit. In simple terms this means that PSNZ will now focus on working to support the Family Works Services of the seven Presbyterian Support regions and initially this will focus on the national development of a common staff professional practice framework. The development of a project to standardise the way regions will collectively gather data and to structure our data collection methodology under a 'Results Based Accountability' framework will also be on the work programme.

These changes will see a more consistent and professional approach across the seven Presbyterian Support regions and enhance our ability to effectively communicate our success to government and to stakeholders and funders. All of the Presbyterian Support regions are excited about this new development and look forward to keeping you updated on our progress over the next year or so.

## **Fundraising**

As our community calls on us to do more to support the vulnerable amongst us, we have had to look for more creative ways of funding what often are heavily cost subsidised programmes and services. An example of this is in our Family Works service where we internally fund a financial shortfall between what is contract funded and what the needs of the community are of around \$300,000 per year. To continue to grow our services we are calling for more support from our community.

We have been fortunate to recruit the services of Stacey Scott and Rebecca Campbell from Scott and Associates to further develop and oversee our fundraising programme going forward. Most of you will know Stacey from her recent work successfully overseeing the fundraising venture for the Timaru Hospital MRI and CBay Aguatic Centre. We welcome the expertise that
