FROM SHELTER TO HOME: ALF'S JOURNEY ... WITH HELP FROM HIS FRIENDS

Helping a dog transform from a throw-away homeless dog to a well-loved companion involves time, effort, commitment and the compassion of many people. In this story we honor those people who helped Alf find his way home.

On December 24, 2013 Animal Control Officer Carol Barnes brought a "stray" dog to the Whidbey Animals' Improvement Foundation shelter in Coupeville where he was welcomed by shelter staff and named Elf because it was Christmas Eve.

Elf was very thin, had skin issues, wasn't neutered, and he didn't see very well. As soon as the required five day holding period expired and no one came to claim him. Elf was neutered by veterinarian Michele Schmidtke at the WAIF Spay/Neuter Clinic and was brought to Penn Cove

Veterinary Clinic in Coupeville where he was seen by Dr. Karen Schmid. Dr. Schmid diagnosed Elf's eye condition as "dry eye," so she prescribed drops and ointment as well as

Elf spent nine months at the WAIF shelter where his medical issues were treated and he received all of the required vaccinations as well as flea medication, medicated baths for his skin condition and the necessary eye medication was administered twice daily by shelter staff. He was taken to Penn Cove Veterinary Clinic on five different occasions where

antibiotics and medication for his skin issues.

While he was at the shelter Elf became a staff and volunteer favorite and many different volunteers spent time playing with him, taking him for walks and just hanging out with him.

But no one adopted Elf. He didn't show well at the shelter (most dogs don't) and his forceful presence didn't serve him well when he met new people and other dogs. Living in a kennel 24/7 is very hard and after about eight months Elf began to suffer from shelter stress.

I walk dogs at the WAIF shelter so I spent time with Elf every week and as the weeks and

months passed I knew that if he was going to survive mentally and emotionally he needed to be out of the shelter. ODH is the safety net for many senior dogs that have no other options, so I asked Judith if we could find a foster home for Elf and long-time foster dad Roland Lesta agreed to take him.

September 18, 2014 was the big day. When I arrived at the shelter to pick up Elf shelter staff had given him a bath and he was all spiffed up in a purple bandana and purple harness.



The staff walked us out to the parking lot and said their goodbyes to a dog they had grown to love but hoped they'd never see again at the shelter.

The drive to Roland's house was a bit unsettling for Alf, especially the ferry ride and the motion of the windshield wipers,

but I shared my peanut butter sandwich with him and he soon settled down and slept with his head on my lap.

When we arrived at Roland's house, Elf and Roland greeted each other like long lost friends and I immediately knew that Elf was in good hands. Before I left that day Elf had become Alf.

During the time Alf spent with Roland as an ODH adoptable foster dog he was seen by Dr. Karen Weeks and Dr. Jaymie Rennert at Frontier Village Veterinary Clinic. On his first visit Dr. Weeks did a complete blood panel, urinalysis, anal gland expression, fecal check, microchip, and vaccines. He was also checked a second time for minor lameness. (Alf pretty much has one speed when he moves: flat-out running.) Roland also took Alf to Northwest Animal Eye Specialists where Dr. Dara Zirofsky gave him a complete eye exam, confirmed the dry eye diagnosis and prescribed lifetime topical treatment.

What Roland did for Alf would fill a book, but the bottom line is that he loved him and helped him to see that he had value. Roland describes Alf as "...Goofy! Funniest dog I have ever known. Makes me laugh a lot. He's one spicy meatball."

After six months of "Rolandizing" it was time for Alf to find his forever home. With Roland's

help, Judith wrote about Alf, Deeanne Matz (our webmaster) posted his photo and write-up on the ODH website and Tina Nabseth, our social media coordinator, posted him on Facebook.



On March 12, 2015 Alf was adopted by Elizabeth and Gary Lampers. The Lampers were looking for a companion for their dog Blue, and they felt Alf would be perfect. He is. Blue is deaf and Alf doesn't see very well, but they help each other. The Spicy Meatball finally has a forever home, a dog sister and two people who love him.

Paws up to everyone who helped Alf find his way home!

"After fostering, though, my favorite role for ODH is as a transporter. I get to drive all over Western Washington, picking up dogs from shelters and taking them to their new foster homes. There is nothing more fun than springing an oldster from a shelter, popping him/her into my car and telling him, "Okay, little buddy – you're heading to your forever home!" They may not understand me, but I know the wonderful new life that is in store for them!

"Old Dog Haven has become a big part of whom and what I am becoming as I transition into retirement. Everyone involved in this organization is of one mind – helping old dogs, and I'm making many new friends, because everyone I've met in this organization is also lots of fun! I feel like I have found my people!
