1. **Alexander Wilson**-1 was born in 1735 in Scotland, Midlothian, Edinburgh. He was buried in 1771 in USA, NY, New York, Trinity Parish Church Yard?. He died about 1771 in USA, NY, New York. His Ancestral File Number is 1Z0T-5X4.

Notes for Alexander Wilson: General Notes: Geneology of the Wilson Family Started by Eunice Eleanor "Ellen" (Wilson) Capen, in 1926

"Our forefather, Alexander Wilson, Sr., married Jane Armour or Armer in Edinburgh, Scotland. It is a family tradition that the Armours were a branch of the Cameron family, who changed their name for political reasons.

"Alexander Wilson, Sr. and wife, Jane Armour Wilson, appeared in New York City sometime prior to the year 1764. Tradition says he came to recover property of a brother, who recently died and that he brought his goods in a wheelbarrow. If so, he must have first located in some other place. He died soon after his arrival in New York City. His widow then moved to Lancingburg, New York and married, Mr. Robert Moffit, who was Editor and Publisher of the first newspaper published in Troy. "The Troy Budget". Moffit was a Tory and an Irishman. One son was born to them, Robert Jr. He went to the Sandwich Islands about 1831, where he married a King's daughter. He died on the Islands.

"Alexander Wilson Sr. was a Presbyterian and of Scotch-Irish decent. Our forefather is buried in a New York City churchyard, so tradition says. He died sometime in the latter part of the 18th century and certainly before 1800. (Jan/Feb.12, 1771)

"Two children were born to Alexander, Sr., and Jane Armour Wilson. Alexander, Jr., born Mar. 25, 1764 -d. Sep. 29, 1848, (moved from New York City and settled on a farm in Ballston, Saratoga Co., and in 1838 moved to the town of Wilson, Niag. Co. NY) and Jane, born August 12, 1767.

"Jane married Levi Pawling.

"Alexander, Jr., married Eunice Seeley, b. May 4, 1780, daughter of Stephen Seeley. She was 16 years of age and he was 27. They were married in Saratoga Co. New York, May 4, 1797, where his mother Jane (Armour) Wilson had moved after the death of her second husband, Robert Moffit. Alexander, Jr., was educated to be a Presbyterian minister, married a Quaker girl and turned Quaker. They had 9 children. 1. Cynthia, 2. Stephen, 3. Ruth, 4. Robert, 5. Jane, 6. William A., 7. Sally Ann, 8. Eunice Charlotte, 9. Sarah Ann.

"Alexander Jr. and Eunice (Seeley) Wilson's home was in Charleson, Saratoga Co. New York but they must have lived in Albany sometime about 1826, for when William A. was 18 years of age, he took a load of flour from Albany to Boston and returning brought back a load of codfish in the year 1826. This was done by horse power and he had to change his wagon for sleighs on the return trip. I, Ellen, also have a distinct recollection of William A. telling of renting Reuseler Island, consisting of thirty acres for \$300,00, and growing garden truck. He use to ferry to and from this island in the Hudson River. He also told about going to escort his sisters home at night, for they worked in a glove factory in Albany, New York. William A. had the honor of riding on the DeWilt Clinton steam train from Albany to Schenectady on it's initial trip.

"Alexander Jr., his wife Eunice (Seeley) Wilson and their son William A. came to Niagara Co.in the year 1838, where he died at the home of his son, William A., on September 29, 1848. His wife, Eunice, died at the same home on September 10, 1855.

"Her mother, Stephen Seeley's wife, whose maiden name was Odell, died at the home of Cynthia and Philonzo Chamberlain in Somersat, Hillsdale Co. Michigan in the year 1840 at the age of 94 years.

"The different branches of the Wilson family: Wilsons, Armours, Pawlings, Odells, Moreys, Seeleys, Chamberlains, Bivins, Woods, Chapmans, Hargers, Farnsworth, Meads, Bradleys, Bakers, Hills, Campbells, and many more!

"The Wilsons, Armours, Odells, Meads are from Scotch-Irish descent. The Pawlings are Hollanders. Seeleys, Chamberlains, Hargers and Morleys are English.

"Chamberlains came first, between the years 1621-1640. Seeleys, 1630. Moreys about the same year and were classed as Puritans. The Scotch-Irish came from 1740 to 1765 and were Presbyterians. They settled in the western part of Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey, and took an active part in the French and Indian also Revolutionary Wars.

"All the ancestors of the several families came by the way of New York City, up the Hudson to Saratoga Co. and hence to Niagara Co. where they were pioneers in 1825 to 1838. Our forefathers came a little later. Stephen came in 1826, Alexander Jr., wife and William came in 1838. Wm. A. went back to Saratoga Co. in 1840, was married to Lamira Tappin of Charleston, and came to Niagara Co. First settled on the old Dan Carter farm on the Slash Road (Maple Rd.) in the spring of 1845 moved onto old place with ten acres cleared of forty, bought at \$15.00 per acre and a frame house. Traded place at Charleston for upper place of seventy-five acres then bought strip on south side of forty consisting of twenty acres for \$300.00. He then owned 135 acres. Built stone house to replace the frame one."

From *Western New York*, page 157, "[t]he progenitor of the Wilson family of Lockport was a native of Scotland. Little can be told of his early life or of his family, but the numerous family he founded has formed an association and is sending a representative to Scotland who will thoroughly investigate all sources of information and it is believed will clear away any uncertainty that now exists concerning his early life. Alexander Wilson, born in Edinburgh, Scotland, came to the American colonies before the revolutionary war and settled in New York city, where he became prominent in business and in the church. He was an active member of old Trinity, where his memory is perpetuated by a stone placed in the church wall. He is buried in the old churchyard surrounding Trinity on lower Broadway. Ebenezer Wilson, probably a son of Alexander Wilson, was vestryman of Trinity from 1797 to 1805. Alexander Wilson married Jane Armour and had issue."

This is the only mention of a son of Alexander Wilson and Jane Armour named Ebenezer. Furthermore, the will of Alexander Wilson, found by Robert Walter Wilson and reproduced below, states that Alexander had two children: Alexander and Jane.

The same article on the family of Alexander Wilson appears in *Genealogical and Family History of New York*, pages 157-158.

From *De Kalb County*, page 648, Alexander Wilson was a cousin of Alexander Hamilton, and the Wilsons were connected to Governor James Clinton by marriage through Col. Albert Pawling, the brother of Levi (2) Pawling.

Much of the information on the ancestors of Alexander Wilson comes from Loretta Rae Barnes, a 6th great-grand-daughter of John Burgess Wilson.

From Robert Walter Wilson:

Written by Robert Walter Wilson 3rd great grandson June,1996: "Before Alexander, Sr came to New York the Dutch had not owned the Manhattan Island for almost one hundred years. In the decade before (1760) the Revolution, the city that had begun as a little Dutch village had a population close to twenty thousand. Old Trinity church located at Broadway and Wall Streets was built in 1697 and was destroyed in the Battle for Manhattan on September 21, 1776. The records of burial prior to that time are destroyed. Since it is known that [Alexander Wilson] died in the year 1771 it seems unlikely that unless new evidence is found his birth and death date will remain a mystery. At the head of Wall Street just off Broadway stood the Presbyterian Church with its tall steeple and little burying ground in

front. It may be possible that he is buried there and Pat Rice [Patricia Ann (Wilson) Rice] has written to get any records from this church. [There are no records of his belonging to or buried at this church. Letter from the church dated 9/96) The information above is from Olga Hall-Quest's book "From Colony to Nation" 973.3 H181f From the same source. The Stamp Act was passed in November 1, 1765 which required the colonists to purchase a stamp for almost every kind of paper, newspaper, ships clearance papers, wills, and deeds, costing from a halfpenny to twenty shillings. "There was such stagnaton of business in New York during the summer of 1765 as the city had never known before. Trade in this part of the world, a citizen wrote is come to so wretched a pass that you would imagine the plague had been here, the grass growing in most trading streets". It was not an easy time to be in business and our ancestors surely suffered as did all the residents of New York. They too must have felt and resisted the increasing tax burdens imposed my Mother England."

From *Wills of New York* 1766-1771, page 536: Will of Alexander Wilson, found by Robert Walter Wilson, "translated" by an attorney friend of Robert's:

In the Name of Lord Amen, I Alexander Wilson of the City of New York Shopkeeper being at present declining in health yet of sound and disposing mind memory and understanding and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life and that it is appointed for all men once to die do therefore make and publish this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following That is to say first and fundamentally(?) I commend my Soul to The Hands of Almighty God who gave it me and my body to the Earth from whence it came in sure and certain Hopes of a joyful Resurrection through the Merits of my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. And as to Such worldly Estate wherewith God hath been pleased to bless me with, I give devise and dispose of as follows. I do hereby order that all my just Debts and funeral Expenses be fully paid and satisfied within some convenient Time after my decease Amen I do hereby give devise and begueath unto My dearly beloved Wife Jane one third part of my whole Estate as well as personal And as to the other two thirds part of my whole Estate I hereby give devise ad bequeath to my two Children Alexander and Jane Share and Share alike And lastly I do hereby nominate constitute \\\\\\ my loving Wife Jane Executrix and my good Friends Samuel Sowdon and Johnathan Blake of the City of New York to be Executors of this my Last Will and Testament hereby revoking and disannulling all former and other Wills or Will Testament or Testament heretofore by me made and declared either in Word or in writing allowing this and none other to be my last Will and Testament In witness whereof The Said Alexander Wilson have hereto set my hand and Seal this Day of January in the year of our Lord one thous and seven hundred and seventy one. /

Jane Armour was born on 12 Aug 1736 in Scotland, Midlothian, Edinburgh. She was born in 1742. Her Ancestral File Number is 1Z0T-5ZB. She died in USA, NY, Saratoga County.

General Notes:

From *Burhans Genealogy*, page 322: After the death of Alexander Wilson, Jane (Armour) Wilson "moved to Lansingburg, N.Y., where she m. a Mr. Moffitt, editor and proprietor of the first newspaper in Troy, the 'Troy Budget.' The family state that their parents always spoke of Alexander Hamilton as a cousin, but they have not the facts to prove it." From family tradition, Jane (Armour) (Wilson) Moffit and Robert Moffit had one child, Robert Moffit, Jr. See Robert Moffit, Jr., for more information.

From *Niagara County, New York*, page 709, after Alexander's death, Jane "was united with a British officer of the Revolutionary war, named Moffatt. At the time of the invasion of General Burgoyne, the British raided the Wilson homestead in eastern New York, confiscating the household effects and the cattle. A negro slave attached to the Wilson household shortly afterward discovered the cattle herded in the forest, some distance from the Wilson home, and, during the night, succeeded in stampeding them. The next morning they were all found safe on the farm. Great-grandmother Wilson, on the morning following the plundering of her home, mounted a horse and rode courageously into the British army camp, where she secured an interview with the officer in command. She demanded the return of her property and so well and valiantly did she present her claims that full restitution was eventually made."

A different take on what is probably the same event is told in *De Kalb County*, pages 648-49: "Mrs. Wilson, who was a devoted patriot, having lost her husband [Alexander Wilson] in New York city, removed to Salem, Washington County, where she married one Moffat, of Tory sympathies. They carried on a store and farm, and among their employees had several Tories. One day Mrs. Moffat discovered that she had been robbed of some valuables, including a gold watch. The absence of some of her Tory workmen led her to believe them to be the thieves and to suppose that they had sought safety in Burgoyne's camp at Saratoga. Mounting her horse, she rode to the British camp and demanded an audience of Gen. Burgoyne, which was granted, when she demanded a search for her property, which was at first refused, whereupon she threatened to report the General. Burgoyne coolly asked to whom she would report him. Her answer was, "To the Congress of the United Colonies." The General, much amused at this storming of his camp by a patriot in petticoats, he ordered a search. The stolen articles were found and restored to her with the exception of the watch, which an officer pocketed, with the remark that he would keep it for Mr. Moffat."

De Kalb County continues: "At another time her husband, under pretense of danger to her safety in her home, packed their goods, mounted her on a horse with her baby [Robert Moffit, Jr.] in her arms and started for Albany. On the way she surmised, from a mysterious conversation between her husband and some well-known Tories, that she was being taken to the camp of the British army.

Watching her opportunity, she ordered her attendants back, while she led them and returned to her home.

De Kalb County concludes: "The tradition of these incidents go to prove the courage and patriotism of this lady ancestor, and is very properly remembered with pride by her descendants."

Soon after his son William A. [Armour] had taken up his abode in Niagara county, he came to this locality and here spent the rest of his life."

From *Western New York*, page 157, Alexander Wilson, Jr., "removed from New York City and settled on a farm in the town of Ballston, Saratoga county, and in 1838 removed to the town of Wilson, Niagara county, New York, where he died."

For many years, the only information family tradition preserved about Jane Wilson was that she had married a man named Levi Pawling. While looking through old papers belonging to her maternal grandfather, Benjamin Ernest Wilson, Fern Eleanor Cook found 3 sheets of paper in Ben's handwriting that contained information about the descendants of Jane Wilson and Levi Pawling. See "media" section under either Jane Wilson or Levi (2) Pawling for copies of these notes. The notes were obviously not intended to be a strict genealogy, but appeared to be notes taken during a conversation with someone who knew the family. That "someone" has not been identified. There were several points that were not clear, and different people had different interpretations of the notes. Much later, through on-line research, the family located information about the Pawling family, including many members of the family in addition to Jane Wilson and Levi Pawling, in various historical works. For the most part, these historical accounts agreed with Ben's notes, although his notes included family members who have not yet been found in the historical works. Primary sources of information on the Pawling family are: De Kalb County, Northern New York. Further research is necessary.

The information from Ben Wilson's notes is augmented by De Kalb County, page 648.

The information was also confirmed and augmented by *Burhans Genealogy: Descendants from the First Ancestor in America*, *Jacob Burhans*, *1660*, *and His Son*, *Jan Burhans*, *1663*, *to 1893*, Samuel Burhans, Jr, New York, 1894.

Levi [2] Pawling son of Levi Pawling and Helena Magdalena Burhans was born on 12 Oct 1759 in USA, NY, Lansingburg. He died in 1822. His Ancestral File Number is 1Z0T-61P.

Further research is necessary to determine the ancestry of Philonzo Chamberlain. We presently have no names for his parents, although it is probable that he is descended from the early Chamberlain settlers. To date, requests for assistance sent to the World Chamberlain Society have gone unanswered. Perhaps if a direct descendant were to request assistance, the Society might be more interested in responding.

Much of the information on the descendants of Philonzo Chamberlain and Cynthia Wilson comes from research done by Alta Pearl (Baker) Eggert, a 2nd great-granddaughter of Philonzo and Cynthia, through her daughter, Marcia Jean (Eggert) Shaffer.

From family tradition, the father of Philonzo Chamberlain drowned in one of the Finger Lakes, and Philonzo came to live with Alexander Wilson Jr and Eunice Charlotte (Seeley) Wilson. Philonzo's mother was still alive, and later apparently married a gentleman named Hunt.

From research done by William F Arlington, Philonzo Chamberlain bought 168 acres of land in Lenawee County, MI, on 25 May 1835 (T. 5 S., R. 1 E., sec. 6). From census records, showing Philonzo in Somerset, Niagara County, NY, in 1830, and in Woodstock TWP, Lenawee County, MI, in 1840, and from the fact that his daughter, Eunice B Chamberlain, was born in NY, about 1835, and his son, Augustus W Chamberlain, was born in MI on 03 May 1837, it appears that Philonzo moved his family to MI between 1835 and 1837. Around this time, a great number of Wilson family members moved west.

From Marcia Jean (Eggert) Shaffer, her mother, Alta Pearl (Baker) Eggert, was sent notes on the Chamberlain family by Donald and Alma (Last Name Unknown). Donald and Alma were in Constantine, MI, on 9 Nov 1976. Those notes state: "Philo Chamberlain, b. 26 May 1804 (1798?), Onandago Co. N.Y. His father drowned in and his body was never recovered from one of the Finger Lakes in N.Y. State. He was raised by his wife's parents. His mother later married a man named Hunt. Chamberlains were English, coming to America between 1621-1640 by way of N.Y. City, up the Hudson to Saratoga Co. and thence on to Niagara Co. where they were pioneers. Philo married 6 Oct. 1825, Cynthia Wilson. They moved to Lenawee Co., Mich in 1836 or 37. Cynthia died 25 Dec 1885 and Phil 7 Dec 1894. They are buried in Woodmere Cemetery, Detroit. They had 8 children:

"M. H. Chamberlain is the youngest in a family of eight children, six boys and two girls, seven of whom are living. He attended a district school until about fifteen years of age. In the winter of 1859-60 he taught school in Lenawee County, and in the spring of 1860 entered Hillsdale College. Soon after leaving college he taught school in Oakland County. In 1864 he came to Detroit, attended a commercial college until May, 1865, and then took a position in the office of F. A. Stokes, on the corner of Jefferson avenue and Wayne street. During the first year he was employed as bookkeeper, and the year following as traveling salesman. In November, 1867, he, with his brother, Mr. A. H. Chamberlain, purchased Mr. Stokes' interest in the business, and the firm of M. H. Chamberlain & Co. was formed. Starting with comparatively small capital and only a few months' experience in the business, their success has been quite remarkable, and in their line they are among the leading firms in the country.

"In the spring of 1873 the Chamberlains organized the Fearless Tobacco Company. Mr. M. H. Chamberlain continued as a partner until March, 1876, when he sold his interest to his brother. In 1874 Mr. M. H. Chamberlain, with others, organized the Commercial Travelers' Association of Michigan, and he was elected its first president.

"In 1882 he was elected to the City Council, and in 1885 was made president of that body. In the fall of 1885 he was elected Mayor of Detroit on the Democratic ticket by a majority of about eighteen hundred over the Republican nominee.

"When a boy he was a recognized leader among his playmates. At school he was always prominent in debate, is said to have been very fond of speech-making, and is possessed of a remarkable memory. He is agreeable, well-informed, tenacious in following out a purpose, and possessed of excellent judgment. These characteristics, with other advantages, had naturally much to do with his election to the position of chief municipal officer of the city.

"He was married to Miss Ellen Wilson, of Niagara County, New York, in 1876."

This he cultivated until his death in 1881. He was an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church of Wilson, and politically a Democrat. He was a man of energy, a good neighbor, and thoroughly reliable in all his ways." That source also says that Stephen Melvin Wilson and Eleanor Pease Seeley adopted two children. If so, there is no other mention of them, and no family knowledge.

From *Niagara County, New York*, page 710: For a number of years, William Armour Wilson "was an extensive market gardener, with a farm on Rensselaer Island, in the Hudson River, near Albany, and there had a prosperous business and high standing in business circles of his community. In 1838 he came to the town of Wilson on a visit to his brother [Stephen Melvin Wilson], who had located on the farm now owned by Mr. Duxbury, and became favorably impressed with this country. Returning to his eastern home, in 1840, he married Lamira Tappen, and shortly thereafter brought his bride by horse and buggy from Albany to the town of Wilson, where he settled on the farm on Maple street known as the Dan Carter farm. Mr. Wilson prospered in this community as he had in his former home, and at the time of his death had accumulated, through industry and good management, a farm of 135 acres on the Slash road, another of fifty-three acres on the Beebe road and one of 160 acres in the state of Illinois."

William Armour Wilson first settled on Slash (now Maple) Road in the Town of Wilson, Niagara County, New York. An obituary for Orson Floyd Wilson says that William built the "stone house" there in 1860. His second farm in New York was on the corner of Beebe Road and Chestnut Road, also in the Town of Wilson. His New York family does not know where the Illinois farm was located.

Story from Fern Eleanor Cook: "This is the story I heard.

"William Armour Wilson gave each of the sons in his second family use of his farm on Slash Road for 5 years. Grand-dad [Benjamin Ernest Wilson] went on the farm in 1887. [See newspaper clipping under Benjamin Ernest Wilson.] He married in 1888 and moved Grandma [Mary Catherine Smoyer] to the Slash Road farm, where mother [Florence May Wilson] was born. He left in 1892 and bought the first 50 acres of his farm on Beebe Road with the money he had made off the Slash Road farm. They moved over there, and Armour [Armour Peter Wilson] and Dwight [Dwight Dewey Wilson] were born there.

"I don't know if Aunt Ellen [Eunice Eleanor "Ellen" Wilson] got a turn, or whether it was just the boys. I also don't know if her father [William Armour Wilson] did anything else for her. I had thought that he bought her the farm on the corner of Beebe and Chestnut, but we found evidence that she and Willis Capen bought that farm themselves. [See letter from Benjamin Ernest Wilson to Stephen Melvin Wilson.]

"Uncle Frank [Frank Bodendorfer Wilson] was the next one on the farm. I was told that his daughter Mabel [Mabel Estelle Wilson] was born in the stone house on Slash Road. Mabel was born in 1898. Her older sister Emily [Emily Cook Wilson] was probably born there. If Mabel was born on Slash Road, either Grand-dad didn't leave until 1893; Uncle Frank didn't go on the farm immediately when Grand-dad left, if he left in 1892; Frank and Edith went back to the stone house for Mabel's birth; or Mabel wasn't born in the stone house. I don't know which.

"Uncle Walter [Walter Sinsel Wilson] never went on the farm. I don't know why. He and Aunt Nellie [Nellie Margaret Wright] lived in Niagara Falls.

"Uncle George [George Richmond Wilson], the youngest boy, said he didn't want to go on the farm, so that left only Uncle Henry [Henry Odell Wilson] and Uncle Lute [Luther Armour Wilson].

"Because of the closeness of their ages, there was a disagreement between Uncle Henry and Uncle Lute over use of the farm. William Armour Wilson determined the value of the farm - I don't know how or if someone else was involved in the determination. He told Uncle Henry and Uncle Lute that whoever could come up with the money for it could buy it from the other. Uncle Henry had the financial backing of the Shaws, his wife's family [Elsie Sears Shaw]. The Shaw farm was next to William Armour's farm. Uncle Lute had only his own resources, which weren't enough, so Uncle Henry bought out Uncle Lute. This left a lot of hard feelings between Uncle Henry and Uncle Lute."

Ruth Lamira Tappen daughter of Charles Tappen and Phebe McNeil was born on 08 Oct 1820 in USA, NY, Saratoga, Charlton. She was baptized on 31 Jan 1824 in USA, NY, Saratoga, Charlton, Freehold Presbyterian Church. She lived in USA, NY, Niagara, Wilson in 1860_[3]. She died on 15 Oct 1864 in USA, NY, Niagara County (probably). Her Ancestral File Number is 1Z0T-0BJ. Her Ancestral File Number is 1SGW-LSW (as Lavinia Tappan). She was buried in USA, NY, Niagara, Wilson, Greenwood Cemetery.

Lippincott Co, Philadelphia 1907?, page 222, Ruth Lamira's name is given as Lavinia, with a date and place of death of 13 Oct 1873, Clement, IL. That date and place of death is the same as the one given immediately above it on page 222 for her brother, Jacob. Because Ruth Lamira is buried in Greenwood Cemetery as Lamira, next to William Armour Wilson, the name and date and place of death appear to be incorrect

From *Niagara County, New York*, pages 709: Benjamin Ernest Wilson was "the owner of a splendidly improved and valuable farm on the Beebe road, [town of Wilson, Niagara County, New York]." The same source states at page 710: "Benjamin E. Wilson received his educational training in the public schools of the town of Wilson and was reared as the son of a farmer. He remained with his father, who had removed to another farm in East Wilson, until he was twenty years of age, and at that time returned to the property upon which he had been born and upon which he continued to carry on agricultural operations for five years. Mr. Wilson then purchased the 100-acre farm on the Beebe road on which he now resides and where he has fifteen acres in fruit, the balance being devoted to the raising of grain and stock. He has spendid buildings, including a large and striking home and commodious barn, both of which were rebuilt by him and which are handsome structures, adding much to the value of the property."

From Fern Eleanor Cook, William Armour Wilson gave each of his sons the use of the original farm on Slash (now Maple) Road for 5 years. They could keep whatever profits they made off the farm. Ben moved to the farm when he was 20 years old, in 1887. (See Media: Newspaper Article - Benjamin Ernest Wilson Moves onto Slash Road Farm of His Father, William Armour Wilson.) According to his deeds (in the possession of Fern Eleanor Cook), he purchased 50 acres on Beebe Road on ??, and a second 50 adjoining acres on ??. These two purchases made up the 100+ acre farm on Beebe Road which is still in the possession of the family, now being owned by his great-grand-daughter, Kathryn Ann Lynn. The house referred to in the *Niagara County, New York*, biography was actually two houses which were joined together - most likely, but not known for certain, the two farm houses that were on the two pieces of property Ben purchased. It appears that the house on the first 50 acres was left in place, and the house from the second 50 acres was moved next to the first house, to the north. The houses were then joined together. Ben

apparently left the houses in this joined state for a period of time, and then did extensive renovations and rebuilding on the first house, to the south. These improvements included raising the roof and adding a full second story and attic, bumping out the south wall to form a bay window area, and adding a large front porch of blasted fieldstones. The original roofline and reconstructed roofline can be seen in photographs attached to this note. The barn referred to above has been razed.

Benjamin Ernest Wilson was the first statistician of the Wilson Reunion.

Story told by Raymond Bartz, whose father, Fred Bartz, owned the farm immediately to the south of Ben's farm on Beebe Road, Wilson, Niagara, NY (this farm is still [2009] in the possession of the Bartz family, now being owned by the Kam's, Fred's grand-daughter and her husband): We were having a problem with chicken thieves. My dad had a 7-foot high fence around our chicken coop. One night he came running from his bedroom in his long-johns, yelling that there was someone in the chicken coop. Whoever it was managed to get over that fence before Dad got out there! A couple days later Wilfred (Dennis "Wilfred" Cook, Ben's youngest grandson, and a close friend of Raymond's) and I were hanging around Ben's barn and chicken coop. Ben was working at something and said "Now boys, I don't want you playing around here, because I'm going to get that chicken thief!" He took a short piece of dynamite, climbed up a pole, and put the dynamite on top. He wired it to the door of the chicken coop. He said, "Don't be scared. I'm going to test it." He opened the door and BANG, the top 3 feet of the pole were gone. He cut off the top of the pole, got a smaller piece of dynamite, and re-did the trap. He said, "Boys, be sure not to play around here until I catch that chicken thief." I don't remember if he got the thief or not. (Note from Kathryn Ann Lynn: Ben was expert with dynamite, using it to blast tree stumps and boulders too big to move. He made the front porch of his house from blasted field stones. At that time, the government wasn't vry concerned about citizens having access to explosives.)

Henry Mead son of Michael [2] Mead and Abigail Cole was born on 28 May 1811 in USA, NY, Seneca, Ovid. He was employed as a farmer in 1860 in USA, MI, Oakland, Waterford. He died on 22 Feb 1893 in USA, MI, Oakland, Pontiac. His Ancestral File Number is 1Z0T-FXH. He was buried in USA, MI, Oakland, Pontiac, Oakhill Cemetery.

Notes for Henry Mead:

General Notes:

Henry Mead moved from Seneca County, New York,to Oakland County, Michigan, in 1832, at the age of 21. He located on Sec. 27, purchasing over 300 acres, partly from the government. By 1874, he had obtained 860 acres. In 1855, he was Justice of the Peace and served as county superintendent of the poor in 1856.

From *Portrait and Biographical Album of Oakland County, Michigan*, Chicago, Chapman Brothers, 1891, pp. 412-13: "Henry Mead. Among the men who have prospered in worldly affairs so that they are able in their declining years to retire from active life, secure in the thought that they have a competence sufficient to supply their wants, is Henry Mead, who has for some time past been living in Pontiac. He was formerly engaged in farming and still owns outlying property, but since 1874 he has lived in the city and contented himself with looking after his financial interests, while relieved from undue exertion. He occupies a pleasant residence on North Perry Street, in a good location, where he is supplied with all of the comforts heart could wish and whence he is able to attend such gatherings, as he desires.

"The paternal grandfather of our subject was Ezra Mead, of Vermont, who was of English descent, and his maternal grandfather was Moses Cole, a native of New York. Michael Mead was born in Rutland County, VT, in 1770, and Abigail Cole opened her eyes to the light in Saratoga County, NY in 1785. The marriage of this couple was solemnized in Seneca County and they settled on a farm there. Mr. Mead died March 4, 1834, and Mrs. Mead April 26, 1853. They reared a family of six children, named respectively, Ezra, Phi Linda, Lewis [who married Ruth Wilson], Fanny, Henry, and Stephen, but only Henry and Stephen are now living.

"The birth of Henry Mead occurred in Seneca County, NY, May 28, 1811, and he spent his boyhood in Romulus Township, attending school during the winter months and working on the farm in

the summer. He was accompanied by a bride of a few days -- Miss Maria Rattan, daughter of John Rattan. The young couple took up their abode in Waterford Township, this county, and opened up a new farm of two hundred acres. Good buildings were erected on the tract; the number being added to from time to time as the cleared land grew in extent and more storage room was necessary. Mr. Mead bought three hundred and sixty acres more and after a few years made another purchase of one hundred and twenty acres. He carried on general farming and raised sheep and cattle until 1874, when he traded one hundred and sixty acres of his land for city property and moved to Pontiac.

"The bride of Mr. Mead's early manhood died in June 1837, leaving one son, Delos, who is now a resident of Tuscola, Mich. In September, 1838 Mr. Mead made a second marriage, wedding Eunice C. Wilson, a native of Saratoga County, NY, who was at that time living in Niagara County. Her father was Alexander Wilson. This union resulted in the birth of five children, but only one survives to this writing. This is Linda, wife of Ebb Voorheis, whose home is in Pontiac and whose family consists of six children. The devoted member of the Presbyterian Church and was connected with that religious body forty years. She breathed her last November 1, 1890, after a wedded life of fifty-two years.

"Mr. Mead is politically a stanch Democrat and the list of Presidential candidates for whom he has voted was headed by the name of Gen. Jackson and closes with that of Grover Cleveland. He has been a member of the Presbyterian Church for forty-five years and has served as Deacon for a long time. In 1866, while living on the farm, he met with a serious accident. He had placed a ladder on a wagon and was standing on the rounds, pitching shocks to a party who was topping off a stack when the ladder slipped and he was thrown violently to the ground, breaking both legs. He was kept in bed sixty-five days, during which time he suffered a good deal, besides being punished by the confinement to the house."

Henry Mead and Eunice Charlotte Wilson were married in Sep 1838. They had the following children:
