

A Different Kind of Weather

Lord Waldegrave's career in politics gave him a close-up view of the fall of Edward Heath and the emergence of Margaret Thatcher; something he recounts in his acclaimed memoir, A Different Kind of Weather. The youngest of seven children and the son of an earl, he enjoyed a quintessentially English upbringing. Educated at Eton, Oxford and Harvard, he became an MP in 1979 and served as a Minister from 1981 continuously until 1997, including terms at the Department of the Environment and the Foreign Office. After losing his Commons seat, he entered the House of Lords and is Provost of Eton College. A.C. Grayling is Master of the New College of the Humanities. He is a leading philosopher and author of 30 books including *The Good* Book, Ideas That Matter, To Set Prometheus Free and The Challenge of Things. Grayling's latest book, *The Age of Genius*, explores what we can still learn from the greatest ever change in the mental outlook of humanity that took place in the 17th century. For several years Grayling wrote the 'Last Word' column for the Guardian newspaper and a column for the Times. He regularly contributes to literary magazines and papers around the world and is an equally frequent broadcaster on BBC Radio 3 and Radio 4 and the World Service. He has served as a judge for the Man Booker Prize, the Art Fund Prize and the Wellcome Book Prize. He was the chairman of the 2014 Man Booker Prize.



JONATHAN MAYO

Rewriting History: Minute by Minute

Jonathan Mayo, producer, director and writer, joined the BBC in 1987, first working in radio and then television, where he won awards for his documentaries. In 2012 he produced a live programme for BBC Radio 2 that told the story of the sinking of the Titanic in real time – exactly 100 years on. From that, came a series of books about the Assassination of JFK; D-Day and Hitler's Last Day all told minute by minute. Hitler's Last Day, published in 2015, remained in the Sunday Times Top 10 Bestsellers List for several weeks. The format discards political and historical theories for fascinating detail and powerful human stories. Jeremy Vine called The Assassination of JFK: Minute by Minute, 'gripping from the first page to the last'. Jonathan finally got around to writing Titanic: Minute by Minute, which was published in March. His latest project is about the 1966 World Cup Final, and he is relieved that in that story, nobody dies!

Cable served as Chief Economist for Shell from 1995-1997, before becoming MP for Twickenham, and eventually to take a leading role in the economic management of this country. The Maverick Mountaineer

In the spring of 1901 a teenager stood on top of a hill, gazed out in wonderment at the Australian landscape and decided he wanted to be a mountaineer. Two decades later, the same man stood in a blizzard beneath the summit of Mount Everest, within sight of his goal to be the first to stand on the roof of the world. George Finch was at the highest point ever reached by a human being and only his decision to save the life of his stricken companion stopped him from reaching the summit. He not only became one of the world's greatest alpinists, earning the grudging respect of his rival George Mallory, but pioneered the use of the artificial oxygen that enabled Everest to finally be conquered thirty years after his own attempt. 




