Spiritual Life News

One of the Spiritual Discipline focuses for the March Event will be fasting. I have done some research on the internet and on the PCUSA site for some information. Below is one of the better definitions that I found to share:

WHAT IS A FAST?

Fasting is part of the faith life of religions old and new all over the world. In a fast, the believer chooses, for a set time, to do without something that is hard to do without. This is done so it does not come between the believer and God, so it cannot act as a god over that relationship and over the life of the believer.

Usually, the fast is to do without food. Food is one of the great blessings of God in our lives, a true pleasure and a true necessity. But humans tend to be gluttons; we want to eat more. Our hunger can compel us, force our hand, and occupy our thoughts. When we have anything in our lives that we don't or can't say no to, then it is lording over us. But God is in control. If something else takes up God's place in our lives, it is an idol, and we are living in something akin to idolatry. Fasting helps to bring it back into enough control for us to surrender it to God so it can be returned to its rightful place in life. Food is the foremost example of such a thing.

You can fast from some foods, and not others. You can fast from watching television, and buying pleasure items, even from buying ordinary stuff. You can fast from hobbies you crave, places you are unhealthily drawn to, music, books, news, and movies. You might even find it necessary to be fasting from use of the Internet. If you can be described as a 'junkie', 'freak', or 'fanatic' about something, that's a good thing to fast from.

There are many biblical accounts of fasting. I encourage you to check your Bible Concordances for scriptural references and stories about people that fasted and why they fasted.

For Christians, the practice of fasting is not only confined to the Lenten Season. There are other seasons and events in human life that call for time of intentional prayer, penitence, self-examination, sobriety, and focused attention on the Word of God.

Fasting has long been associated with the season of Lent. The practice of fasting in Lent folds together all of the biblical themes of fasting: repentance and mourning for our brokenness and sin, seeking the will of God, preparation to receive God's Word made flesh in the paschal mystery of Easter.

As we continue through this Lenten Season, let us consider the spiritual discipline of fasting as a way to help us identify with the sacrifice of God's Son on the cross. Let us all reflect upon how making any sacrifice in order to spend more time in prayer and contemplation of God's Love for us can help us to draw closer to Jesus and become a more willing vessel to be changed by Him.

The committee will also investigate the cost of adding more gravel to west end of the parking lot for overflow parking.

Christian Education committee has received Lent resources, which will be made available to members. Plans are underway for VBS 2009. Education sheets on recycling project will be given to Deacons in order to assist with the recycling in the church.



Soup Kitchen Director's Notes submitted by J.R. Russell

During the month of January, we served 1231 meals including 41 children. The Food Pantry assisted 191 families, 16 of them new. We offered utility assistance to 3 families, rent assistance to 11 families, temporary shelter to 3 families, assistance to 2 transient individuals, and miscellaneous assistance to 1 family.



Ice, snow and sleet obviously had a significant impact on activity this month. The center was closed for 3 days, including a pantry day, due to the winter weather.

We did receive our DECO grant for \$5,000, which is to be used for food purchases. Given the state of the Illinois budgetary woes, this is received with much thanksgiving and appreciation!

Souper bowl totals should be available in next month's report. Again, due to bad weather, many churches had to postpone their collection. One encouraging note is that the Marion High School did a food drive for this event, collecting 800 cans, and we received financial donations from the local Kiwanis, Rotary and Lion's Clubs. It is exciting to see this program expand past just our church communities!

Also, a tremendous thank you goes out to John Phillips and his crew for replacing the ceiling tiles in the building! All the tiles in the kitchen, dining room and hallway were replaced.

Evangelism.... What?

I have been Elder of Evangelism now for a few months and I still feel like I am treading uncertain waters. In my quest to learn what Evangelism is to me and what an Elder of Evangelism is supposed to do, I ran across an article by Sherron Kay George, entitled: <u>Reluctant evangelists? Telling the Good News may not come easy, but it is an essential part of a Christian lifestyle.</u>

Here's an excerpt:

Do Presbyterians still believe in evangelism? I quickly discovered in the required class on mission and evangelism I taught at Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary that many students had little interest in or even an aversion to evangelism. Isn't that something Baptists, Pentecostals, megachurches, and TV evangelists do?

We Presbyterians station smiling greeters at the front door, and we may take bread to visitors. We may invite someone to our church. But we generally do not feel comfortable speaking publicly about our personal faith.

Presbyterian pastors do not often preach evangelistic sermons or give altar calls, and door-to-door evangelism is rare among Presbyterians. Is there a way to practice evangelism without emotional manipulation and aggressive marketing techniques that lead to superficial decisions? Can Presbyterians reclaim with integrity our historical commitment to evangelism?

OK – so far so good. This article is substantiating what I already felt – an aversion to evangelism, children on street corners with signs, passing out of leaflets, cold-calling on the neighborhood.... Oh, my.

Then I ran across this handy diagram that, at first look, overwhelmed me and I didn't even read what it said. I have since gone back to the "drawing board" and think that I may get a handle on this Evangelism thing yet. Here is how – I started thinking of Evangelism as A MISSION – not mission itself, but a mission that is performed.

MISSION – now that's something I understand. That is something that this church has a tradition of and does very well. Let's take a look together.



Evangelism – The church as a messenger. I can be a messenger through my lifestyle, my words, my attitude (may need some work there) and my actions. Wow – is that Evangelism?

I can be a messenger by faith-sharing...sharing I can do but proclamation I don't know about yet.... Witnessing will need some work on my part.

I can be a messenger by inviting. I do it and so can you. "Hey, Jane, we are hosting the Community Lenten Service next week. Why don't you come?" See, not that hard. Welcoming – Pastor Cindy has said that we possess "radically hospitality." We know how to welcome. Assimilating – OK, the word geeks among us will hesitate here. My gut reaction was, "No – I will not become a part of the collective or minimize our Presbyterian differences." Then I actually looked the word up in the dictionary and found that assimilate can also mean to integrate new knowledge or information.....something we should be doing in every aspect of our lives.

I can be a messenger through new church development – this is the scariest area for me...when you start using words like conversion and discipleship, my inner Presbyterian starts to cringe.... Oh, I may need to expand my horizons....I am way out of my comfort zone ...but then I feel better when I look at building the church...nothing wrong with building the church...all for that.

So, the bottom line (literally) is that the Evangelism task is not insurmountable We can do this together as long as we focus our minds and hearts on the larger goal – **God's reign of love, peace, and justice**.
