### From the Principal...

### Dear Families,

Welcome back to Term Four! Hard to believe we are already into the last term of the 2015 school year! I hope all families had a fantastic holiday break and had the opportunity to relax in preparation for another high activity term. I hope many of us have recovered from our disappointment with the football finals!

Missing a bomber jacket? Missing a windcheater? Missing a shirt? Missing underwear?? Week One and the lost property box is overflowing with articles of clothing, many of which are UNNAMED. Large amounts of clothing are collected from the yard after school each day and placed in the lost property box outside Room8 (6U). Please check the box for lost property, make sure all articles of clothing are named and ENCOURAGE children to be responsible for their own belongings.

### Ingredients

- 120g (4 cups) rice bubbles
- $\square$  45g (1/2 cup) desiccated coconut
- 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- ☐ 1 tablespoon sesame seeds
- 2 tablespoons sunflower seeds
- $\square$  75g (1/2 cup) craisins, roughly chopped
- $\square$  175g (1/2 cup) rice malt syrup
- $\square$  140g (1/2 cup) peanut butter

### Method

 $\Rightarrow$  Step 1

Line a 16 x 26cm (base measurement) slice tin with baking paper, allowing paper to overhang two long sides of tin to form handles. Combine the rice bubbles, coconut, chia, sunflower seeds and craisins in a large mixing bowl. Set aside.

 $\Rightarrow$  Step 2

Place rice malt syrup and peanut butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Cook stirring, until melted, well combined and just coming to the boil.

 $\Rightarrow$  Step 3

Add to rice bubble mixture and stir to combine. Working quickly, spoon into prepared tin, pressing down firmly with the back of a spoon.

 $\Rightarrow$  Step 4




\$5 per person or \$20 per family, each ticket receives a free bag of popcorn.

# Classroom Programs - Term Four 2015

## Alive and Amazing!

## Focus Question: Is it living?

This unit is science based and allows the students to investigate the features of their environments and distinguish the features of living and non-living things. They use general and scientific language to describe characteristics of plants and animals. We will study pets and the different ways we care for them. The students will learn how to identify similarities and differences by observing, sorting and classifying objects of loving and non-living things, focusing on plants and animals. This unit will include a visit from the Responsible Pet Program and an excursion to the zoo to study a variety of animals in their natural habitat.

### Wonderful Plants -

## Essential Question - How do Plants Grow?

Students will experience a range of activities related to plants. They will research parts of plants, the lifecycle of plants, seed germination, how plants get their energy, plants in their backyard (native and introduced) and the resources provided by plants. Students will be involved in hands on experiences and will be able to undertake a selection of independent tasks relating to questions they pose throughout the term.

Students will participate in a range of literacy activities, including: guided reading groups, parent reading, buddy reading, independent reading, shared reading and readers' theatre. We will be studying both fiction and non-fiction texts.
