From the Principal...

Dear Families,

Welcome back to Term Four! Hard to believe we are already into the last term of the 2015 school year! I hope all families had a fantastic holiday break and had the opportunity to relax in preparation for another high activity term. I hope many of us have recovered from our disappointment with the football finals!

Missing a bomber jacket? Missing a windcheater? Missing a shirt? Missing underwear?? Week One and the lost property box is overflowing with articles of clothing, many of which are UNNAMED. Large amounts of clothing are collected from the yard after school each day and placed in the lost property box outside Room8 (6U). Please check the box for lost property, make sure all articles of clothing are named and ENCOURAGE children to be responsible for their own belongings.

Hats! Hats! Hats! At Monday morning assembly it was wonderful to see so many children wearing their school hats. This is a timely reminder that at school we have the school hat as a compulsory part of the school uniform during Term Four. Please ensure that the hat is labelled clearly with your son's or daughter's name and is included on a daily basis in the school bag. It is really important that as a school community we encourage our children to support our "Sunsmart" policy.

Yard Duty Supervision

A reminder to all families that teachers are on yard duty from 8.45am each morning before school and until 3.45pm each afternoon after school. Children should not be dropped off or left unsupervised in the school yard before or after these times. We appreciate your support in this supervision and safety of our children. Please reinforce with your child (particularly some of our older children) that under no circumstances should they arrive at school and then leave the school grounds to visit the shop. We can pass on messages which have been phoned through to the office only if absolutely necessary. Healthier LCM bars

The kids will love this better-for-you version of the classic LCM bar.

0:10 To Prep	0:05 To Cook	8 INGREDIENTS	EASY DIFFICULTY	18 MAKES
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Ingredients

- ☐ 120g (4 cups) rice bubbles
- ☐ 45g (1/2 cup) desiccated coconut
- ☐ 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- ☐ 1 tablespoon sesame seeds
- ☐ 2 tablespoons sunflower seeds
- ☐ 75g (1/2 cup) raisins, roughly chopped
- ☐ 175g (1/2 cup) rice malt syrup
- ☐ 140g (1/2 cup) peanut butter

Method

⇒ Step 1

Line a 16 x 26cm (base measurement) slice tin with baking paper, allowing paper to overhang two long sides of tin to form handles. Combine the rice bubbles, coconut, chia, sunflower seeds and raisins in a large mixing bowl. Set aside.

⇒ Step 2

Place rice malt syrup and peanut butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Cook stirring, until melted, well combined and just coming to the boil.

⇒ Step 3

Add to rice bubble mixture and stir to combine. Working quickly, spoon into prepared tin, pressing down firmly with the back of a spoon.

⇒ Step 4

Refrigerate for 1-2 hours or until firm. Cut into 18 bars.

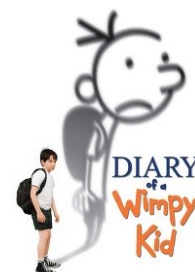

\$5 per person or \$20 per family, each ticket receives a free bag of popcorn.

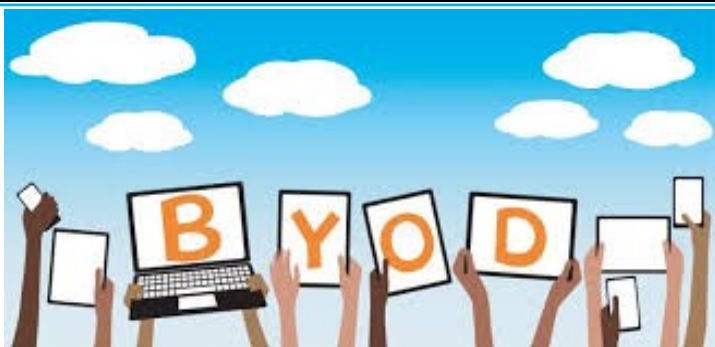
Seating: Limited chairs are available. Bring a blanket, a cushion, a bean bag or sleeping bag to camp out and watch the movie with your mates.

Classroom Programs - Term Four 2015

	Unit of Work	Literacy	Numeracy	Special Events
Foundation	<p>Topic: Alive and Amazing! Focus Question: Is it living?</p> <p>This unit is science based and allows the students to investigate the features of their environments and distinguish the features of living and non-living things. They use general and scientific language to describe characteristics of plants and animals. We will study pets and the different ways we care for them. The students will learn how to identify similarities and differences by observing, sorting and classifying objects of living and non-living things, focusing on plants and animals. This unit will include a visit from the Responsible Pet Program and an excursion to the zoo to study a variety of animals in their natural habitat.</p> 	<p>Reading: Students will participate in a range of literacy activities, including: guided reading groups, parent reading, buddy reading, independent reading, shared reading and readers' theatre. We will be studying both fiction and non-fiction texts.</p> <p>Writing: Students will consolidate handwriting and learning to write on dotted thirds. We will be continuing to develop descriptive recounts about familiar events, such as holidays, and the excursion to the zoo. We will introduce persuasive writing and some procedural text. Beginning with the history of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, students examine European exploration and colonisation in Australia up to the early 1800s, including the First Fleet and other sea explorers. Students consider the impact of exploration on existing societies in Australia. Students will continue their historical investigation by looking into the lives of some of Australia's convicts and free settlers. There will be a focus on open-ended assessment and student negotiated homework activities.</p> 	<p>Reading: This term students will continue focusing on key elements of the Level 3 and Level 4 literacy program. They will continue to identify facts and opinions, look at cause and effect and inferencing. During Book Club students will engage in discussions of shared text.</p> <p>Writing: Students will explore the different styles of poetry writing. They will continue to focus on vocabulary, punctuation, openers and connectives through the VCOP program. The groups will present their advertisements to the relevant audiences.</p> 	<p>Reading - The students will continue to focus on comprehension skills, using a variety of strategies.</p> <p>Writing – Genres: Narrative, Persuasive and Information Reports. Students will also learn about 'invasion games' where they will continue to apply basic and complex motor skills to specific invasion game situations. Students will continue to develop and practise sport specific skills individually, with a partner and in small groups and utilise key tactics and strategies in specific game situations.</p>
