Success with Reading

It is very important that all children have success with reading; children read every day at school and the more opportunities they have to practice the better they become. Each child should be spending 10 - 15 minutes minimum reading each night, juniors out loud at first and seniors either out loud or silently. Here are some ideas to help make reading at home a positive and enjoyable experience for you and your child:

Four 'Ps' to help develop perfect reading:

<u>Pause</u> - Don't jump in too quick, wait after a word has been read incorrectly – give them time to notice it doesn't, look or sound right, or doesn't make sense.

<u>Praise</u> - Be specific, tell them when they have done it right and exactly what they have done right. <u>Prompt</u> - Give a clue to help them work it out. e.g. "Try that sentence again", "Miss that word out and try and work it out" "What does it start with?" What will make sense? What looks right and sounds right?"

<u>Practice</u> - Lots of reading with text at a level that is easy, so they can practice all the strategies they know, reading books they have read before.


Ideas for reading at home:

Reading aloud - juniors

- Reading poetry for the practice of the rhythm and flow of reading.
- * Reading poems out loud in unison (together).
- ❖ Read a page each, child reads one page adult reads the next and so on.
- * Reading the talking parts, parts in speech marks, using expression. "How would that person say that?" "Use that sort of voice." Reading plays, take a part or two each.
- * Reading together for a purpose e.g. reading a recipe baking biscuits, reading instructions making something together.
- ❖ Reading to your child to give an example of a good reader.
- * After reading, talk about the story, ask questions to further their understanding of what they have read, relate it to something similar they have experienced or done.
- ❖ Make sure your child has a regular time and place to read, just before bed is a good one or even while you are cooking dinner at the bench in the kitchen.

Silent Reading - seniors

- Reading silently for meaning. Read the text first then ask the child to read and answer a question about the text. Try this, a paragraph at a time, a question for each paragraph.
- A Retelling, have the child retell the story in their own words after reading.
- ❖ Have the child read a paragraph silently then ask them to "Find the part where..." OR" Find a word that means..."
- * Reading between the lines. Ask questions about things that are not stated but implied in the text e.g. "How do you think they were feeling after that happened?" "What tells you that?"
- * Make statements about the text and the child answers if this was true or false. Make this fun, make it a game.
- ❖ If there are two different points of view in the text have the child take a side and then justify why they have taken that point of view.
- * Make sure your child has a regular time and place to read, just before bed is a good one or even while you are cooking dinner at the bench in the kitchen.

Year 7 Immunisation (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis/Whooping Cough)

In Year 7 students are offered free vaccine against tetanus, diphtheria and whooping cough. In New Zealand, babies and young children are given vaccines to protect them against these diseases. As children get older this protection, wears off so Year 7 students need to boost their protection against these three diseases.

There will be an information presentation for Year 7 students on Tuesday 16th February at 2.00 p.m.

Parents/caregivers are welcome to attend. Students will bring home an Information/Consent Form afterwards, this form needs to be completed and returned to school as soon as possible.

Year 8 Girls HPV Immunisation Programme There will be an information presentation for Year 8 girls on Tuesday 16th at 2.30 pm.
