THE PASTOR'S PAGE

It is with bittersweet sentiments that I sit down to write this final newsletter article as pastor of Matthews Presbyterian Church. Bitter, because I will miss you greatly. We have spent almost eleven years together, you and I. We have experienced a lot together over those years. At your hand and by your nurturing I have grown and matured as a human being, and I feel, grown and matured as a pastor. I have nothing but the utmost respect and appreciation for you.

But my leaving is also a sweet time, for me and I trust it will be for you. I am convinced the sweetness and goodness of Christ is in the mix of all this change and because the calling and purposes of Christ are being served, things will work their way out for the good at our parting. I feel strongly that God is telling me it is time to accept another call. It is time for me professionally to serve another congregation with what time I have left in my career to do so. It is time for the Pedersons to go back home and become a physical part again of our extended families. And, I am convinced, that it is time for MPC to have new leadership to inspire it to new heights of service to Jesus Christ.

I am moving to Georgetown, TX to become pastor of San Gabriel Presbyterian Church. Georgetown is

thirty miles north of Austin off Interstate 35. The church is only twelve years old and I will be the second installed pastor. It is smaller than MPC but sits poised for sustainable growth in the middle of rapid population expansion spilling north out of Austin, TX up the Interstate 35 corridor. The church has a beautiful limestone sanctuary and multipurpose building that sits across the highway from a Dell Webb older adult development known as Sun City Georgetown. Thus the congregation is predominately older adult due to the demographics of its setting, but the area around the church is growing significantly with young families as well. I believe the Lord is calling me to help grow the congregation around all ages and to move it forward in programmatic expansion, mission engagement, and building expansion for fellowship and educational space.

As I leave, it is important to remember that healthy congregations are enormously resilient and capable of absorbing, and even thriving, through significant change. MPC is a healthy congregation. You possess significant resources. The biggest resource is the promise of Jesus Christ in your midst who is a living Lord and continues to call and equip people for ministry in his name. News from the Pipe Organ Committee . . .



We all rejoice that the construction in the sanctuary to prepare it for the coming pipe organ is complete and that we are enjoying worshiping together in this beautiful space with improved acoustics for speaking and music! At the end of this year, our new pipe organ will arrive, and beautiful silver pipes in a lovely wooden case will fill the front of our sanctuary surrounding the cross. We have custom ordered the organ that is coming to our church, and it is being hand made by organ builder Dan Garland and his crew in Ft. Worth, TX.

To update you on the progress of building our organ, the console at which the organist sits and plays and the solid wood case that holds the pipes are built and in Dan Garland's organ shop. They are stained with a wood stain color chosen by members of our organ task force and property committee that will complement the colors of our sanctuary. The main windchests are complete and the pipes are being racked. A windchest is a wooden box divided into single channels, on which the pipes stand, and into which wind (air) will be directed by a specific key on the console of the organ. Racking the pipes is building the supports that will keep the pipes stable and vertical in the case. Dan's quote is that his shop is "wall to wall Matthews".

Organ Task Force member, Cara Lee Spence, visited Dan Garland's shop on February 5 in Ft. Worth, TX, where she toured the shop and was able to see the progress of the organ. Pictures with this article are from this tour. MPC's organ is indeed everywhere in the shop, in different stages of completion. There is an entire mockup of the back of our chancel where the case and all the pipes will be located. Cara Lee was treated to hearing a rank of pipes meant for MPC that are being "voiced". This means that every single pipe is heard in the shop both individually and in ranks to get the best tone, and much fine tuning and even pipe replacement occurs during this longest and most complex phase resulting in a one of a kind sound for our church's pipe organ.

If you go to the website for Garland organs (http://garlandpipeorgans.com) and look under projects, you will see our pipe organ listed under current projects for 2016. It says that our pipe organ has 38 ranks and has a stoplist provided. A rank of pipes is a row of pipes graduated in length, one per key on the keyboard. Each Rank has a different tone color or pitch, and our organ has 38 ranks that will provide many different sound combinations, resulting in a great range of volume and tone quality. A pipe organ is truly an orchestra containing all the sounds of instruments in an orchestra. The stoplist shows the

number of stop available. A stop is an individual sound in the organ, composed of one or more ranks of pipes that produce the desired instrumental sound for the music being played.

What is the difference between our current organ and the pipe organ? Our current organ is an electronic which uses loudspeakers to produce simulated pipe sounds. It requires no actual pipes be present to make sound. The pipes at the front of our chapel are decorative only and have nothing to do with the organ in there. A pipe organ has many tangible advantages over electronic organs. These include visual beauty, longevity, and the quality of materials and craftsmanship employed. The most important difference is the production of real and complex pipe sounds that uplift listeners just as at a live concert. Although the recording of a concert is pleasing, attending a live concert is a complete experience. Our new pipe organ will complete our worship experience and enhance It in ways we have yet to learn.



AMP!



The Easter Season: A Time for Reflection and Renewal

The season of Lent leads up to the most holy of Christian days, Easter Sunday. The forty days of Lent begin Ash Wednesday and end at dusk the Saturday before Easter, not counting the Sundays in between. The Sundays during Lent, like every Sunday, are considered weekly celebrations of the resurrection. Many denominations encourage disciples to renew and strengthen their faith during Lent. Plans are made for community-wide Lenten preparation through the spiritual disciplines of prayer, Bible study, fasting, and service.

This preparation is a historical model from the early church. New believers were mentored in the Christian faith weeks before Easter, preparing for their baptisms at the Great Easter Vigil. The idea of giving something up for Lent came out of this tradition, when fasting—abstaining from food as an act of discipline in solidarity with others in the community—was used to raise one's spiritual consciousness and empty oneself before God. Fasting or giving up something for Lent can be a good way to explore a deeper expression of faith, if not adopted as a show of piety, martyrdom, or moral righteousness. Presbyterians may find it meaningful to give something up for Lent, but it is not required. Some disciples may find a more valuable spiritual exercise in taking something on during Lent—a more Christ-like attitude toward others, a humble spirit at work, or a feeling of gratitude in the midst of scarcity. Whatever spiritual disciplines and preparations are embraced during Lent, they can help us prepare for or renew our baptisms as part of the resurrection celebration at Easter.



Did you know? . . .

Matthews Presbyterian Church dates to February 10, 1877, when a commission appointed by the Mecklenburg Presbytery organized the Matthews Presbyterian Church. Our first church building was a one-room frame structure with stained glass windows. A steeple over the vestibule held a large, good-toned bell, the only one in town, which was tolled for funeral services and used to signal fires. The bell remains in our church today.

We've come a long way since then. In the fall of 2000, we opened our Preschool, Matthews Presbyterian Church Child Development Center. MPC CDC strives to create a nurturing environment for our students and families that encourages growth, love and laughter. We are fortunate to have so many wonderful families as part of our preschool community and we are grateful every day that they have chosen to share their children with us.



Meet the staff of Presbyterian Psychological Services located in our Chapel building

Bentley Ball, Licensed Professional Counselor, and Elizabeth Hudson, Licensed Psychological Associate are the current, (since October 2010 and October 2013 respectively) Presbyterian Psychological Services therapists who are serving the Matthews community and beyond through the old church office behind the Chapel. Between them they are able to generally see 20-25 clients each week.

Liz uses the office on Mondays and sees children, adolescents and adults. Bentley, primarily sees adults for depression, anxiety, long term effects of sexual violations, marriages and self harm in any form and is currently here on Tuesdays and Fridays from 7 am to 6 pm and Thursdays from 4-9 pm. When they are not here they are at the main office on the campus of Sharon Presbyterian Church.
