

TROPHY AWARDS BANQUET




SURVEY MONKEY RESULTS







UPDATES FROM SSC PRESIDENT

Message from the President, Don Giottonini

I brought my Lions to the shop right after they were mounted in 1995. Families brought their kids to show them the mounts. What happened in 20 years? They are still on display and no negative comments. The Orange County Chapter had their meeting August 20th and about 50 protesters were out front picketing. Our PR Firm prepared a facts sheet which was distributed. The Board is in agreement that National could have handled the Cecil occurrence better.

I attended National's Board meeting in Tucson the week of August 24th. My focus was finance, which is still a priority but we won't need SCI or SCIF if we can't stop the bleeding. I think on the PR side funding surviving big game that has been poached is favorable. Showing that rhinos being saved and still able to breed is priceless. I think the guys could have a field day with that. How much does the HSUS donate?

Coalition and California meeting went fine. We had some very good discussions and all positive now let them pay up. Yesterday at the board meeting I received permission to ask for money for the coalition. We did receive \$10,000 but was hoping for more. I will see what I can do with the Safari Times.

As you can expect our favorite lion was the main topic. I had a 1-1/2 hour meeting with Chip Burkhalter, Director of our Government Affairs and Jeff Pachen, Director of our State of Affairs in DC. We are going to get talking points, work on getting the story out about the 1.1 million we raised for lion research. I asked for national to fund a Black Rhino purchase to release in a private preserve. The preserve is Zulu Nyala that donates the photo safari for us and others. We need to have a game plan when this happens again and they both agreed this will happen again and they are thinking September when congress reconvenes. Not much time. I know most of us are not happy about the way this was handled but I think they were right. There was no way we could fight back on the emotional play the antis had. After the first few days SCI was not mentioned associated with the story. Had we tried to justify or back the killing we would have stayed in the limelight. Now we can start putting out the positive work we do. The real danger for us is congress, and that is where they have been spending their time. There is already a Cecil Bill out; they don't think it will pass. If you want a lion go NOW.

Finance committee. \$80,000.00 in record book. The problem is we can get it online for free!. The next little tidbit we have \$142,000.00 in Cabela's gift certificates. Unfortunately, we have not been getting them. I plan to contact them and use them for our events. We also need our membership to attend the SCI Fundraiser in Las Vegas more. This is 65% of our income. For every 10 chapter members that attend **we get a pass for next year**. The flyers will start coming out next month.
