The Spirit of Jeanne Jugan Lives On!

**“Be kind... In serving the aged,
it is He Himself whom you are serving.”**

On August 30th, St. Mary's Home will honor St. Jeanne Jugan on her feast day. What makes her so remarkable is not how she founded a world-wide organization from one selfless act of kindness but how her mission challenges us today.

It's incredible but in 1839 Jeanne Jugan gave up her own bed to a blind and paralyzed elderly woman she carried straight off the streets — the first of many poor elderly who came to her door.

Pope Benedict XVI called St. Jeanne Jugan a “saint for old age,” which might not seem like much of an honor in a society that esteems youth and all its attributes. It is a title that is significant precisely because it is so counter-cultural.

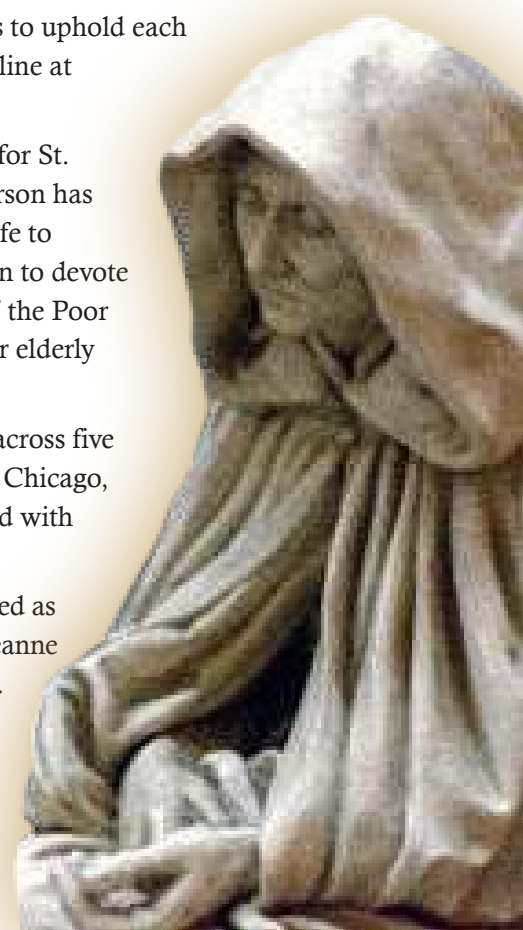
As we struggle to define public policy to best care for our senior members of society, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops offers us wisdom through its recently published statement entitled “To Live Each Day with Dignity.” Its teaching reminds us that compassion's root word means to “suffer with” another person. The document calls on Catholics to work with others to uphold each person's right to live with dignity. The full text is available online at www.usccb.org/toliveeachday.

Ideas about the meaning of human dignity may vary, but for St. Jeanne Jugan, it was very simple. She believed that every person has worth simply by being a child of God, and she devoted her life to caring for the vulnerable. Her spirituality still inspires women to devote their lives to the care of the elderly poor. The Little Sisters of the Poor embody her model of love by opening up their homes to their elderly guests they lovingly call Residents.

Today, Little Sisters care for 13,000 elderly in 196 homes across five continents. There are 30 homes in the United States. Here in Chicago, St. Mary's is home to 120 low-income seniors who are treated with respect and kindness.

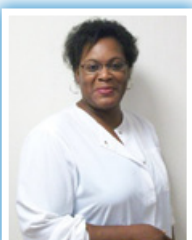
By 2030, it is estimated that 1 in 5 Americans will be counted as elderly and will spend their final years in nursing homes. St. Jeanne Jugan's legacy increasingly will be an indispensable apostolate.

How do you live out St. Jeanne Jugan's legacy?

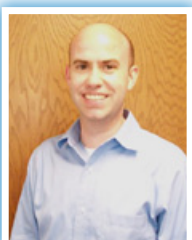

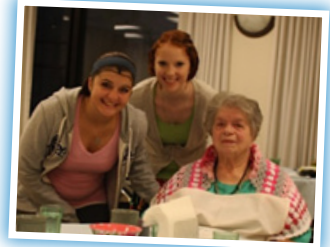
St. Mary's Home recently opened its door to seven college-bound young women traveling from Bismarck, North Dakota through the Midwest as part of a 4-day "nun run."
