The dinner's record-breaking Angel auction raised over \$112,000 for the Be An Angel to a Student program, pushing our year-to-date Angel total to over \$1 million - the first time the Angel program raised over \$1 million in a year! ## Our Angel Mom Speaks Out



Our 2013 Scholarship Fund Dinner Angel Mom, Carol Villani, brought the house down on Wednesday, October 9 at the Waldorf Astoria when she told the 800+ Scholarship Fund Dinner guests the story of how she and her family found Futures In Education. A mother of two students at St. Margaret School in Middle Villlage, Carol is forever grateful to her daughters' Angels.

As Carol so eloquently said it ....

"Hello everyone, my name is Carol and I would like to extend my deepest thank you to Monsignor Jamie and the staff at Futures In Education for giving

me this opportunity to speak to everyone here tonight. I will be giving you a quick

summary about how my daughters came to be recipients of this wonderful program.

I arrived in the United States with my mom and dad in the early 1980's. I was twelve years old then. I did not know a word of English. Learning the English language was a bit difficult because all my grade school years were taken in Guatemala City.

I grew up in Brooklyn during my teenage years and went to Washington Irving High School in NYC. During my High Schools years I worked in retail stores. After I graduated from Washington Irving High School, I attended Stony Brook University in Long Island. I then transfered to Pace University where I graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Information Systems.

I held several excellent jobs. However, in the year 2009 my boss called me into his office and told me with great sympathy that I was laid off. I found out later it was because of a reduction of funding in grants to that organization.

I was full of anxious emotions. I remembered praying and crying to God and saying to him "God, I am a single mom with two small children what am I going to do?" How can I pay all these bills by myself? I thought, "how am I going to pay for my daughters tuition?" The thought did cross my mind of sending my daughters to public school but I knew this change would have been so difficult for them because of all the personal changes they already had gone through within the past few years.

The new school year was about to start again and I did not have all the funds to pay for my daughter's tuition. I spoke with the Principal and he told me about The Futures In Education program. I reached out to them and spoke with



a beautiful person name Tanairi who helped me throughout the application process. I was able to send my daughters back to Catholic School because of Futures In Education.

Currently, my daughters are attending St Margaret School in Queens, NY, which they love. Under the leadership of Rev. Msgr. Steven J. Aguggia and the wonderful Principal Dr. Franco, my daughters can participate in after school activities, such as the science club, the drama club and the children's choir. I can proudly say my daughters work hard and have made the Principal's list every semester. They never like to miss a day of school.

I cannot stress enough how this program has not only helped my daughters attend Catholic school, but it has also been a life changing experience for them. They have learned that there are beautiful people who care about them and they are so grateful to everyone that each morning they pray for all the Angels who help children and for giving them the opportunity to stay in Catholic School. They tell me that one day they each want to be an Angel for a child and give back to the Futures In Education Program.

The world we live in today has major problems. One wonders why this world does not fly apart in a million pieces. Does anyone here know how to eat an elephant? The answer is one bite at a time.

> Well the glue that holds this fragile world together is good people with good hearts. You are the good people who quietly, behind the scenes, eat the elephant one bite at a time. Your contributions create real and lasting change – one life at a time making this world a better place for all.

It definitely takes a village to raise well-educated and religious children in NYC. I encourage and plead with everyone here tonight to please continue your generous support and donations

Our Angel program is growing faster than ever. For the first time, we have raised over \$1,000,000 in a single year to directly fund scholarships for children in need, and have been fortunate enough to match nearly half of our students with an Angel.

Angels provide partial tuition assistance to our applicants, many of whom come from the neediest families in Brooklyn and Queens. Due to the tremendous success of the Angel program last year, we have over 200 new students hoping to find their Angel this year.

"My kids are doing great. They're thriving in school. They're really nice kids, and it has a lot to with the school and the fact that they were able to go there," says Betsey, mother of five, when speaking of her children's education at St. Camillus School in Rockaway Park.

With five children at home, two of whom have hearing impairments which necessitate expensive hearing aids and treatment, Betsey's family expenses seem overwhelming at times. She and her husband's deep faith in the Catholic school system, coupled with the help of their Futures In Education Angels, has kept her children in St. Camillus School. Her passion for the school is evident when she discusses what she would have done if not for Futures: "I would have scrubbed bathroom floors or done anything to keep them [at St. Camillus]. I would try to do my best to keep them there." It's not just a great education Betsey hopes her children will gain from their experiences at St. Camillus – it's also the unforgettable bond with their Angels Betsey hopes her children will take with them for the rest of their lives. "I feel that hopefully, one day, my kids will be able to do the same for someone else. They're very generous kids, and it's a pay-forward kind of thing [to do]."

### **Catholic Alumni Partnership Update**

The Catholic Alumni Partnership (CAP) program is now in its fifth year in the Diocese of Brooklyn.

The program, which currently exists in eight dioceses and archdioceses around the nation, aims to help Catholic elementary schools reconnect with their alumni. There are now 45 schools in Brooklyn and Queens participating in the program, which has helped them raise close to \$1 million.

The goal of the program is simple – for each school to have a fully functioning, comprehensive development program, with alumni support as its foundation.

This approach has been adopted by the diocesan Preserving the Vision strategy, in which ultimately each school will target 30% revenue support from non-tuition sources. Besides the fundraising aspect of CAP,
