#### **Annual Transfer/Open Enrollment**

Annual Transfer/Open Enrollment is October 16 – November 15, 2006. The effective date for all changes will be January 1, 2007. Information is available on the Knox County Schools web site <a href="http://www.kcs.k12tn.net/benefits/benefits-index.htm">http://www.kcs.k12tn.net/benefits/benefits-index.htm</a> under the Employee Benefits Department. Employees can obtain information and/or print forms to send into our office. You may also obtain information by calling Employee Benefits at 594-1686, by stopping by the office on the 16<sup>th</sup> floor of the Andrew Johnson Building, or by attending one of the area information meetings. Our office is open from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. All forms should be faxed, hand delivered or mailed to Knox County Schools Employee Benefits Office, 16<sup>th</sup> floor, P.O. Box 2188, Knoxville, TN 37901-2188. The fax number is 594-3737. Do not send any forms to any of the vendors. All paperwork must be received by the Employee Benefit Office by November 15, 2006.

Benefits are an important part of your compensation package. The employee premium for benefits is taken out pretax which saves employees money on their income tax. Every Knox County School employee eligible for retirement benefits has a term life insurance policy with the value of 1.5 x their salary provided at no cost by Knox County Schools. The minimum amount is \$20,000.00 and the maximum amount is \$50,000.00. Employees also have retirement benefits with either Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System or Knox County Government depending on their position. Knox County Schools contributes to both plans on behalf of their employees.

We will be conducting area information meetings at the following locations. Staff members from the Employee Benefits Office will be available for individual questions from 2:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. Please make every effort to come to one of the meetings so you can maximize your benefits. The meetings are designed to inform you about the changes in the health, life, dental and flexible benefits plans for 2007. We have confirmed the dates for the following meetings:

#### Life Insurance

This is not an open enrollment. Employees who do <u>not</u> currently have Supplemental Life Coverage must complete the AETNA Evidence of Insurability Statement (medical questionnaire) to obtain coverage. Employees with current supplemental coverage can increase their coverage by one level without completing a medical questionnaire. Employees who wish to obtain additional life insurance above \$20,000 or more than one level above their current coverage must complete the AETNA Evidence of Insurability Statement (medical questionnaire). Rates for Supplemental Life Insurance are based on the employee's age and the amount of coverage. Please see the Life Insurance rate sheet for more information.

Employees who wish to sign up for spouse coverage will require a statement of health questionnaire to be completed by the employee. Spouse coverage is available in the amount of \$10,000.00. The cost is \$1.40 a month. Dependent coverage is available in the amount of \$5,000.00. Dependent coverage is available for children ages 14 days through age 19, or 24 if a full time student. The cost is \$.52 a month. Employees can sign up for dependent coverage for their children at any time while their children are between the ages of 14 days and 19 years old. Child dependents no longer have to go through medical underwriting if coverage was not obtained when the employee began working for Knox County Schools.

Employees should make sure their beneficiaries are up-to-date. If you have had one of your beneficiaries die or you want to change the beneficiary due to marital or personal reasons, please change your beneficiaries. Employees can change their beneficiaries at any time during the year by completing and sending in a new beneficiary form.

#### **Flexible Benefits**

Knox County Schools is in the process of determining a new administrator for flexible benefits. This is an open enrollment. Employees will be able to sign up for flexible benefits including medical reimbursement and dependent childcare. Please note employees must sign a new form every year for medical reimbursement and dependent childcare. Please note that due to I.R.S. regulations and the RFP purchasing requirements for determining a new administrator Knox County Schools will not be able to have an additional open enrollment period for 2007 after the new administrator is named. The maximum for both medical reimbursement and dependent care is \$5,000.00.

Employees should put either the payroll deduction amount or the yearly deduction amount on the form. The money will begin coming out of the payroll checks beginning January 1, 2007.

Appropriate expenses must be incurred between January 1 and December 31. Employees have until March 31 of the following year to submit receipt forms for reimbursement.

#### **Dental Insurance**

This is open enrollment. Employees can sign up for Delta Dental coverage, add family members, remove family members from Delta or transfer to Delta Dental from Cigna. The Cigna plan will end December 31, 2006. Employees who currently participate in the CIGNA plan may transfer to the Delta Dental plan by completing a Delta Dental application. Employees will not automatically be transferred to the Delta Dental Plan. **Beginning January 1, 2007 Delta Dental will cover adult orthodontics.** Orthodontics is no longer limited to individuals age 19 and under. There was a slight increase in the Delta Dental rates.

Please disregard this information. **Knox County Schools does not participate in any of the State of TN Dental plans.** Knox County Schools has different benefits than the plans offered by the State of TN.

#### Health Insurance

Our annual transfer period is from October 16 - November 15, 2006. Employees who currently carry health insurance may transfer from one plan to another plan. The effective date for the coverage will be January 1, 2007. **This is not an open enrollment.** Employees who do not have health coverage with Knox County Schools can sign up for health coverage only if they have a HIPAA qualifying event or by participating in the late enrollment process. Employees who participated in one of the State health insurance plans as of September 1, 2006 will be receiving mailings from the State of Tennessee. This will include directories and handbooks on the three types of health plans available. Employees will also receive information on the health premiums. The insurance rates have increased 6% from last year. You may receive a flyer with the entire health premium on it from either the State of Tennessee or from the Insurance Company (Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Cigna, or United/John Deere). The entire premium includes both the employee portion and the employer portion.

Changes for 2007

- The annual out-of-pocket pharmacy copay maximum under Blue Cross/Blue Shield will be increased to \$1,500.00 beginning January 1, 2007.
- Blue Cross/Blue Shield will begin to allow one annual physical exam per adult. The visit will be covered at 90% of MAC in-network and 70% of MAC out-of-network.
- Blue Cross/Blue Shield has increased the emergency room copay to \$50.00 per visit plus 90% MAC innetwork and 70% out-of-network.
- All three plans have increased the Diabetes Education annual benefit maximum to \$500.00 per year.
- All three plans will cover routine foot care for individuals diagnosed with diabetes. It will cover such things as diabetic shoes and inserts, nail clipping and treatment for corns and calluses.
- All three plans will allow 12 well child visits and immunizations through age 5 and annual checkups for ages 6-17 with immunizations as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)
- John Deere has been purchased by United Heathcare. New cards with the United Healthcare name will be sent out in December 2006.

#### AMSE RECEIVES 1940's BLUEPRINTS

New York City's "strongman", Radio City Music Hall builder and Empire State Building spire erector, Jack Beers has donated his 1940's blueprints of the special trunnion-mounted apparatus used at Y-12 to the American Museum of Science and Energy in Oak Ridge.

Jack Beers, former general foreman of rigging and structural steel for Stone & Webster Engineering Corporation, devised the trunnion device, which he had constructed and installed for turning odd shaped tanks at Y-12 during the World War II Manhattan Project.

Beers' apparatus saved much time, labor and money for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, during the Oak Ridge Manhattan Project. Because of their shape, the tanks were shipped to the project in a horizontal position and had to be turned vertically for placement on concrete piers at Y-12.

Originally, it took eight men four to six hours to set the 16-ton tanks, using two overhead bridge cranes and special rigging. The trunnion mechanism reduced the work of turning and setting a tank to two men with an average time of 15 to 20 minutes, and dispensed with one overhead bridge crane. It is estimated that the trunnion-mounted turning yoke, built for \$350, saved at least \$100,000 and many man-hours, explained Beers.

Born in 1910, Beers says he "goin' for 100!" He was raised in severe poverty in the Lower East Side and he became a "strongman" and was known as "New York City's Strongest Boy." He helped build Radio City Music Hall and he erected the Empire State Building spire via helicopter. A film about his life, *Holes in My Shoes* was written and produced by London-based David Wachs.

Other items donated to AMSE by Beers included the vehicle decal that gave him access to the plant sites of Clinton Engineer Works, his y-12 employee pass, a CEW Telephone Book, and other memorabilia.
